



Physical Education Report (TEC 38.0141)

2021 – 2022 Physical Education Report Summary

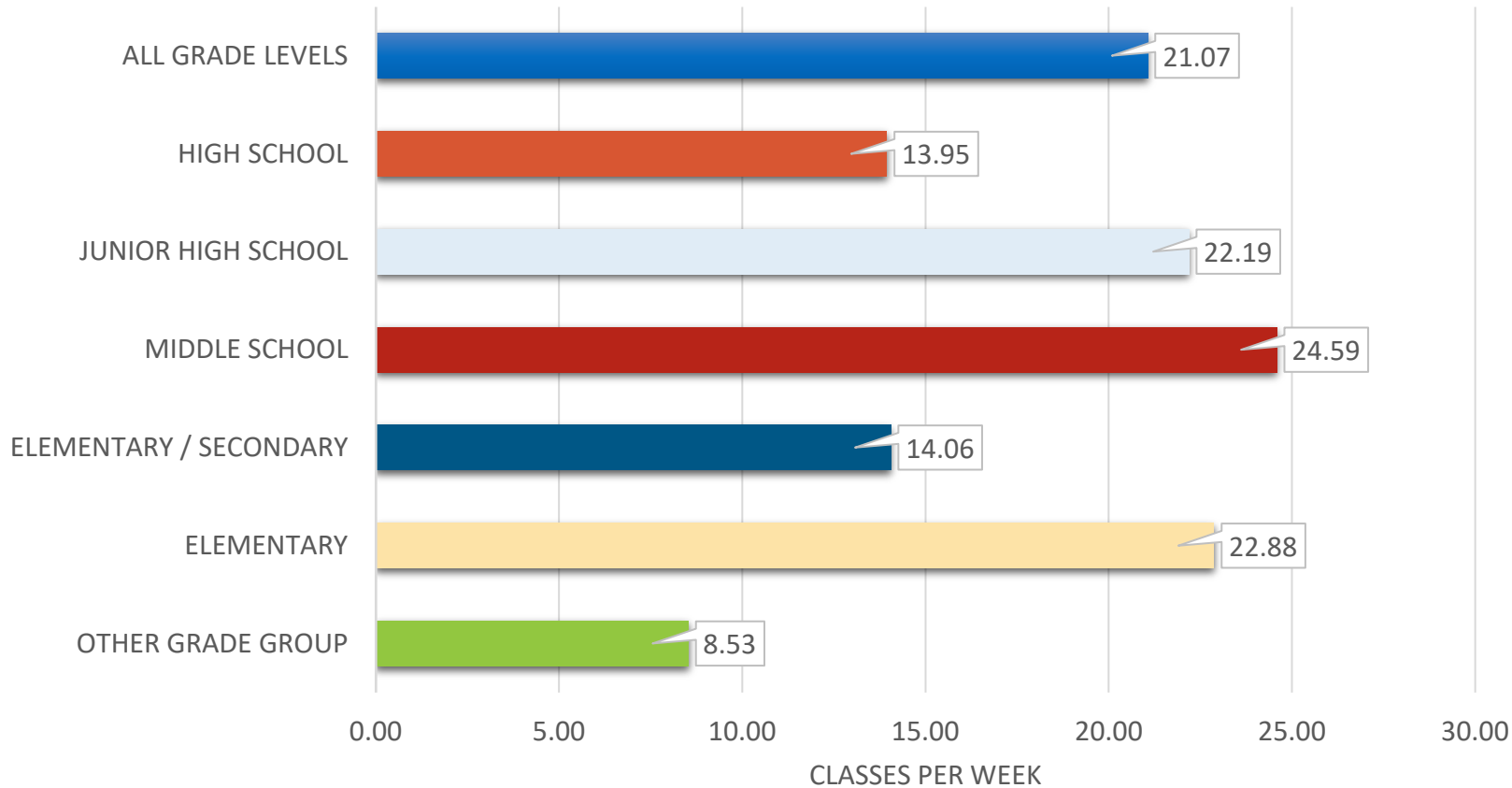
[Texas Education Code \(TEC\) §38.0141](#) requires the commissioner of education to complete a report on physical education provided by each school district and publish the report on the TEA website. The report must include the following:

- (1) The number of physical education classes offered at each campus in the district and the number of days, classes, and minutes offered each week by each campus;
- (2) The ratio of students enrolled in physical education classes compared to overall district enrollment;
- (3) The average physical education class size at each campus in the district;
- (4) The number of physical education teachers in the district who are licensed, certified, or endorsed by an accredited teacher preparation program to teach physical education;
- (5) Whether each campus in the district has the appropriate equipment and adequate facilities for students to engage in the amount and intensity of physical activity required by state law;
- (6) Whether the district allows modifications or accommodations to meet the needs of students with disabilities; and
- (7) Whether the district has a policy that allows teachers or administrators in the district to withhold physical activity from a student as punishment.

The number of the question appears in the upper right corner of the slide that answers this requirement.

