School Improvement Grants, authorized under section 1003(g) of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (Title I or ESEA) as amended by ARRA, are grants, through the Texas Education Agency, to local educational agencies (LEAs) for use in Title I schools identified for improvement, corrective action, or restructuring and other eligible campuses that demonstrate the greatest need for the funds and the strongest commitment to use the funds to provide adequate resources in order to raise substantially the achievement of their students so as to enable the schools to make adequate yearly progress and exit improvement status. Under the final requirements, as amended through the interim final requirements published in the Federal Register in January 2010 school improvement funds are to be focused on each State's "Tier I" and "Tier II" schools.

Tier I schools are a State's persistently lowest-achieving Title I schools in improvement, corrective action, or restructuring and certain Title I eligible elementary schools that are as low achieving as the State's other Tier I schools. Tier II schools are a State's persistently-lowest achieving secondary schools that are eligible for, but do not receive, Title I, Part A funds and certain additional Title I eligible secondary schools that are as low achieving as the State's other Tier II schools or that have had a graduation rate below 60 percent over a number of years. An LEA may also use school improvement funds in Title I schools in improvement, corrective action, or restructuring that are not identified as persistently lowest-achieving schools and certain additional Title I eligible schools ("Tier III schools").

In the Tier I and Tier II schools an LEA chooses to serve, the LEA must implement one of four school intervention models: turnaround model, restart model, school closure, or transformation model.

Allowable Activities

Tier I and Tier II Grantees

- Grantees must expend grant funds for the required activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for the permissible activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for other school improvement activities deemed needed to address identified needs not addressed by the intervention model selected.

Tier III Grantees

- Tier III grantees may select one of the four intervention models in the federal regulations or the state's Tier III Transformation Model.
- If selecting one of the four models in the federal regulations, grantees must expend grant funds for the required activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations. Grantees may expend grant funds for the permissible activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for other school improvement activities deemed needed to address identified needs not addressed by the intervention model selected.

In addition, a Tier I, Tier II, Tier III grantee campus that has implemented, in whole or in part, either the Turnaround, Restart, or Transformation models within the last two years may continue or complete the implementation of the intervention model with the TTIPS grant funds. For example, if a grantee campus has replaced its principal within the last two years, the LEA/campus will not be required to hire another new principal. An LEA/campus that receives TTIPS SIG funds in accordance with this flexibility must fully implement the selected model as required by the final federal requirements. In other words, if the school had been implementing the model only in part, it must use the funds it receives to expand its implementation so that it fully complies with the federal regulatory requirements.

The detailed required and permissible activities for each intervention model, as defined in the final federal regulations are listed on Schedule #4—Program Requirements and are incorporated by reference herein.

Sheldon ISD is committed to providing tutorial assistance to students from low-income families, Bilingual/ESL, students with disabilities, and struggling students to ensure their success. These supplemental, academic enrichment, and intervention services will be provided in addition to instruction provided during the school day. Students participating in the program will focus on skills and objectives in the areas of Reading, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies. The instruction provided to each student is specifically designed to increase the academic achievement of eligible students on the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) and to assist students in attaining proficiency in meeting the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) academic standards. Individual Academic Plans will drive the instruction provided to each student. An eighth period will be created to provide tutoring after school from 1 1/2 to 2 hours four days a week. Campus facilities are being utilized to ensure that all students will have the opportunity to benefit from these services. Transportation will be provided to students participating in the program after school hours. This will eliminate the barrier of parents making additional arrangements for after school transportation. The program will extend during the month of June and July.

The instructors to assist with the delivery of instruction are highly qualified teachers employed by the Sheldon Independent School District. The instructors will complete an application process requiring a mininum of three (3) years teaching experience in the content area in which instruction is to be delivered. The teacher must exhibit excellent classroom/time management skills, communication skills, and success in overall student academic performance during their teaching career. The teachers will attend additional training to enhance the academic program.

Campus administrators, princpals, and assistant principals, will participate in professional development to increase their skills in the areas of building leadership capacity, using technology to support curriculum and instruction, teacher observation and support systems, coaching, and facilitation training. This process will assist in building leadership capacity that will create learning organizations that promote student achievement and sustain educational outcomes.

To guide the improvement of student performance, the campus annually develops and/or revises the campus improvement plan through the means of the campus site-based team known as the "Representative Council." The sitebased team includes teachers, staff, principal, parent(s), and a community member. The site-based team helps to develop, review, and revise the campus improvement plan for the purpose of improving student performance for all student populations, including all special needs populations, low socio-economic students, Bilingual/ESL, etc. based on the Academic Excellence Indicators System (AEIS). The planning process is guided by established board policy. The site-base team collaborates throughout the school year to discuss the goals, objectives, and strategies included in the campus improvement plan. Data is collected to assist in determining the strengths and weaknesses based on the information reviewed. The programs/strategies listed in the campus plan were reviewed using and evaluation process to determine its effectiveness toward academic improvement. The efforts of this process assesses the academic achievement of all students, determine which goals were met, identifies resources and staff needed to implement the plan, sets timelines for reaching the goals, measures progress, provides activities to encourage parental involvement, includes goals and methods for violence and intervention on campus, and establishes the performance goals for the following year. An end of the year survey was completed by staff, students, and parents to solicit their views and expectations of the campus program. As a result of this process, the campus goals and expectations are revised and shared with the entire staff for additional feedback prior to finalizing the plan. The final plan is submitted to the Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction for review. Upon the approval from the Assistant Superintendent, the Campus Improvement Plan will be presented to the Sheldon ISD School Board for final approval. Since the Campus Improvement Plan is a living document, the campus site-based team will continue to meet throughout the school year to review and revise the strategies and activities to ensure all goals are achieved.

Currently, a mentoring program is in place to support the needs of new teachers as they embark upon the process of the teaching learning process. This program will support the grant in an effort to ensure that new teachers are provided the necessary support for their first two years of teaching in Sheldon ISD. This program supports the concept of recruiting and retaining teachers at the high school level. The lead mentor on campus will participate in collective dialogue with the new teachers on a monthly basis to determine if their needs are met and to identify concerns that need to be address to increase their ability to improve student acquisition of knowledge among the students within their class. Based on the collected data, the campus administrators and the lead mentor will discuss the concerns of the newest teachers to campus. These teachers are usually the ones who experience the greatest challenges during their first year. This process will identify professional development needs and/or topics of discussion to take place within team and subject planning meetings. This process will assist in establishing a health environment that can create a positive climate among teachers and administrators which can have an impact on students.

Implementing the Transformation model requires the evaluation of the current principal and to determine if the principal needs to be replaced. The campus faced restructuring two years ago while in school improvement. The principal was removed at that time. The current principal has been in place for two years as of June 2010. The campus has achieved significant gains as a result of his leadership and his ability to work with campus teams to promote academic success. The challenge the high school faces now is sustaining the current system to continue to achieve academic improvement.

Currently, the district has the capacity to support the requirements and established parameters to implement the required activities and components of this grant application. The Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction and the Coordinator of Compliance and Grants will assist in monitoring and evaluating the implementation of the grant over the three year implementation period. Support will be provided to ensure all guidelines and provisions are adhered to as established by the grantor in a timely manner.

There is a formal and informal process in place to support and evaluate the effectiveness of quality instruction on campus. Also, instructional coaches are present on campus to ensure that the campus meets the instructional goals outlined in the campus plan as well as denoted in the grant and to assist teachers with the delivery of instruction.

Measures to improve student performance are currently in place such as a data-disaggregation process and C-Scope which is a comprehensive aligned curriculum for grades K-12. These elements are used to evaluate student results and to determine viable courses of action to correct and adjust errant student performance.

