







Theory of Action Provides Answers

- Why your program will work
- What you plan to accomplish
- What is the rationale behind your chosen strategies
- What change is needed and how you expect it to occur
- Who will benefit

The Theory of Action

The evidence-based storyline that connects


- Needs/Problems
- Mission (values, beliefs)
- Program (actions, resources)
- Evaluation
- Vision



A series of "if / then" relationships connect the components of your theory of action.



The Basic Components of a Logic Model



A series of "if-then" relationships connect the components of a logic model.



5 Why's

- Describe problem and ask:
- "Why is this problem occurring?"
 - be concrete
 - be factual
 - be concise
- Question the answer by asking why 4 more times to get to the root cause.
 - Why do you think this is the case?
 - How do you know?



5 Why's

- Begin at the end and ask
- "What caused that?"
 - -be concrete
 - -factual
 - -concise
- Question the answer by asking why 4 more times.



Assumptions

Assumptions underlie much of what we do. It is often these underlying assumptions that hinder success or produce less-than-expected results. One benefit of thinking about our theory of action is that it helps us make our assumptions explicit.

LAS Proposed Timeline

April 25	Districts provide feedback on evaluation elements
May 14	Districts receive draft LAS evaluation framework for review and feedback*
June 13	Districts review draft LAS Score Submission Template and revised draft LAS Evaluation Plan and provide feedback*
July 16	LAS Evaluation Plan finalized
August 6	Districts submit LAS Plans for approval – may include follow-up requests for clarification
August 17	District LAS Plans finalized
September 1	Districts receive finalized LAS Score Submission Template
October 1	Districts submit LAS Scores to TEA
Oct 1 – Nov 15	Review of Plans – may include follow-up requests for additional information and/or submission of component data
January 2	LAS "What if" reports released

^{*}As documents are being finalized, we anticipate having an ongoing feedback loop through which districts have an opportunity to review and provide feedback as the document is revised.