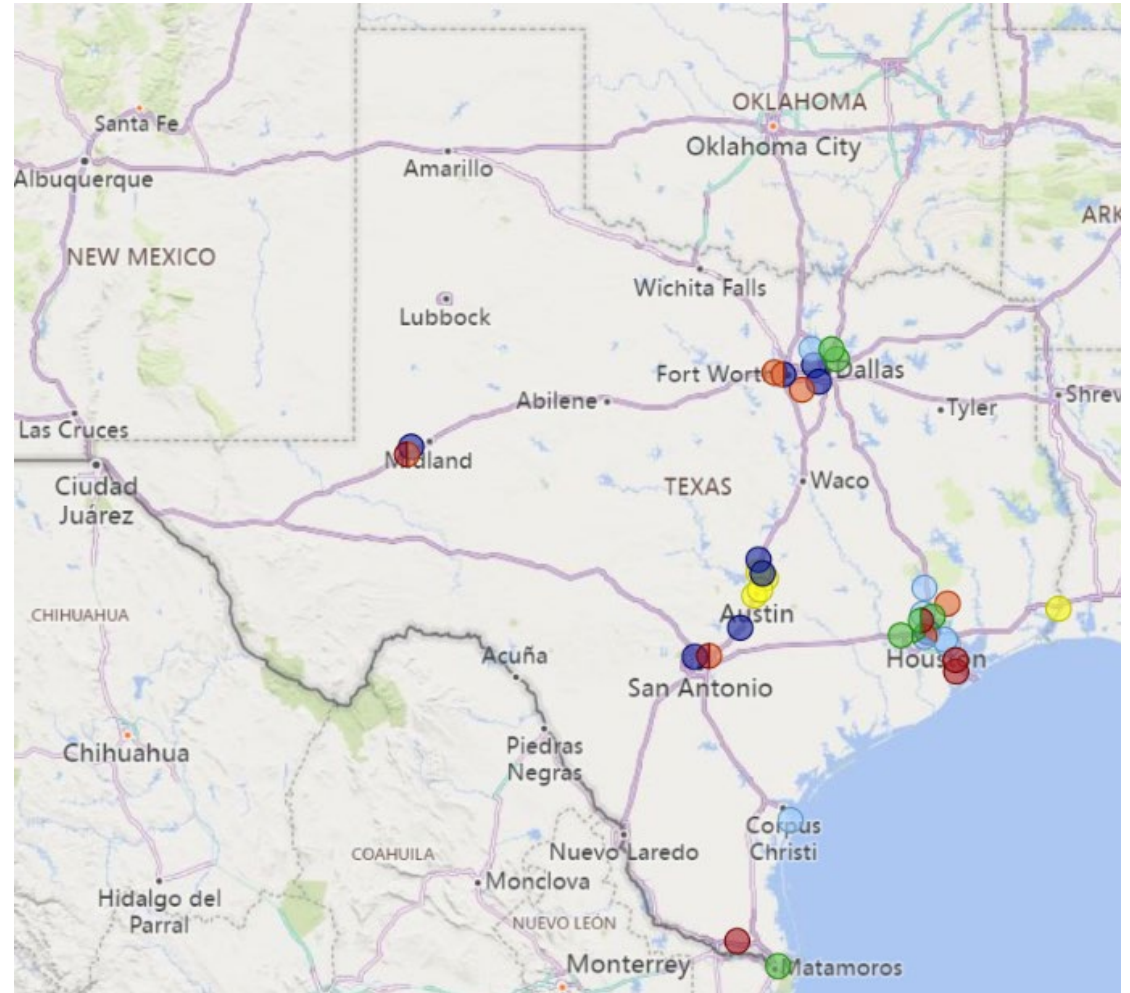

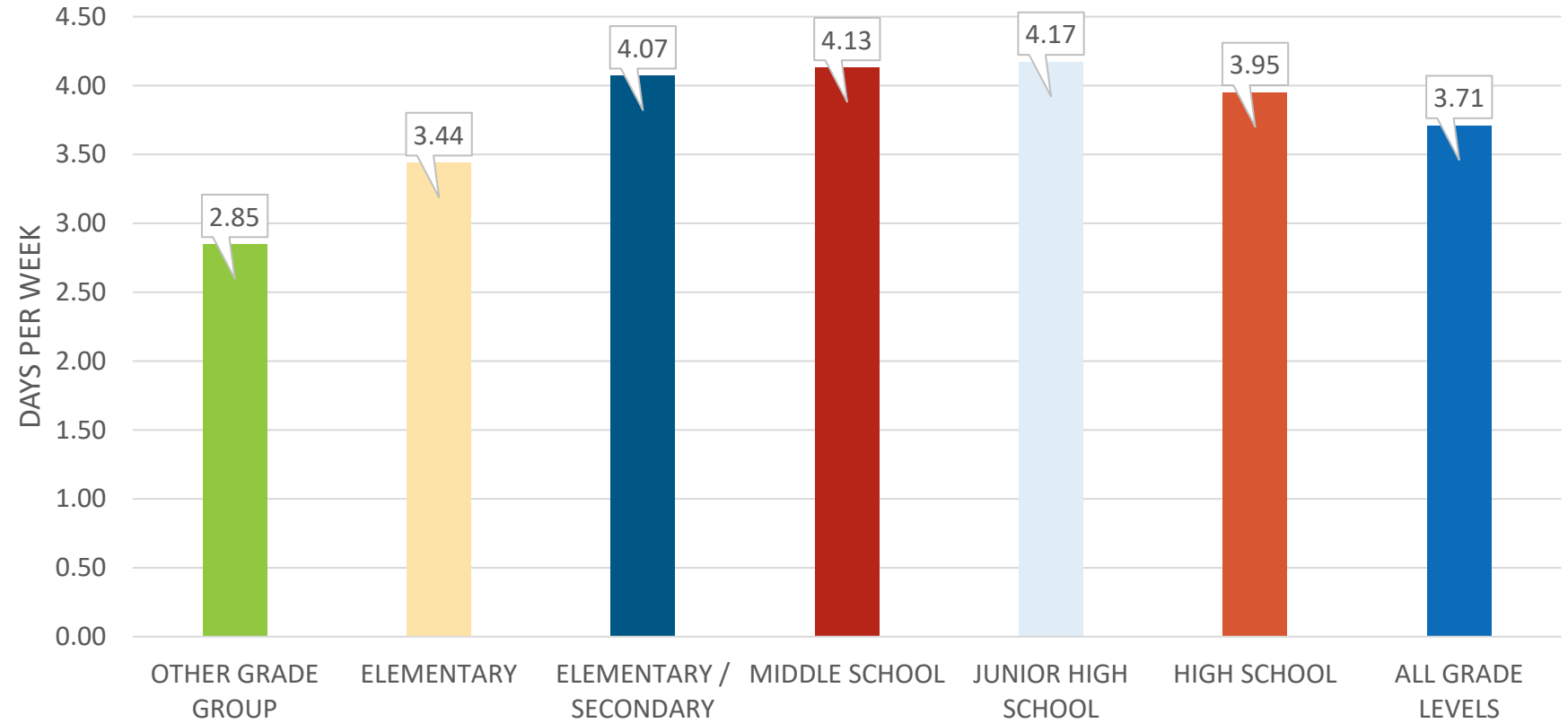

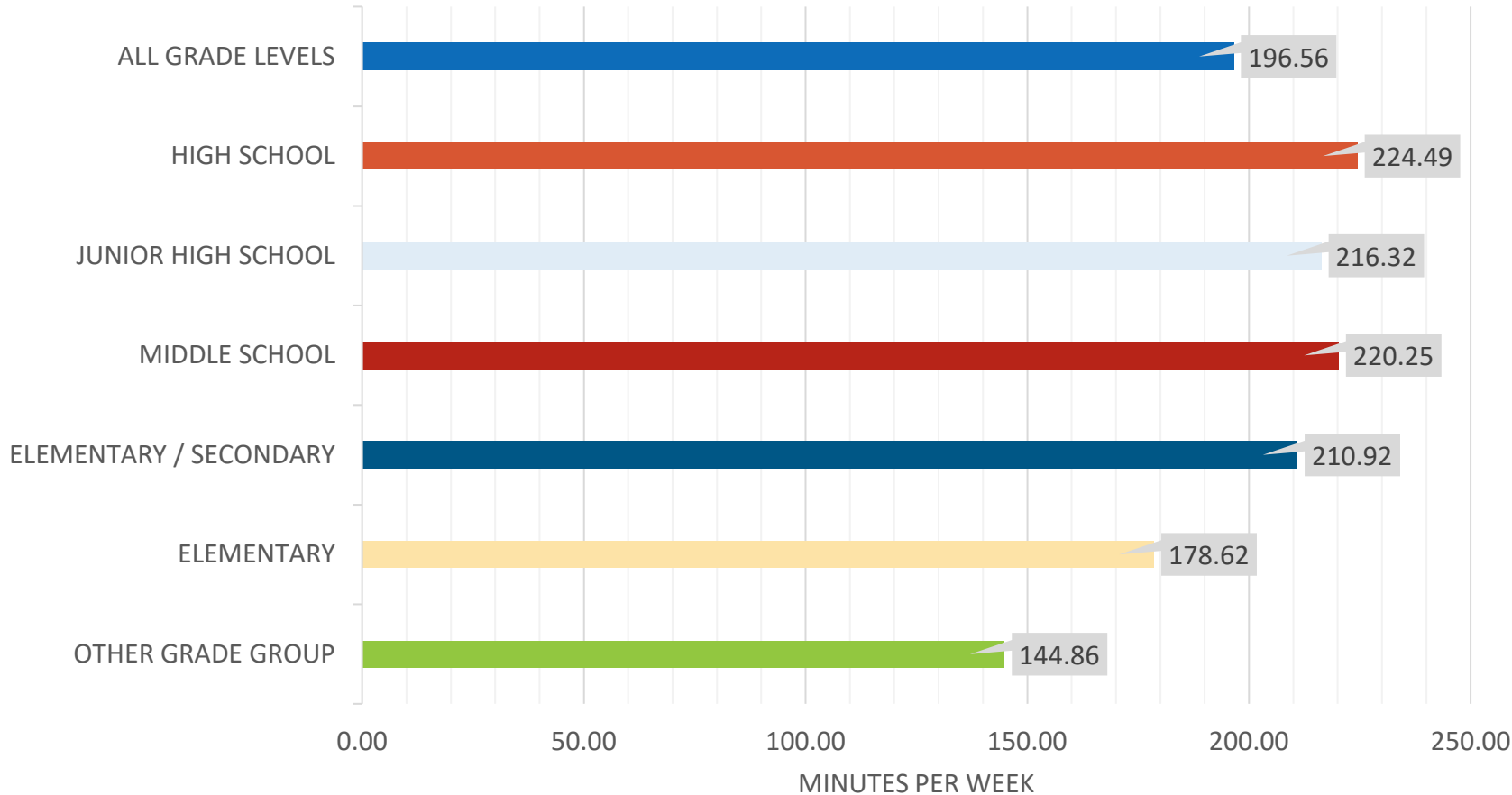

The following map shows the top ten campuses per type with the highest average number of P.E. minutes offered per week.