The district currently implements an ongoing professional development program to ensure quality instruction. For example, one of the recurring sessions entails cultural diversity training to ensure that each educator is aware of the most effective methods to deliver quality instruction to the student population. Additionally, each educator receives training in the use of new technology and how to implement it in the classroom. Moreover, strategies to differentiate instruction to meet the individual needs of each student are also offered. Some of the technology resources available to support the teaching process are LCD projectors, document cameras, student computers, student response systems, and audio enhancement systems.

The district purchased software to provide educators with the necessary resources to evaluate student data. Once data analysis has been completed, instructional coaches meet with instructional staff to ensure pacing and schedules are aligned with critical student needs. This flexibility allows for collaborative staff planning and implementation. This data-analysis is used to drive effective instructional planning.

Parent coaching meetings are facilitated throughout the school year to inform parents about the most effective means of assisting their children at home with their academic needs. We utilize a variety of media to communicate with parents about available academic resources such as an automated telephone response system, notes, and postings on district and campus web sites in both English and Spanish.

Organized student and community activities are available such as Student Council and the Superintendent's Cabinet of Student Leaders which serve as a student advisory committee to the superintendent on matters concerning the student body.

Next, the campus site-based team consisting of all stakeholders met and conferred about the potential of employing the parameters of this grant application and the proposed program acknowledged by the grantee.

The following data was shared to justify the need for the TTIPS grant:

AYP Data for the last 3 years has shown the math scores for 10th grade have been low.

The 2008-2009 report states 60% of 10th grade students passed math; 60% of African American students passed math; 59% of Hispanic students passed math; 65% of White students passed math and 61% of Economically Disadvantage students passed math. The data for this year indicates that all demographic populations met the standard.

TPM data results for 2008-2009 indicate 75% of tenth grade students met the standard; 73% of African Americans met the standard, 75% of Hispanic students met the standard, 77% of White students met the standard and 78% of Economically Disadvantage students met the standards.

The 2007-08 report states 52% of 10th grade math students passed math; 46% of African American students passed math; 52% of Hispanic students passed math; 58% of White students passed math.

The 2006-07 report states 52% of the 10th grade students passed math; the report also indicated that 47% of Hispanic students met standard. Both sets of data indicate that all demographic populations are not meeting the state standard.

AEIS data indicates low math trends over several previous years with data among the demographic populations falling below the 50% standard. The 2008-2009 report indicates significant improvement in math scores among all demographic populations.

The data presented clearly identifies a need to provide additional assistance to ensure continuous student performance at the high school campus.

The instruction provided to each student is specifically designed to increase the academic achievement of eligible students on the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) and to assist students in attaining proficiency in meeting the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) academic standards. The plan will also help improve student performance for all student populations, including all special needs populations, based on the Academic Excellence Indicators System (AEIS). The campus will continue to receive Title I funds (federal funds) and state compensatory funds to support intervention activities conducted during the regular school day. These funds will support the efforts of the campus in meeting all expectations established by the campus site-based and the TTIPS Grant committee. Title II funds (federal funds) will support the campus by continuing to provide professional development for administrators and teachers in the areas of technology applications and strategies for improving teaching and learning.

Furthermore, the district has established a Response To Intervention Model to assist in identifying students in need of assistance regarding academic and/or behavioral concerns.

One of the major focuses of RtI is to intervene early in a child's education in order to prevent failure. RtI is a systemic approach to address the needs of all students. It is a process by which a continuum of services is provided and includes:

- High quality instruction and scientific, research-based, tiered intervention strategies aligned with individual student need;
- Frequent monitoring of student progress to make results-based academic or behavioral decisions;
- Data-based school improvement;
- The application of student response data to important educational decisions; and
- A coordinated effort between general and special educators in developing and implementing the process.

This model is being extended to all campuses. C. E. King High School campus student body is divided into four academies. An Assistant Principal, known as the "Academy Principal" is assigned to each academy with the responsibility of monitoring the academic progress of the students assigned to their academy from ninth grade through twelfth grade. The philosophy of the academies is to create a school within a school where the needs of teachers and students are closely monitored in an effort to achieve overall goals and expectations. Through this approach, the RtI progress becomes more seamless. Conversations regarding student progress is tracked and monitored by the Academy Principal and documented year after year allowing the opportunity to visit data over time for each student to meet their individual needs. The goal is not to allow a student to "fall between the cracks." This process also allows the Academy Principals to improve their skills as a leader as it improves the overall communication among all stakeholders.

In order to improve this process at this high school, the district Coordinator of Special Education Instructional Services is continually monitoring the implementation process of RtI on each campus. The recommendation for the high school teams is to expand the data collection process so that students in need of assistance are identified before failure is experienced.

This is an on-going process that will be continuously monitored to improve student performance.

The district is committed to providing alternative programs and instructional strategies to supplement instruction provided by the general curriculum and to assist students in meeting the state learning standards. This additional support will be provided utilizing a variety of strategies. This district selection regarding an intervention model must provide assistance to students who are at risk of not achieving the state standards and/or district designated performance levels in English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and/or Social Studies. The intervention model shall be made available to all students experiencing academic difficulties which include students with disabilities, English Language Learners, etc. The model must include processes for on-going monitoring and supportive feedback, parental involvement opportunity, time set aside for collaboration for teachers and administrators, sustain support from identified staff at the central office level, and external technical support. An external program evaluation process will be expected to be conducted yearly during the three year implementation process.

Sheldon ISD is a small district with an enrollment is approximately 6,570 students. The demographic population is 64% Hispanic, 22% African American, 12% White, and 2% other. This district believes the single most important factor for student success is direct classroom instruction. However, students who struggle should be afforded appropriate and targeted opportunities for academic assistance and intervention. The plan of action for each student in need of assistance should be based on data analysis of multiple measures to they may be successful in meeting state and district standards.

The Student Intervention Model (SIM) will be the model established by the district based on the following criteria:

- 1. Differentiated instruction that supplements the general curriculum (regular classroom instruction); and/or
- 2. Student support services needed to address barriers to improved academic performance.

The services provided by the SIM will be provided to students in grades 9-12 in all four content areas listed above. Students in grades 9-12 will be considered for SIM if:

- 1. They do not pass TAKS in any designated content area for a given grade level;
- 2. They score below the required standards on a given curriculum based assessment (CBA).

The district will review the following data to determine which students will participate in SIM as well as to monitor and track student overall performance on a quarterly basis:

- 1. Pre-post assessments
- 2. Report Card Grades less than 75% in reading, mathematics, science, and/or social studies
- 3. Formative assessments
- 4. TAKS assessments
- 5. Other valid, reliable assessments necessary to monitor student progress and overall performance

Data reviewed based on classroom performance:

- 1. Participation and Class Work
- 2. Report Card Grades
- 3. Authentic Assessments
- 4. Student Records

5. Teacher input regarding student needs

Student entrance criterion:

A student will be considered for entrance into SIM if a review of data indicates that a student is at risk of not meeting state standards.

Student exit criterion:

A student will be consider not in need of SIM assistance if a review of data indicates a student is likely to meet state standards.

The SIM will offer additional time for focused instruction and staff/scheduling to increase student-teacher instructional contact time. Intervention strategies to enhance student performance will include differentiated instructional methods, modified student performance products, and progress monitoring. This model will provide support services for students through interaction with the campus counselors. The student support services will include establishing study skills, attendance improvement, referral for community agency support as eligible, guidance, etc.

Through the SIM, a range of academic intervention processes will be available such as extended day instructional time. This additional time is a mandatory eighth period providing transportation for all students, co-teaching, individualized instruction, small group instruction during the regular school day and after school, computer assisted instruction, and reduced student to teacher ratio. Laptop computers will be purchased to support the implementation of the software programs.

The primary focus for the SIM is to increase the use of academic vocabulary, active student engagement, grouping, and problem-solving. Other strategies will include flexible grouping, assisted note-taking, data analysis, common assessments, using grading rubrics, graphic organizers, and other manipulatives for learning. Professional development will be on-going for all instructional staff to increase the quality of teaching and learning.