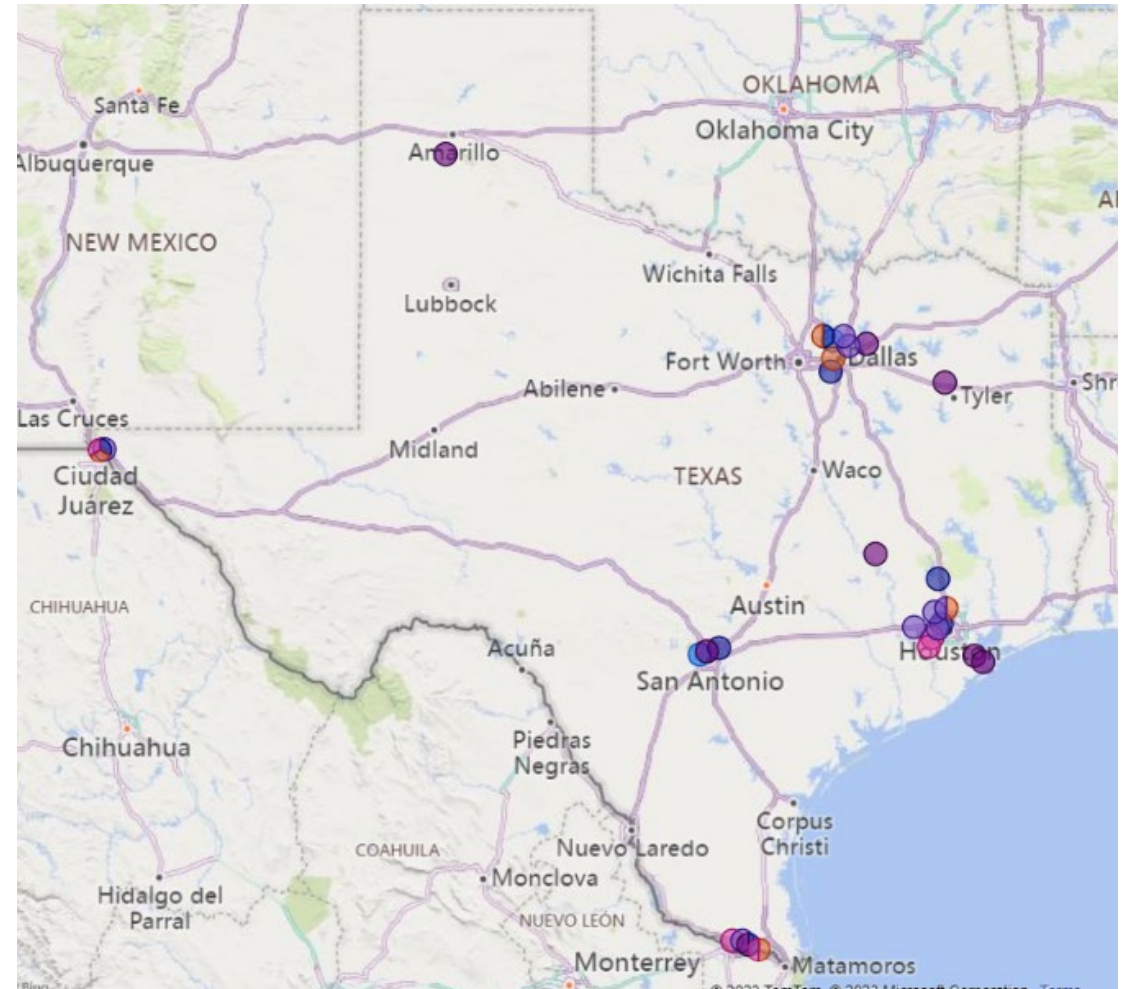

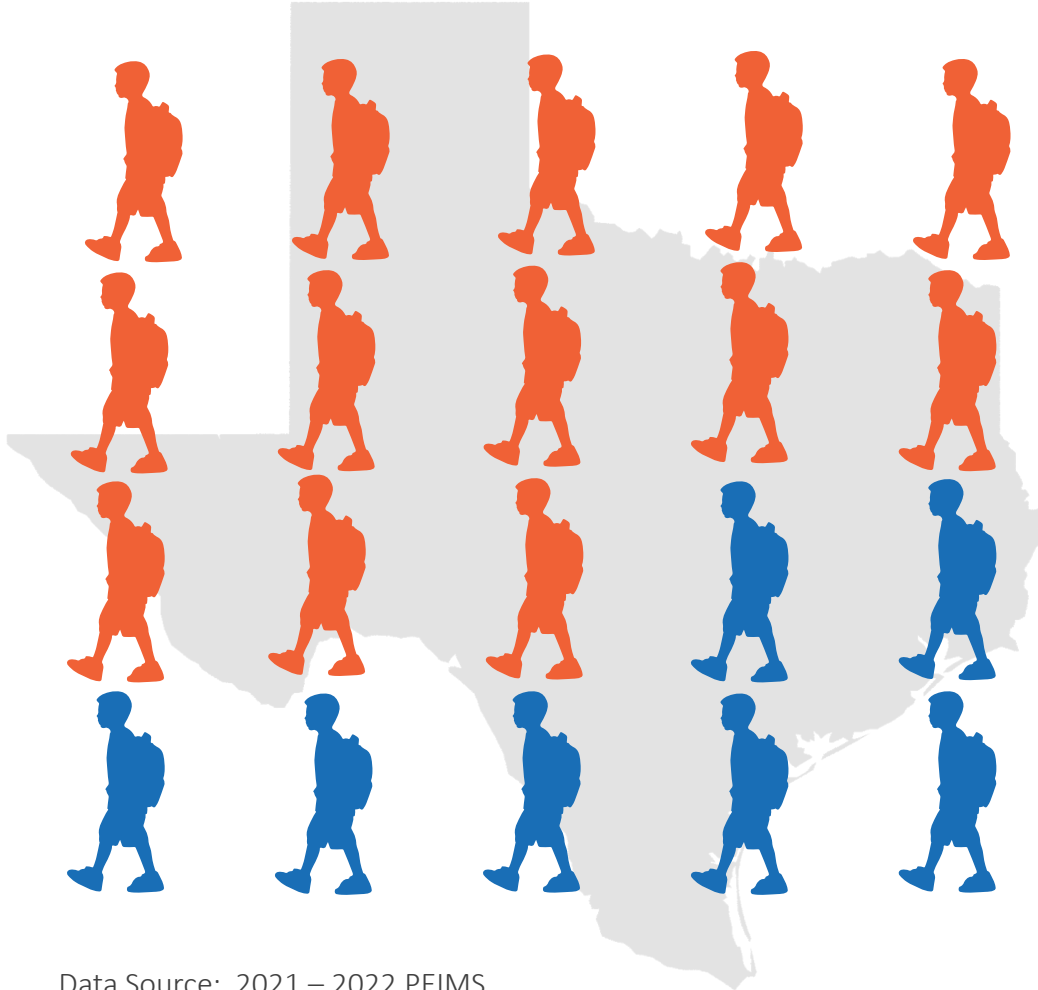

LEAs with the highest ratio of P.E. enrollment versus total LEA enrollment