Graphing calculators will be provided to prepare at risk students for the Math exam. Transition programs will be implemented to support incoming ninth graders from the middle school. The Sheldon SIM will provide academic intervention as an additional summer program to afford students the opportunity to gain credit for courses failed during the regular school year.

The district/campus will monitor attendance and discipline data to improve the overall climate on the campus as well as to address individual concerns in each area. Additional support will be provided through the use of a Truancy Officer for four hours a day to assist in following up on attendance issues.

The SIM will identify academic deficiencies in the areas of English Language Arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. Decisions related to the frequency, intensity, duration, and method of service will be based upon individual student needs. Administrators, classroom teachers, support personnel, and parents will work collaboratively to make appropriate educational decision for all students. The TTIPS committee will be responsible for the on-going monitoring and review process of the SIM. Quarterly reports will be provided by the TEA technical support team. The Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction will be responsible for communicating all report findings to the Superintendent.

A Sheldon SIM coordinator will be made available to facilitate all components of the program, monitor progress of the program, maintain documentation of student progress, assist in facilitating TTIPS committee meetings, and consult twice a month with the District Shepherd in an effort to maintain the integrity of the program as designed.

The Sheldon SIM will be a means of decreasing the number of students referred to the Response to Intervention (RtI) committee for academic and/or behavioral concerns.

Student progress reports will document the progress of all students receiving services by the Sheldon SIM. A copy of these reports will be sent home to parents, at least quarterly, to describe the nature and intensity of the service provided, how the service was delivered, who provided the instruction, and the reason for continuation or discontinuation of the Sheldon SIM. The student(s) will no longer be required to receive services by the Sheldon SIM when they have successfully attained the district standards according to state and/or district criteria. Parent conferences will be requested for students not demonstrating adequate progress within an appropriate time period while participating in the Sheldon SIM. The program coordinator and the teachers participating in the SIM will work together to ensure all communication with parents is conducted in a timely manner.

The principal and/or program coordinator will be responsible for parent notification indicating a need for their child to participate in the Sheldon SIM. This notification will be made in writing and will include a summary of the services to be provided to the student and where and when it will be provided. The letter will also include the consequences of their student not achieving the state/district standards.

Goals will be established by the TTIPS committee based on TAKS data from the past three years such as

- Eighty percent of all students in all student populations will pass Math TAKS (2010-2011).
- Ninety-five percent of all students in all student populations will pass English TAKS (2010-2011).
- Eighty percent of all students in all student populations will pass Science TAKS (2010-2011)
- Maintain ninety-five plus percent for all students in all student populations passing the Social Studies TAKS (2010-2011)
- Increase graduation rate by three percent each school year during the duration of the grant.

Staff incentives and rewards will be disseminated to all qualifying staff members based on overall goals met by the campus. Incentive pay for staff members will be disseminated based on the following:

If all goals are achieved as stated above all certified professional staff members will receive a bonus amount of \$6,000, Instructional Para-professional staff will receive \$2,000, and Managerial Para-professional staff (included the nurse) will receive \$1,000.00. The funds will be awarded yearly during the duration of the grant period.

The district established measureable goals to be attained as a result of the grant implementation process. The TTIPS Grant committee will be responsible for reviewing the end of year evaluation reports provided by the SIRC technical management team along with other pertinent data provided by the Sheldon SIM. The committee will use the SWOT analysis process (Strength, Weaknesses, Obstacles, and Targets) to evaluate the intervention program yearly to identify areas requiring improvement as well as areas that are producing positive results. The SWOT analysis process will steer the dialogue of the team to focus on components of the grant producing positive results identified through an increase in student achievement. The team will also determine if there are obstacles preventing progress and to identify whether or not the team has control over these obstacles. Lastly, the team will decide on the targets to be incorporated as a result of the findings. This process has proven to be effective in driving courageous conversations that will lead the team to strive to meet goals and expectations that are realistic and attainable.

The campus site-base team will also review information provided by campus site visits, snapshots, and transformation specialist to ensure program quality. This process will take place at the end of each reporting period.

Sheldon ISD is a small district with an enrollment of approximately 6,500 students. The demographic population consists of 64% Hispanic, 22% African American, 12% White, and 2% other. This district believes the single most important factor for student success is direct classroom instruction. However, students who struggle should be afforded appropriate and targeted opportunities for academic assistance and intervention. The plan of action for each student in need of assistance should be based on data analysis of multiple measures so they may be successful in meeting state and district standards.

Sheldon has only one high school servicing all students 9-12. For the past five years, the campus has been in school improvement striving to identify reform strategies to improve student performance. The campus has had four different principals over the past ten years reflecting a lack of consistence in program implementation and the absence of systemic planning. The current principal has been leading the high school for two years including the 2009-2010 school year. Under the current principal's leadership, significant gains were identified in certain areas. The goal is to continue to implement strategies that have proven successful for the past two years. As a result, the campus site-based team collaborates regularly to review the campus plan and the activities identified to improve student performance.

The campus site-based team assist in the development of campus goals that are measurable in order to ensure an increase in student performance on a yearly basis. The site-based team meets at least four times during the school year to review goals and expectations in order to identify the strengths and weaknesses of programs and strategies identified for school improvement. Once the team reviews qualitative and quantitative data, student performance goals are established matching appropriate activities and strategies to assist in accomplishing the desired goal of improving the instructional program on campus. The implementation of the plan is monitored throughout the year by the site-based team and adjustments are made and executed in an effort to promote positive results among all demographic populations. A final draft copy of the plan is submitted to the Assistant Superintendent of Instructional Services for final review and approval prior to seeking the school board's approval.

Goals were established using the following process:

- 1. Review testing data over a period of two years such as TAKS data, report card data, attendance, discipline, graduation rate, dropout rate, etc.
- 2. Revisit activities listed in campus plan to determine if positive results were attained.
- 3. Recommendation from the site-based team on which activities to keep, remove, or tweak.
- 4. The team works in groups to review the data and develop some overall conclusions.
- 5. The information is shared with the administrative team on campus and recommendations are made as a result of the data analysis process.
- 6. Goals are established with activities and resources identified to assist in attaining the desired goals.
- 7. A timeline is created to monitor implementation and progress
- 8. The revised plan is developed and sent to the Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction for final review prior to submitting to the school board.