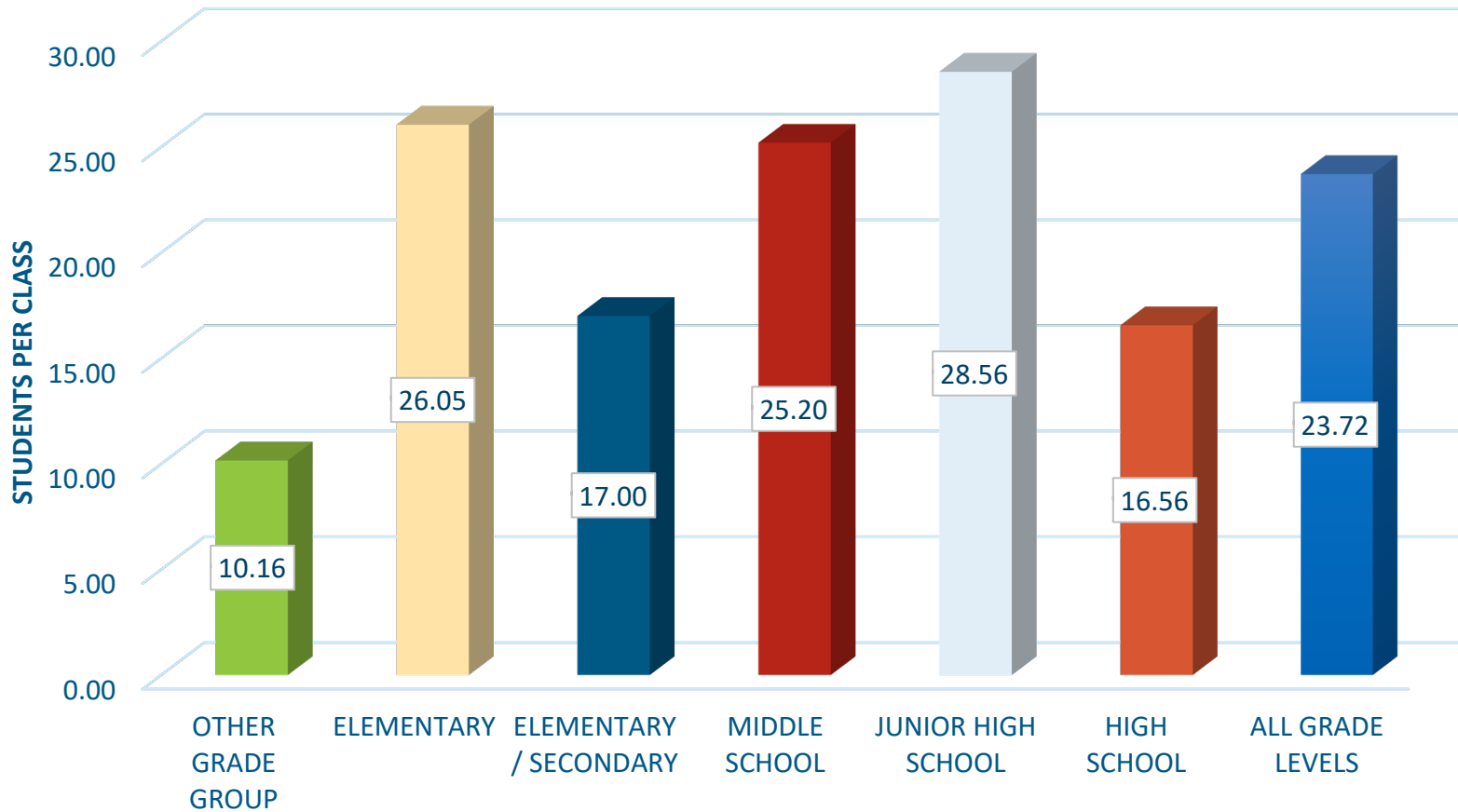

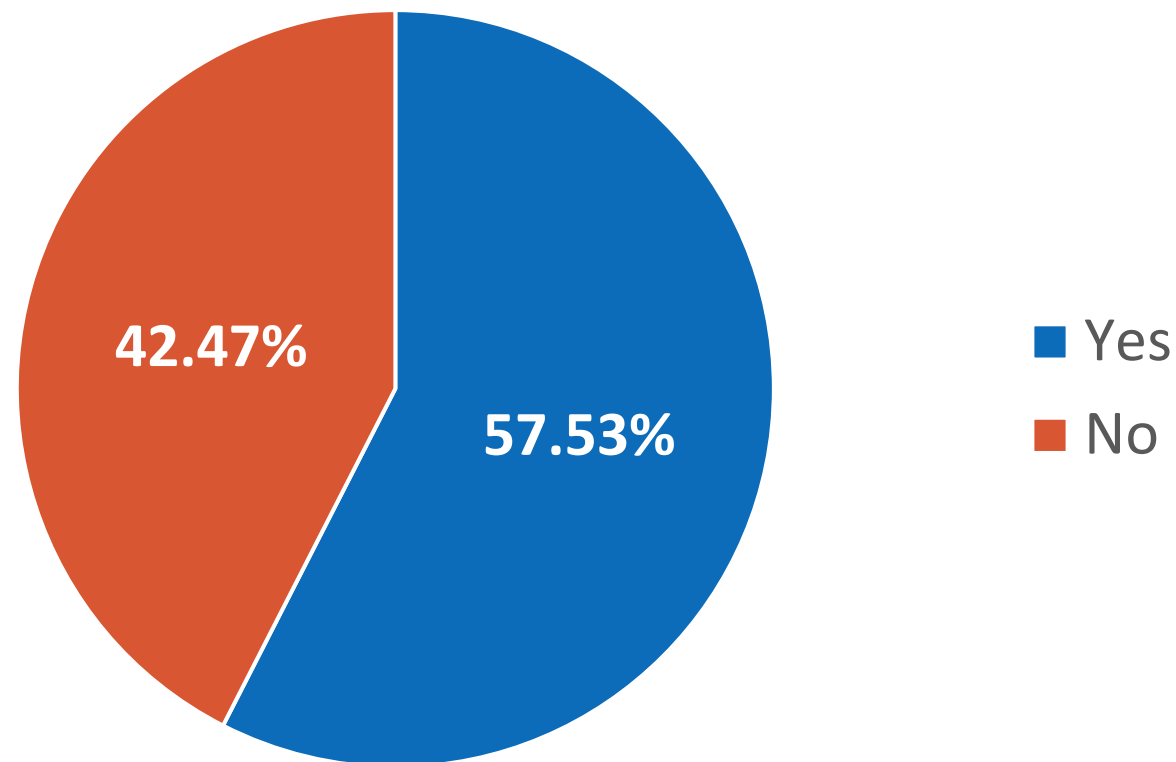

**A *standard certificate* is issued to an individual who has met all requirements for this class of certification.

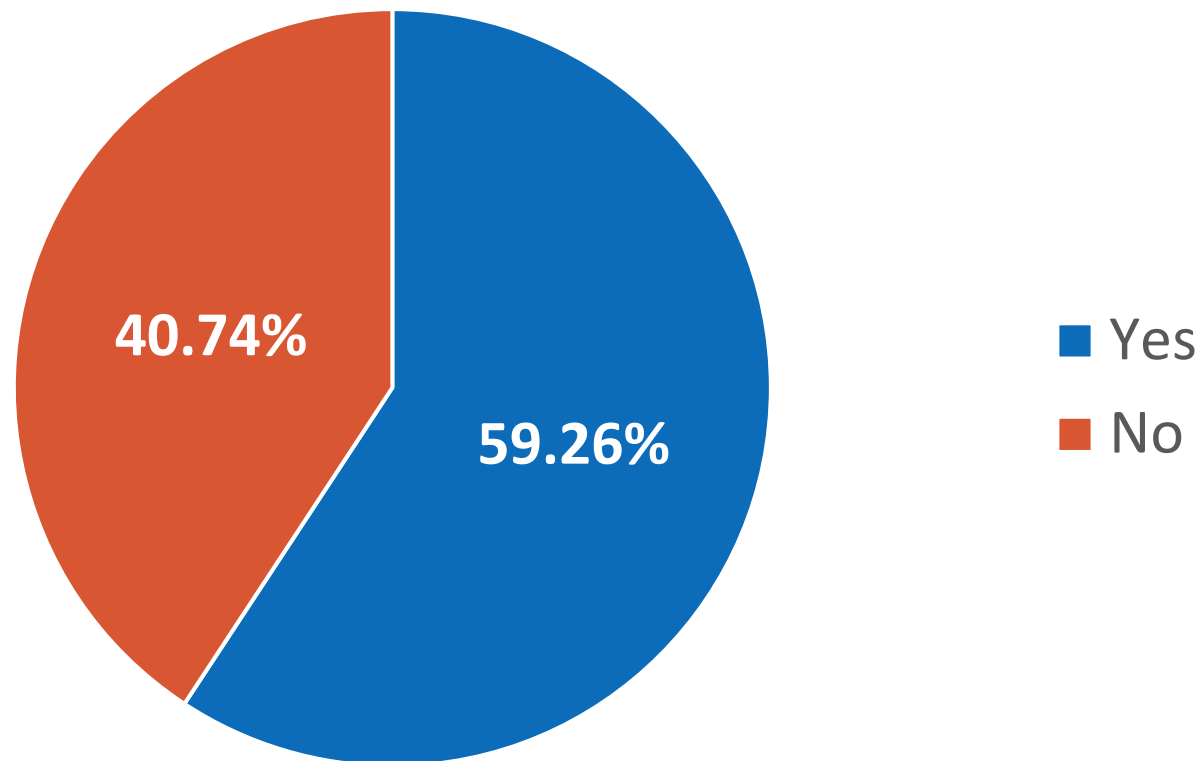
Percent of teachers licensed, certified, or endorsed to teach P. E.