- A. Terms defined: As used in these Provisions and Assurances,
 - Contract means the entire document, and all of TEA's attachments, appendices, schedules (including but not limited to the General Provisions and the Special Provisions), amendments and extensions of or to the Standard Contract;
 - Agency or TEA means the Texas Education Agency;
 - Contractor means the party or parties to this contract other than Agency; including its or their officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives, consultants and subcontractors, and subcontractors' officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives and consultants;
 - Project Administrator means the person representing Agency or Contractor, as indicated by the contract, for the purposes of administering the contract project;
 - Contract Project means the purpose intended to be achieved through the contract of which these Provisions and Assurances are a part;
 - Applicant means the same as Contractor;
 - SAS means the Standard Application System of which the application document is a part;
 - "Application" means the entire package submitted by the Applicant including the schedules contained in the application and so indicated on the General Information page of the application package;
 - Amendment means an application that is revised in budget categories and/or in program activities. It includes both the
 original application and any subsequent amendments; or extensions thereto;
 - Works means all tangible or intangible material, products, ideas, documents or works of authorship prepared or created by Contractor for or on behalf of TEA at any time after the beginning date of the Contract (Works includes but is not limited to computer software, data, information, images, illustrations, designs, graphics, drawings, educational materials, assessment forms, testing materials, logos, trademarks, patentable materials, etc.); and,
 - Intellectual Property Rights means the worldwide intangible legal rights or interests evidenced by or embodied in: (a) any idea, design, concept, method, process, technique, apparatus, invention, discovery, or improvement, including any patents, trade secrets, and know-how; (b) any work of authorship, including any copyrights, moral rights or neighboring rights; (c) any trademark, service mark, trade dress, trade name, or other indicia of source or origin; (d) domain name registrations; and (e) any other similar rights. The Intellectual Property Rights of a party include all worldwide intangible legal rights or interests that the party may have acquired by assignment or license with the right to grant sublicenses.
 - Grant means the same as Contract;
 - Grantee means the same as Contractor;
 - Grantor means the same as Agency; and
 - DCC means the Document Control Center of Agency.
- **B.** Contingency: This contract is executed by Agency subject to the availability of funds appropriated by legislative act for the purposes stated. All amendments and/or extensions or subsequent contracts entered into for the same or continued purposes are executed contingent upon the availability of appropriated funds. Notwithstanding any other provision in this contract or any other document, this contract is void upon appropriated funds becoming unavailable. In addition, this contract may be terminated by Agency at any time for any reason upon notice to Contractor. Expenditures and/or activities for which Contractor may claim reimbursement shall not be accrued or claimed subsequent to receipt of such notice from Agency. This contract may be extended or otherwise amended only by formal written amendment properly executed by both Agency and Contractor. No other agreement, written or oral, purporting to alter or amend this contract shall be valid.
- C. Contractor's Application: Furnished to Agency in response to a request for application, is incorporated in this contract by reference for all necessary purposes. It is specifically provided, however, that the provisions of this contract shall prevail in all cases of conflict arising from the terms of Contractor's application whether such application is a written part of this contract or is attached as a separate document.
- **D. Requirements, Terms, Conditions, and Assurances:** Which are stated in the Request for Application, in response to which Applicant is submitting this application, are incorporated herein by reference for all purposes although the current General Provisions shall prevail in the event of conflict. The instructions to the Standard Application System, as well as the General and Fiscal Guidelines and Program Guidelines, are incorporated herein by reference.

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- E. Signature Authority; Final Expression; Superseding Document: Applicant certifies that the person signing this application has been properly delegated this authority. The Contract represents the final and complete expression of the terms of agreement between the parties. The Contract supersedes any previous understandings or negotiations between the parties. Any representations, oral statements, promises or warranties that differ from the Contract shall have no force or effect. The Contract may be modified, amended or extended only by formal written amendment properly executed by both TEA and Contractor.
- **F. State of Texas Laws:** In the conduct of the contract project, Contractor shall be subject to Texas State Board of Education and Commissioner rules pertaining to this contract and the contract project and to the laws of the State of Texas governing this contract and the contract project. This contract constitutes the entire agreement between Agency and Contractor for the accomplishment of the contract project. This contract shall be interpreted according to the laws of the State of Texas except as may be otherwise provided for in this contract.
- **G. Monitoring**: Desk reviews or on-site monitoring reviews may be conducted by Agency to determine compliance with the approved application and the applicable statute(s), law(s), regulations, and guidelines.
- H. Sanctions for Failure to Perform or for Noncompliance: If Contractor, in Agency's sole determination, fails or refuses for any reason to comply with or perform any of its obligations under this contract, Agency may impose such sanctions as it may deem appropriate. This includes but is not limited to the withholding of payments to Contractor until Contractor complies; the cancellation, termination, or suspension of this contract in whole or in part; and the seeking of other remedies as may be provided by this contract or by law. Any cancellation, termination, or suspension of this contract, if imposed, shall become effective at the close of business on the day of Contractor's receipt of written notice thereof from Agency.
- I. Contract Cancellation, etc.: If this contract is canceled, terminated, or suspended by Agency prior to its expiration date, the reasonable monetary value of services properly performed by Contractor pursuant to this contract prior to such cancellation, termination or suspension shall be determined by Agency and paid to Contractor as soon as reasonably possible.
- J. Indemnification:
 - For local educational agencies (LEAs), regional education service centers (ESCs), and institutions of higher education (IHEs) and state agencies: Contractor, to the extent permitted by law, shall hold Agency harmless from and shall indemnify Agency against any and all claims, demands, and causes of action of whatever kind or nature asserted by any third party and occurring or in any way incident to, arising from, or in connection with, any acts of Contractor, its agents, employees, and subcontractors, done in the conduct of the contract project.
 - For all other grantees, subgrantees, contractors, and subcontractors, including nonprofit organizations and forprofit businesses: Contractor shall hold Agency harmless from and shall indemnify Agency against any and all claims, demands, and causes of action of whatever kind or nature asserted by any third party and occurring or in any way incident to, arising from, or in connection with, any acts of Contractor, its agents, employees, and subcontractors, done in the conduct of the contract project.
- K. Encumbrances/Obligations and Liquidations: All encumbrances/obligations shall occur on or between the beginning and ending dates of the contract. All goods must be received and all services rendered between the beginning and ending dates of the contract. The contractor must liquidate (record as an expenditure) all obligations (encumbrances) incurred under the contract no later than 30 days after the ending date of the contract, to coincide with the submission of the final expenditure report, due 30 days after the ending date of the contract. In no manner shall encumbrances be considered or reflected as accounts payable or as expenditures, and an encumbrance cannot be considered an expenditure or accounts payable until the goods have been received and the services have been rendered. Obligations that are liquidated and recognized as expenditures must meet the allowable cost principles in OMB Circular A-87, A-21, or A-122 (as applicable) and program rules, regulations, and guidelines contained elsewhere. This applies to all grant programs, including state and federal, discretionary and formula.

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- L. Financial Management and Accounting: Grantee assures it will maintain a financial management system that complies with federal standards established in 34 CFR 80.20 and 74.21 and that provides for accurate, current, and complete disclosure of the financial results of each grant project. The financial management system records will identify adequately the source and application of funds and will contain information pertaining to grant awards, authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, outlays (i.e., expenditures), income, and interest. Fiscal control and accounting procedures will permit the tracing of funds to a level of expenditure adequate to establish that funds have been used in accordance with the approved grant application. The applicant agrees to maintain effective control over and accountability for all funds, property, and other assets. Public school districts, open enrollment charter schools, and regional education service centers in Texas must comply with the accounting requirements in the Financial Accounting and Reporting (FAR) module of the Financial Accountability System Resource Guide).
- M. Expenditure Reports: Contractor shall submit expenditure reports in the time and manner requested by Agency as specified in the instructions to the Standard Application System (SAS) which are incorporated by reference. Unless otherwise specified, interim reports are due to TEA within 15 days after the end of each reporting period. Unless otherwise specified, the final expenditure report is due within 30 days after the ending date of the grant. Revised expenditure reports, where the grantee is claiming additional expenditures beyond that originally requested, must be submitted within 60 days after the ending date of the grant, or as specified in the applicable Program Guidelines.
- N. Refunds Due to TEA: If Agency determines that Agency is due a refund of money paid to Contractor pursuant to this contract, Contractor shall pay the money due to Agency within 30 days of Contractor's receipt of written notice that such money is due to Agency. If Contractor fails to make timely payment, Agency may obtain such money from Contractor by any means permitted by law, including but not limited to offset, counterclaim, cancellation, termination, suspension, total withholding, and/or disapproval of all or any subsequent applications for said funds.
- O. Records Retention: Contractor shall maintain its records and accounts in a manner which shall assure a full accounting for all funds received and expended by Contractor in connection with the contract project. These records and accounts shall be retained by Contractor and made available for programmatic or financial audit by Agency and by others authorized by law or regulation to make such an audit for a period of not less than five years from the date of completion of the contract project or the date of the receipt by Agency of Contractor's final claim for payment or final expenditure report in connection with this contract, whichever is later. If an audit has been announced, the records shall be retained until such audit has been completed.
 - Contractor understands that acceptance of funds under this contract acts as acceptance of the authority of the State Auditor's office, or any successor agency, to conduct an audit or investigation in connection with those funds. Contractor further agrees to cooperate fully with the State Auditor's Office or its successor in the conduct of the audit or investigation, including providing all records requested. Contractor will ensure that this clause concerning the authority to audit funds received indirectly by subcontractors through Contractor and the requirements to cooperate is included in any subcontract it awards.
- P. Time and Effort Recordkeeping: For those personnel whose salaries are prorated between or among different funding sources, time and effort records will be maintained by Applicant that will confirm the services provided within each funding source. Applicant must adjust payroll records and expenditures based on this documentation. This requirement applies to all projects, regardless of funding source, unless otherwise specified. For federally funded projects, time and effort records must be in accordance with the requirements in the applicable OMB cost principles.
- Q. Forms, Assurances, and Reports: Contractor shall timely make and file with the proper authorities all forms, assurances and reports required by federal laws and regulations. Agency shall be responsible for reporting to the proper authorities any failure by Contractor to comply with the foregoing laws and regulations coming to Agency's attention, and may deny payment or recover payments made by Agency to Contractor in the event of Contractor's failure so to comply.
- R. Intellectual Property Ownership: Contractor agrees that all Works are, upon creation, works made for hire and the sole property of TEA. If the Works are, under applicable law, not considered works made for hire, Contractor hereby assigns to TEA all worldwide ownership of all rights, including the Intellectual Property Rights, in the Works, without the necessity of any further consideration, and TEA can obtain and hold in its own name all such rights to the Works. Contractor agrees to maintain written agreements with all officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives and subcontractors engaged by Contractor for the Contract Project, granting Contractor rights sufficient to support the performance and grant of rights to TEA by Contractor. Copies of such agreements shall be provided to TEA promptly upon request.

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Contractor warrants that (i) it has the authority to grant the rights herein granted, (ii) It has not assigned or transferred any right, title, or interest to the Works or Intellectual Property Rights that would conflict with its obligations under the Contract, and Contractor will not enter into any such agreements, and (iii) the Works will be original and will not infringe any intellectual property rights of any other person or entity. These warranties will survive the termination of the Contract. If any preexisting rights are embodied in the Works, Contractor grants to TEA the irrevocable, perpetual, non-exclusive, worldwide, royalty-free right and license to (i) use, execute, reproduce, display, perform, distribute copies of, and prepare derivative works based upon such preexisting rights and any derivative works thereof and (ii) authorize others to do any or all of the foregoing. Contractor agrees to notify TEA on delivery of the Works if they include any such preexisting rights. On request, Contractor will provide TEA with documentation indicating a third party's written approval for Contractor to use any preexisting rights that may be embodied or reflected in the Works.

For School Districts and Nonprofit Organizations: The foregoing Intellectual Property Ownership provisions apply to any school districts, nonprofit organizations, and their employees, agents, representatives, consultants and subcontractors. If a school district or nonprofit organization or any of its subcontractor(s) wish to obtain a license agreement to use, advertise, offer for sale, sell, distribute, publicly display, publicly perform or reproduce the Works, or make derivative works from the Works, then express written permission must first be obtained from the TEA Copyright Office.

For Education Service Centers (ESCs): The foregoing Intellectual Property Ownership provisions apply to an Education Service Center (ESC) and its employees, agents, representatives, consultants, and subcontractors. If an ESC or any of its subcontractor(s) wish to obtain a license agreement to use, advertise, offer for sale, sell, distribute, publicly display, publicly perform or reproduce the Works, or make derivative works from the Works, then express written permission must first be obtained from the TEA Copyright Office.

For Colleges and Universities: The foregoing Intellectual Property Ownership provisions apply to any colleges and universities and their employees, agents, representatives, consultants, and subcontractors; provided, that for all Works and derivative works created or conceived by colleges or universities under the Contract, they are granted a non-exclusive, non-transferable, royalty-free license to use the Works for their own academic and educational purposes only. The license for academic and educational purposes specifically excludes advertising, offering for sale, selling, distributing, publicly displaying, publicly performing, or reproducing the Works, or making derivative works from the Works that are created or conceived under this Contract and colleges and universities and their employees, agents, representatives, consultants, and subcontractors are prohibited from engaging in these uses and activities with regard to the Works unless the prior express written permission of the TEA Copyright Office is obtained.

- **S.** Unfair Business Practices: Unfair Business Practices: By signing this Contract, Contractor, if other than a state agency, certifies that Contractor, within the preceding 12 months, has not been found guilty, in a judicial or state agency administrative proceeding, of unfair business practices. Contractor, if other than a state agency, also certifies that no officer of its company has, within the preceding 12 months, served as an officer in another company which has been found, in a judicial or state agency administrative proceeding, to be guilty of unfair business practices.
 - Contractor, whether a state agency or not a state agency, certifies that no funds provided under this Contract shall be used to purchase supplies, equipment, or services from any companies found to be guilty of unfair business practices within 12 months from the determination of guilt.
- **T. Subcontracting:** Contractor shall not assign or subcontract any of its rights or responsibilities under this contract, except as may be otherwise provided for in this application, without prior formal written amendment to this contract properly executed by both Agency and Contractor.
- Use of Consultants: Notwithstanding any other provision of this application, Applicant shall not use or pay any consultant in the conduct of this application if the services to be rendered by any such consultant can be provided by Applicant's employees.
- V. Capital Outlay: If Contractor purchases capital outlay (furniture and/or equipment) to accomplish the objective(s) of the project, title will remain with Contractor for the period of the contract. Agency reserves the right to transfer capital outlay items for contract noncompliance during the contract period or as needed after the ending date of the contract. This provision applies to any and all furniture and/or equipment regardless of unit price and how the item is classified in Contractor's accounting record.

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- W. Agency Property (terms): In the event of loss, damage or destruction of any property owned by or loaned by Agency while in the custody or control of Contractor, its employees, agents, consultants or subcontractors, Contractor shall indemnify Agency and pay to Agency the full value of or the full cost of repair or replacement of such property, whichever is the greater, within 30 days of Contractor's receipt of written notice of Agency's determination of the amount due. This applies whether the property is developed or purchased by Contractor pursuant to this contract or is provided by Agency to Contractor for use in the contract project. If Contractor fails to make timely payment, Agency may obtain such money from Contractor by any means permitted by law, including but not limited to offset or counterclaim against any money otherwise due to Contractor by Agency.
- X. Travel Costs: Amounts authorized for maximum recovery for travel and per diem costs against any state or federal funding source are restricted to those amounts which are approved in the State of Texas Appropriations Bill in effect for the particular funding period. Any amount over this limit must come from local funding sources. Applicant must recover funds at a lesser rate if local policy amounts are less than the maximum allowed by the state. Out-of-state travel may not exceed the federal government rate for the locale. Travel allowances are not allowable costs.
- Y. Funds for Religious Worship, Instruction: No funds will be used to pay for religious worship, instruction, or proselytization, or for any equipment or supplies for such, or for any construction, remodeling, repair, operation, or maintenance of any facility or part of a facility to be used for religious worship, instruction, or proselytization (34 CFR 76.532 and P. L. 107-110, section 9505).
- Z. Disclosure of Gifts and Campaign Contributions: The grantee shall file disclosures of gifts and campaign contributions as required by State Board of Education Operating Rule 4.3, which is incorporated as if set out in full. The grantee has a continuing obligation to make disclosures through the term of the contract. Failure to comply with State Board of Education Operating Rule 4.3 is grounds for canceling the grant.
- AA. Submission of Audit Reports to TEA: Grantees which are public school districts and open enrollment charter schools agree to submit the required annual audit report, including the reporting package required under OMB Circular A-133, if an audit is required to be conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, to the TEA Division of School Financial Audits in the time and manner requested by the Agency.