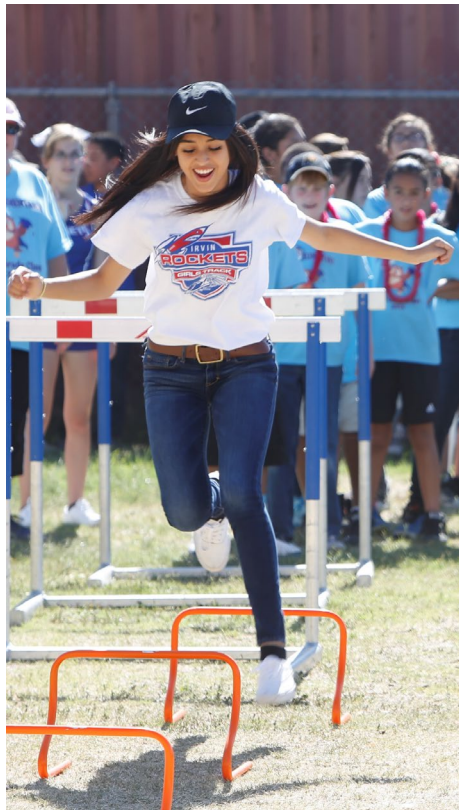
18,751 of 28,275 P. E. teachers, or 59.26%, have standard certifications.

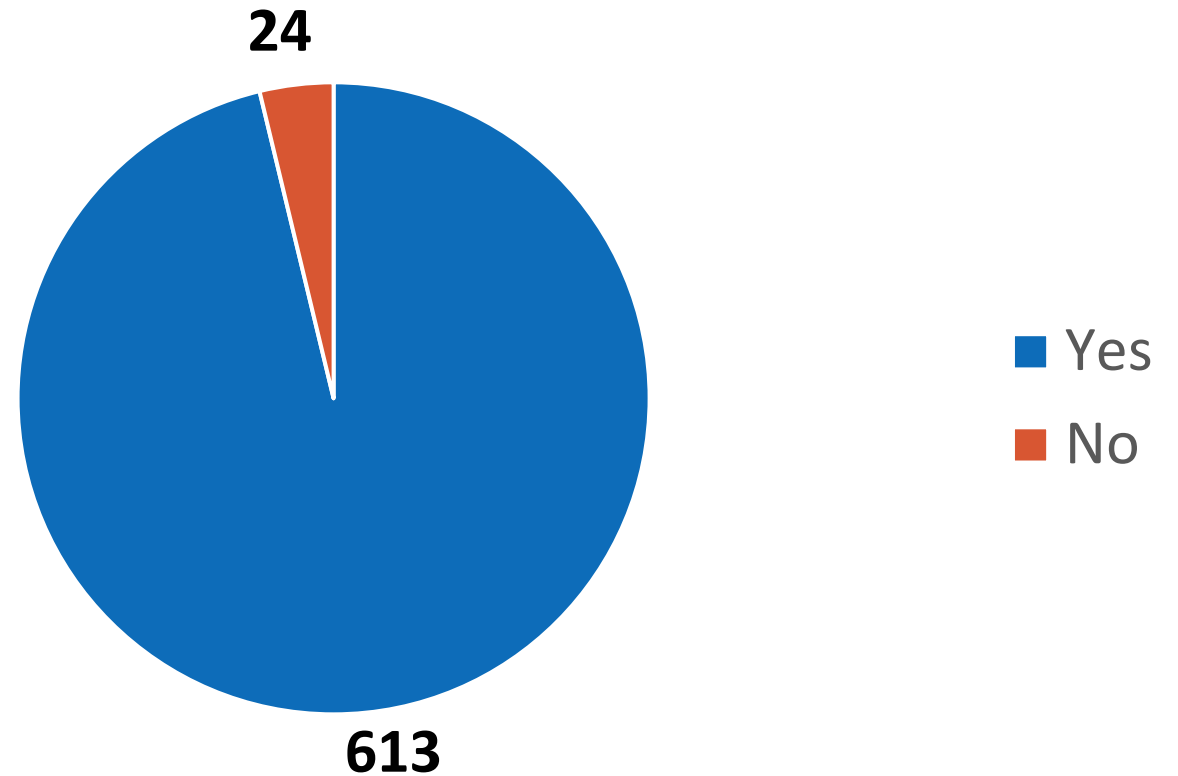
Teachers licensed, certified, or endorsed by an accredited teacher preparation program to teach P. E.



96% of LEAs report their campuses **have appropriate equipment and adequate facilities** for students to engage in the required amount and intensity of physical activity.