Grantees which are **nonprofit organizations** (other than charter schools) and universities/colleges that expend \$500,000 or more total in federal awards in any fiscal year and are thus required to conduct a Single Audit or program-specific audit in accordance with the requirements in OMB Circular A-133, agree to submit a copy of such audit to TEA when the schedule of findings and questioned costs disclosed audit findings relating to any federal awards provided by TEA. TEA reserves the right to terminate this Contract if Contractor is found to be ineligible to receive payment. If Contractor is found to be ineligible to receive payment and the Contract is terminated, Contractor is liable to TEA for attorney's fees, the costs necessary to complete the Contract, including the cost of advertising and awarding a second contract, and any other damages or relief provided by law or equity.
- **GG. Interpretation**: In the case of conflicts arising in the interpretation of wording and/or meaning of various sections, parts, Appendices, General Provisions, Special Provisions, Exhibits, and Attachments or other documents, the TEA Contract and its General Provisions, Appendices and Special Provisions shall take precedence over all other documents which are a part of this contract.

Notwithstanding any other provision in this contract or any other document, this contract is void upon notice by Agency, in its sole discretion, that Contractor or any school, campus, or program operated by Contractor has at any time committed a material violation of Title 19, Texas Administrative Code Chapter 101, or any requirement or procedure for maintaining test security specified in any test administration materials in the possession or control of Contractor, or any school, campus, or program operated by Contractor. Expenditures and/or activities for which Contractor may claim reimbursement shall not be accrued or claimed subsequent to receipt of such notice from Agency.
- **JJ. Social Security Numbers**: Social Security numbers will not be provided by TEA as a part of this agreement. TEA is not requiring or requesting school districts or other grantees to provide Social Security numbers as a part of this agreement.
- **KK.** Student-identifying Information: Contractor agrees that in executing tasks on behalf of TEA, Contractor will not use any student-identifying information in any way that violates the provisions of FERPA and will destroy or return all student-identifying information to TEA within thirty (30) days of project completion.

GENERAL PROVISIONS & ASSURANCES

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LL.  - (E) does not charge tuition:
 - (F) complies with the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Part B of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act;
 - (G) is a school to which parents choose to send their children, and that admits students on the basis of a lottery, if more students apply for admission than can be accommodated;
 - (H) agrees to comply with the same Federal and State audit requirements as do other elementary schools and secondary schools in the State, unless such requirements are specifically waived for the purpose of this program;
 - (I) meets all applicable Federal, State, and local health and safety requirements;
 - (J) operates in accordance with State law; and
 - (K) has a written performance contract with the authorized public chartering agency in the State (i.e., SBOE) that includes a description of how student performance will be measured pursuant to State assessments that are required of other schools and pursuant to any other assessments mutually agreeable to the SBOE.
 - Community-Based Organization: A public or private nonprofit organization of demonstrated effectiveness that is
 representative of a community or significant segment of a community and that provides educational or related services
 to individuals in the community.
 - 3. Core Academic Subjects: English, reading or language arts, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, art, history, and geography.

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4. Highly Qualified:

- (A) when used with respect to any public elementary school or secondary school teacher teaching in a State, means that-
 - (i) the teacher has obtained full State certification as a teacher (including certification obtained through alternative routes to certification) or passed the State teacher licensing examination, and holds a license to teach in such State, except that when used with respect to any teacher teaching in a public charter school, the term means that the teacher meets the requirements set forth in the State's public charter school law; and
 - (ii) the teacher has not had certification or licensure requirements waived on an emergency, temporary, or provisional basis;
- (B) when used with respect to-
 - (i) an elementary school teacher who is new to the profession, means that the teacher-
 - (I) holds at least a bachelor's degree; and
 - (II) has demonstrated, by passing a rigorous State test, subject knowledge and teaching skills in reading, writing, mathematics, and other areas of the basic elementary school curriculum (which may consist of passing a State-required certification or licensing test or tests in reading, writing, mathematics, and other areas of the basic elementary school curriculum); or
 - (ii) a middle or secondary school teacher who is new to the profession, means that the teacher holds at least a bachelor's degree and has demonstrated a high level of competency in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches by-
 - (I) passing a rigorous State academic subject test in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches (which may consist of a passing level of performance on a State-required certification or licensing test or tests in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches); or
 - (II) successful completion, in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches, of an academic major, a graduate degree, coursework equivalent to an undergraduate academic major, or advanced certification or credentialing; and
- (C) when used with respect to an elementary, middle, or secondary school teacher who is not new to the profession, means that the teacher holds at least a bachelor's degree and—
 - (i) has met the applicable standard in clause (i) or (ii) of subparagraph (B), which includes an option for a test; or
 - (ii) demonstrates competence in all the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches based on a high objective uniform State standard of evaluation that—
 - (I) is set by the State for both grade appropriate academic subject matter knowledge and teaching skills;
 - (II) is aligned with challenging State academic content and student academic achievement standards and developed in consultation with core content specialists, teachers, principals, and school administrators;
 - (III) provides objective, coherent information about the teacher's attainment of core content knowledge in the academic subjects in which a teacher teaches;
 - (IV) is applied uniformly to all teachers in the same academic subject and the same grade level throughout the State:
 - (V) takes into consideration, but not be based primarily on, the time the teacher has been teaching in the academic subject;
 - (VI) is made available to the public upon request; and
 - (VII) may involve multiple, objective measures of teacher competency.
- 5. Parental Involvement: The participation of parents in regular, two-way and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities, including ensuring:
 - (A) that parents play an integral role in assisting their child's learning;
 - (B) that parents are encouraged to be actively involved in their child's education at school;
 - (C) that parents are full partners in their child's education and are included, as appropriate, in decision making and on advisory committees to assist in the education of their child; and
 - (D) the carrying out of other activities, such as those described in section 1118 of P. L. 107-110.

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B. Professional Development includes activities that:

- (A) improve and increase teachers' knowledge of the academic subjects the teachers teach, and enable teachers to become highly qualified:
- (B) are an integral part of broad schoolwide and districtwide educational improvement plans;
- (C) give teachers, principals, and administrators the knowledge and skills to provide the students with the opportunity to meet challenging State academic content standards and student academic achievement standards;
- (D) improve classroom management skills;
- (E) are high quality, sustained, intensive, and classroom-focused in order to have a positive and lasting impact on classroom instruction and the teacher's performance in the classroom and are not one-day or short-term workshops or conferences;
- (F) support the recruiting, hiring, and training of highly qualified teachers, including teachers who became highly qualified through State and local alternative routes to certification;
- (G) advance teacher understanding of effective instructional strategies that are:
- (H) based on scientifically based research (except for programs under Title II, Part D, Enhancing Education Through Technology of this Act); and
- strategies for improving student academic achievement or substantially increasing the knowledge and teaching skills of teachers; and
- (J) are aligned with and directly related to State academic content standards, student academic achievement standards, and assessments and the curricula and programs tied to the standards;

The applicant understands that failure to comply with one or more of these provisions and assurances may result in the Texas Education Agency (TEA) taking one or more enforcement actions authorized in Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) §§ 74.62 and 80.43.

In addition to the standard terms of award, all funding provided under the Recovery Act will be subject to the provisions, assurances and conditions for American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA or Recovery Act).

Terms defined:

RECIPIENT – The term "recipient" means a State and includes the Texas Education Agency (TEA). It also includes any entity that applies for and receives a grant directly from the federal government.

RECOVERY FUNDS —The term "recovery funds" means any funds that are made available from appropriations made under the Recovery Act.

RECOVERY ACT - the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009 (P.L. 111-5)

STIMULUS FUNDS – The term "stimulus funds" means any funds that are made available from appropriations under the Recovery Act; the term may be used interchangeably with "recovery funds."

GRANTEE - the subrecipient of TEA and applicant of funds.

- **A. One-Time Funding**: Unless otherwise specified, ARRA funding is considered one-time funding that is expected to be temporary. Grantees should expend funds in ways that do not result in unsustainable continuing commitments after the funding expires. Grantees must move rapidly, while using prudent grant management practices, to develop plans for using funds, consistent with the ARRA's reporting and accountability requirements, and promptly begin spending funds to help drive the nation's economic recovery. All ARRA funds must be separately accounted for and tracked in their obligation, expenditure, and reporting.
- **B. Period of Availability and Encumbrances/Obligations**: Unless otherwise specified in the Notice of Grant Award (NOGA), all funds are effective from the beginning date specified on the Notice of Grant Award (NOGA) through June 30, 2013. Carryover of funds will not be available beyond that date. Unobligated/unexpended funds will be returned to the Department of Treasury. The paragraph in the General Provisions pertaining to Encumbrances and Obligations applies as follows:

All encumbrances shall occur on or between the beginning and ending dates of the contract. All goods must be received and services rendered and subsequently liquidated (recorded as an expenditure or accounts payable) within the contract dates. In no manner shall encumbrances be considered or reflected as accounts payable or as expenditures. Obligations that are liquidated and recognized as expenditures must meet the allowable cost principles in OMB Circular A-87, A-21, or A-122 (as applicable) and program rules, regulations, and guidelines contained elsewhere. When an obligation is made is defined in 34 CFR 76.707.

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- C. Compliance with Other Provisions and Assurances: All provisions and assurances stated in the General Provisions, Certification Regarding Debarment and Suspension, Lobbying Certification and Disclosure of Lobbying, No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) Special Provisions and Assurances, and all other program-specific provisions and assurances apply unless they conflict or are superseded by the following terms and conditions implementing the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) requirements below. This includes compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964; Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972; the Age Discrimination Act of 1975; and all other nondiscrimination provisions. It also includes Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (prohibiting race, color, national origin, religion, and sex discrimination in employment; the Americans with Disabilities Act (prohibiting disability discrimination in employment and in services provided by entitles receiving federal funds); as well as any other applicable civil rights laws. By submitting this application, the applicant agrees to comply with all such provisions and assurances.
- **D. Compliance with Other Program Statutes:** The applicant agrees to comply with the authorizing program statutes, regulations, non-regulatory guidelines, and other guidance in the implementation of the programs receiving funding under ARRA. This includes compliance with comparability; supplement, not supplant; maintenance of effort (MOE); equitable participation for private nonprofit school students and teachers; and all other program-specific provisions and requirements. All such are hereby incorporated by reference.
- **E. DUNS Number:** All entities receiving any federal funds, including ARRA funds, are required to have a DUNS (Dunn & Bradstreet) number. The DUNS number serves as the grantee organization's unique identifier for reporting federal funds received and expended. TEA must use this same DUNS number to report grant awards and expenditures for subrecipients under ARRA to the website specifically provided for in ARRA http://www.FederalReporting.gov/. The assignment of a DUNS number is a condition of award of ARRA funds and must be validated by TEA prior to issuing a NOGA for ARRA funds. (Section 1512[c][4] of ARRA and the federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB) to comply with the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act [FFATA], P.L. 109-282. OMB adopted the DUNS number as the "unique identifier" required for reporting under FFATA).
- **F. Central Contractor Registration (CCR):** All grantees receiving ARRA funds, as well as any other federal funds, are required to register and maintain current registration with the Central Contractor Registration (CCR) database at http://www.ccr.gov. Registration in CCR is a condition of award of ARRA funds and must be validated by TEA prior to issuing a NOGA for ARRA funds.
- **G. ARRA Reporting Requirements:** The federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has issued guidance related to reporting the use of ARRA funds to the various websites. The definition of terms and data elements, as well as any specific instructions for reporting, including required formats, are provided in separate guidance issued by the TEA.

The Texas Education Agency as a direct recipient of funds is required to report certain information at certain intervals throughout the grant period as required in Section 1512 of ARRA. In order to meet the reporting requirements, grantees will be required to provide certain information to TEA. By submitting this application, the grantee agrees to provide information in the form, time, and manner requested so that TEA can meet its reporting requirements and deadlines.

1. **Separate Tracking and Monitoring of ARRA Funds**: ARRA funds must be separately tracked and monitored independently of any non-Recovery Act funding. Grantees must submit certain information to TEA in order for TEA to comply with quarterly reporting requirements established in Section 1512 of the Recovery Act. Recovery Act-related reporting requirements are incorporated as a special condition of this award.

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- 3. Quarterly Reporting for ARRA: Not later than 10 calendar days after the end of each calendar quarter, TEA and any other direct recipient of ARRA funds must report to the U.S. Department of Education with regard to recovery funds received in accordance with number 4 below (Section 1512[c]). (A "direct recipient" is a state agency or any entity that applies for and receives funds directly from a federal government agency.) TEA must obtain certain information from grantees in order to comply with this reporting requirement. By submitting this application, the grantee agrees to submit information to TEA in the time, form, and manner requested.
- 4. Data Elements for Quarterly Reporting for ARRA: In accordance with Section 1512(c) of ARRA and the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006 (Public Law 109-282), TEA is required to provide quarterly reports to the U.S. Department of Education or through a central government-wide portal (http://www.FederalReporting.gov). The information adopted by OMB contains the following data elements: submitting this application, the grantee agrees to submit the information to TEA in the time, form, and manner requested. The information may change pending final adoption by OMB.

For each grant that equals or exceeds \$25,000 in total grant award amount:

- a. The grantee organization's DUNS number (TEA will need to collect this information from grantees)
- b. The grant award number (i.e., NOGA ID number) assigned by TEA (TEA will have this information on file)
- c. The legal name of the grantee organization (as registered in the Central Contractor Registration (CCR), if registered) (TEA will have this information on file provided it is the same legal name on file with TEA)
- d. The physical location (street address) (as listed in the CCR, if registered) (TEA will have this information on file provided it is the same street address on file with TEA)
- e. The (federal) Congressional district number
- f. The grantee organization type (i.e., independent school district, nonprofit organization, etc) (TEA will have this information on file)
- g. The total amount of the grant award (TEA will have this information on file)
- h. The total amount paid to the grantee as of date of report (TEA will have this information on file)
- i. The physical location (street address) of the primary place of performance of the grant (TEA will have this information on file provided it is the same address on file with TEA.)
- j. An evaluation (i.e., status report) of the completion status of the project or activity (for example, Not Started; Less than 50% Completed; Completed 50% or More; Fully Completed) (It is not clear at this time whether this information will need to be collected from the grantees. TEA will notify the grantee in the event status information needs to be collected.)
- k. An estimate of the number of jobs created and the number of jobs retained by the project or activity and a brief description of the types of those jobs (i.e., job titles) (TEA will need to collect this information from grantees.)
- I. The names and total compensation of the five most highly compensated officers of the grantee organization if the organization in its preceding year received 80% or more of its annual gross revenues in Federal awards and \$25,000,000 or more in annual gross revenues from Federal awards and the public does not have access to information about the compensation of senior executives. (It is not known at this time whether this data element will be required once the data elements are finalized by OMB. If it is required in the final data elements, TEA will need to collect this information from the grantees.)

For grants that equal less than \$25,000 in total grant award amount or for grantees that in the previous tax year had gross income under \$300,000, amounts will be reported in the aggregate according to the following:

- a. The total number of grants awarded less than \$25,000 (TEA will have this information file)

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5. Posting the Information on Public Website: Not later than 30 days after the end of each calendar quarter, each federal agency, including the U.S. Department of Education, shall make the information in those reports publicly available by posting the information on the designated public website (Section 1512[d]). Grantees will not be required to post information on the public website unless they apply for and receive other ARRA grants directly from a federal government agency.