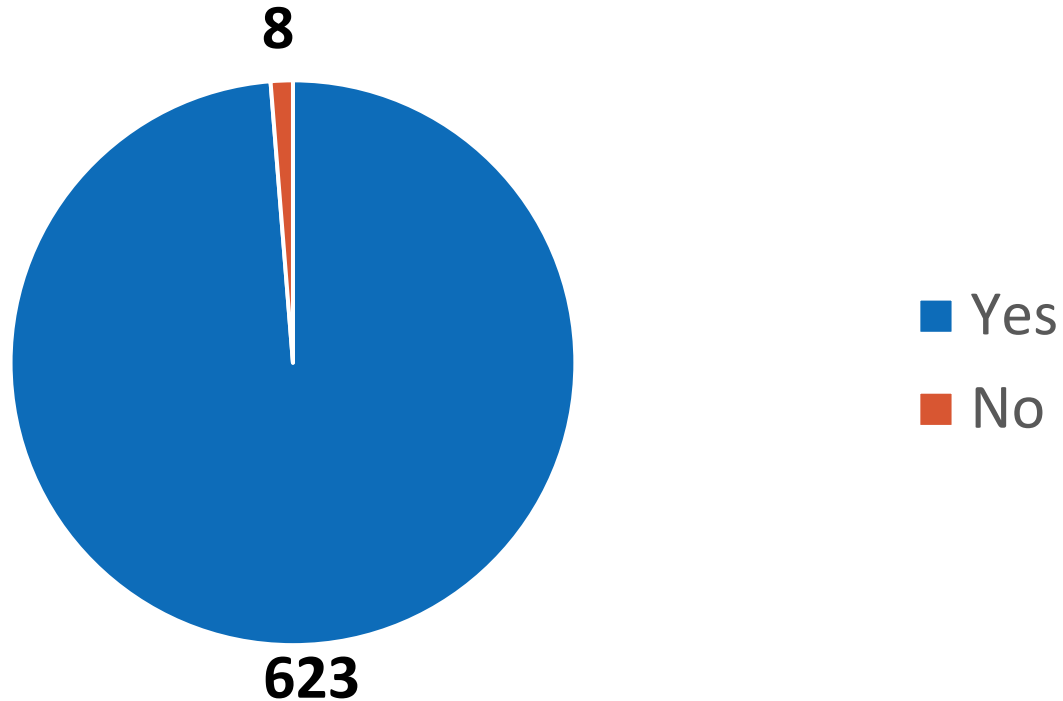
LEAs report having appropriate equipment and adequate facilities

LEAs allow for modifications or accommodations to meet the needs of students with disabilities

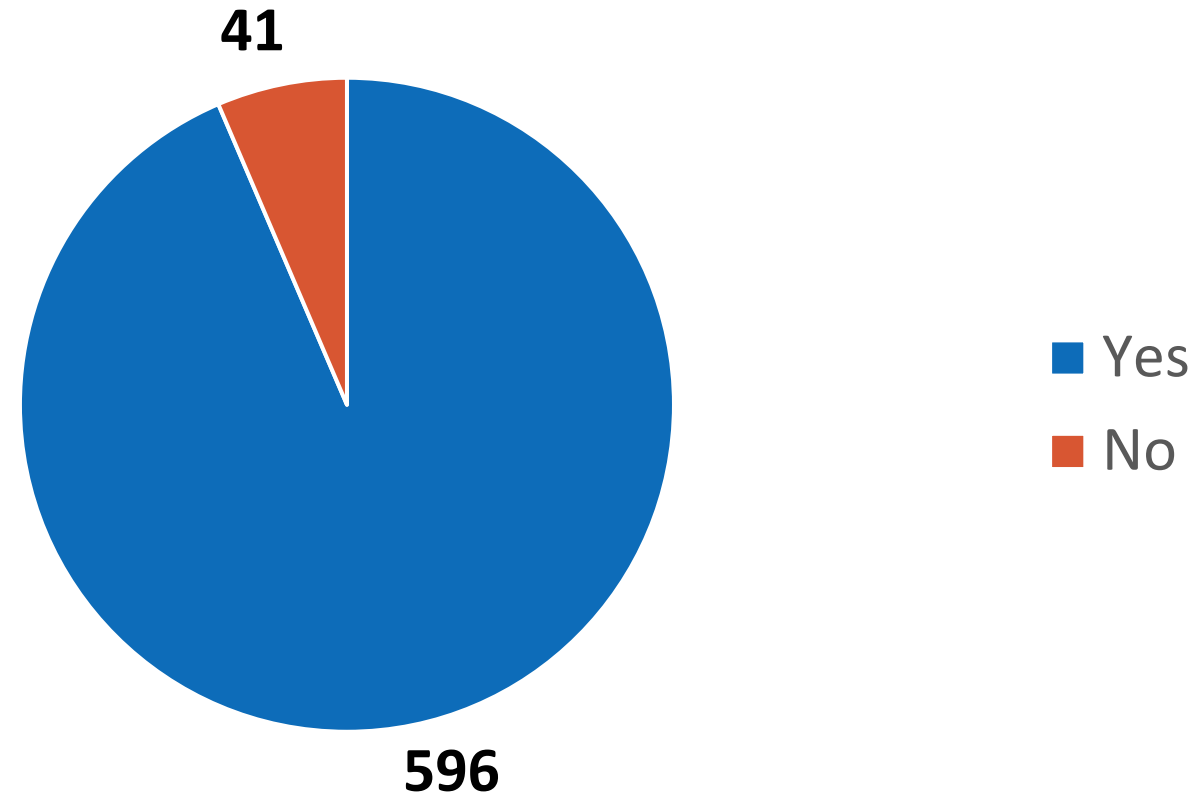