Once OMB adopts the final data reporting elements and TEA receives specific instructions for reporting, TEA will provide subsequent guidance to grantees related to required reporting information.

- H. Electronic Drawdown of ARRA Funds from TEA and Use of FAR Fund Codes: Recipients will draw down ARRA funds on an award-specific basis. Pooling of ARRA award funds with other funds for drawdown or other purposes is not permitted. Recipients must account for each ARRA award separately by referencing the assigned FAR (Financial Accounting and Resource) fund code for each award.
- I. Availability of Records: The applicant agrees to make all financial and programmatic records available in detail for inspection by TEA auditors, local independent auditors, and the offices described below.
- 1. **Examination of Records:** The Comptroller General of the United States and any of its employees, contractors, agents, representatives, or designees, may examine any records related to obligations and use by any state or local government of funds made available under ARRA. (Section 901[b]).
- 2. Access of Government Accountability Office (GAO): Each contract and each subcontract awarded using funds made available under ARRA shall provide that the Comptroller General of the United States and his representatives are authorized to examine any records of the contractor or any of its subcontractors, or any State or local agency administering such contract, that directly pertain to, and involve transactions relating to, the contract or subcontract and to interview any officer or employee of the contractor or any of its subcontractors, or of any State or local government agency administering the contract, regarding such transactions (Section 902).
- 3. **Reviews by Inspector General:** The inspector general of the U.S. Department of Education shall review, as appropriate, any concerns raised by the public about specific investments using funds made available in this Act. Any findings of such reviews shall be relayed immediately to the Secretary of Education. In addition, the findings of such reviews, along with any audits conducted by any inspector general of ARRA funds, shall be posted on the inspector general's website and linked to the recovery.gov website, except that portions of reports may be redacted to the extent the portions would disclose information that is protected from public disclosure under sections 552 and 552a of Title 5, United States Code (Section 1514).
- 4. Access of Offices of Inspector General to Certain Records and Employees: With respect to each contract or grant awarded using ARRA funds, any representative of an Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Education or other appropriate federal agency is authorized to examine any records of the contractor or grantee, any of its subcontractors or subgrantees, or any State or local agency administering such contract, that pertain to, and involve transactions relating to, the contract, subcontract, grant, or subgrant, and to interview any officer or employee of the contractor, grantee, subgrantee, or agency regarding such transactions (Section 1515).
- 5. **Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board:** Section 1521 of the ARRA establishes the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board to coordinate and conduct oversight of ARRA funds to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse. The Board shall submit "flash reports" on potential management and funding problems that require immediate attention; quarterly reports; and annual reports to the President and Congress, including the Committees on Appropriations of the Senate and House of Representatives, summarizing the findings on the use of ARRA funds. The Board may conduct its own independent audits and reviews of ARRA funds. All reports shall be made publicly available on the www.recovery.gov website established by the Board. See paragraphs J and K below with regard to reports of suspected fraud or abuse (Sections 1523 and 1524).

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- 6. **Recovery Independent Advisory Panel**: Section 1541 of the ARRA establishes the Recovery Independent Advisory Panel to make recommendations to the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board on action the Board could take to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse relating to ARRA funds.
- **J. Disclosure of Fraud or Misconduct:** Each grantee awarded funds made available under the ARRA shall promptly refer to the USDE Office of Inspector General any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subrecipient, subcontractor, or other person has submitted a false claim under the False Claims Act or has committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving those funds.
- **K. Protection for Whistleblowers**: Section 1553 of the ARRA provides protection for State and local government and contractor whistleblowers. Any employee of any employer receiving ARRA funds may not be discharged, demoted, or otherwise discriminated against as a reprisal for disclosing, including a disclosure made in the ordinary course of an employee's duties, to the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board, an inspector general, the U. S. Comptroller General, a member of Congress, a State or federal regulatory or law enforcement agency, a person with supervisory authority over the employee (or such other person working for the employer who has the authority to investigate, discover, or terminate misconduct), a court or grand jury, the head of a federal agency, or their representatives, information that the employee reasonably believes is evidence of (1) gross mismanagement of an agency contract or grant relating to ARRA funds; (2) a gross waste of ARRA funds; (3) a substantial and specific danger to public health or safety related to the implementation or use of ARRA funds; (4) an abuse of authority related to the implementation or use of ARRA funds; or (5) a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to an agency contract (including the competition for or negotiation of a contract), or grant, awarded or issued relating to ARRA funds. A person who believes that he or she has been subjected to a reprisal may submit a complaint regarding the reprisal to the inspector general for the appropriate federal agency (in most cases, the U.S. Department of Education).
- **L. Use of Funds:** The grantee agrees to comply with the applicable federal cost principles in the obligation and expenditure of ARRA funds as identified in the General Provisions and Assurances as well as other limitations or restrictions and expenditures identified therein. The grantee also agrees to the following:
- Consolidation of ARRA Administrative Funds: Due to the significant reporting requirements under ARRA, it is
 not known at this time whether grantees may consolidate ARRA administrative funds with other NCLB
 consolidated administrative funds. TEA will issue further guidance with regard to this provision once guidance is
 provided by the U.S. Department of Education. If ARRA funds are permitted to be consolidated with other NCLB
 consolidated administrative funds, grantees must still be able to report the types and number of jobs that were
 created or saved with ARRA funds.
- 2. **Combining ARRA funds on a Schoolwide Program.** ARRA funds are permitted to be used on a Title I Part A schoolwide Campus/Program, funds may be combined with other funding sources, but grantees still must be able to identify precisely the Items of obligation and expenditure for ARRA reporting. You must also be able to report the types and number of jobs that were created or saved with ARRA funds.
- 3. **Special Contracting Provisions**: To the maximum extent possible, contracts funded under the ARRA shall be awarded as fixed-price contracts through the use of competitive procedures. A summary of any new contract awarded with ARRA funds that is not fixed-price and not awarded using competitive procedures shall be posted in a special section of the www.recovery.gov website established by the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board (Section 1554).

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- 4. **Use of Funds for Certain Expenditures Prohibited:** ARRA funds shall not be used for any casino or other gambling establishment, aquarium, zoo, golf course, or swimming pool (Section 1604).
- 5. **Use of Funds for Construction Prohibited:** Unless specifically authorized in the applicable program statute, regulations, guidelines, Request for Application (RFA), TEA Standard Application System (SAS), the approved grant application, or other written authorization, none of the ARRA additional formula funds shall be used for construction, remodeling, or renovation.
- 6. **Buy American Use of American Iron, Steel, and Manufactured Goods:** If construction is allowed and approved pursuant to the previous paragraph pertaining to "Use of Funds for Construction Prohibited", none of the funds may be used for the construction, alteration, maintenance, or repair of a public building or public work unless all of the iron, steel, and manufactured goods used in the project are produced in the United States unless waived by the Secretary of Education (Section 1605).
- 7. Wage Rate Requirements for Contracted Laborers and Mechanics Compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act: Subject to further clarification issued by the Office of Management and Budget, and notwithstanding any other provision of law and in a manner consistent with other provisions of ARRA, all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors and subcontractors on projects funded directly by or assisted in whole or in part by and through the Federal Government pursuant to this award shall be paid wages at rates not less than those prevailing on projects of a character similar in the locality as determined by the Secretary of Labor in accordance with subchapter IV of chapter 31 of title 40, United States Code. With respect to the labor standards specified in this section, the Secretary of Labor shall have the authority and functions set forth in Reorganization Plan Numbered 14 of 1950 (64 Stat. 1267; 5 U.S.C. App.) and section 3145 of title 40, United States Code (Section 1606).
- M. Compliance with OMB Circular A-133 Audits and Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards:
 Grantees agree to separately identify the expenditures for each grant award funded under ARRA as required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations" and to comply with all other provisions of the Single Audit Act and OMB Circular A-133.
