

Overview of Texas First Diploma Program

TEAR Texas First Early High School Completion Program



- The Texas First Early High School Completion Program was established by the 87th Texas Legislature.
- The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) adopted rules for the Texas First program that can be found in the <u>19 Texas Administrative</u> <u>Code (TAC), Part 1, Chapter 21</u>.
- Student **eligibility requirements** for the program are outlined in <u>19 TAC, Part 1, §21.52</u>.
- The THECB has also adopted rules to implement the Texas First Scholarship Program in <u>19 TAC</u>, <u>Part 1, Chapter 22, Subchapter T</u>.

TEACH Minimum Requirements for Texas First Early High School Completion Program

- 22 high school credits
- Final grade point average (GPA) equivalent to 3.0 on a 4.0 scale
- Earned an overall score in at least the 80th percentile on one or more of the ACT, SAT, PSAT/NMSQT, TSIA/TSIA2*, or GED <u>or</u> has a GPA in the top 10% of the student's current class
- Completed assessment requirements for STAAR
 - English I or II
 - Algebra I
 - Biology

Students are also required to have shown mastery of each of the following subject areas:

- English Language Arts
- Mathematics
- Science
- Social Studies
- Languages Other Than English (LOTE)

Mastery in the subject areas can be shown in the following ways:

- Meeting the STAAR college readiness benchmarks by scoring 4,000 on Algebra II and English III STAAR tests;*
- Credit earned in the core curriculum of an institution of higher education in which the student earned at least a C; or
- Meeting the standards outlined in Figure 1 of the rule.

*No longer being offered, but results are valid up to five (5) years from date of testing




TEXAS First Early High School Completion Program Scholarship

- SB 2294 (88th Texas Legislature, Regular Session, 2023) extended the scholarship opportunity from the 10 research institutions in the state to <u>all</u> Texas public institutions of higher education, including all public colleges, universities, and technical colleges.
- The scholarship award will expire at the end of the first academic year after students graduate.
 Students graduating on the program are encouraged to attend college directly after they graduate.



TEAR Texas First Early High School Completion Program

- A student who earns a diploma by satisfying the requirements of the Texas First Early High School Completion Program must have successful completion of the program indicated on the transcript.
- Students who graduate early through the Texas First Early High School Completion Program are considered to have earned a diploma with a distinguished level of achievement.
- School districts are also required to indicate completion of the distinguished level of achievement on a student's high school transcript.



TEACH Recommended Steps to Texas First Diploma (TFD) Early Graduation

- 1) Counselor identifies interested students
- 2) Counselor reviews student's record to verify eligibility and/or provide guidance for student to meet eligibility
- 3) Counselor and student review admissions requirements for institution(s) where the student is interested in attending, including special requirements for early high school graduates (if any)
- 4) Student contacts early graduation admissions advisor at the institution(s) where the student plans to attend for additional admissions guidance
- 5) Student completes and submits ApplyTX admissions application or follows other instructions provided by the admissions advisor (e.g., special admissions application or process)
- 6) Student completes and submits FAFSA or TASFA



TEA Steps to Texas First Diploma Verification

- Counselor or school district administrator completes and submits the Verification Form after the student has graduated with the TFD
- Form easily accessible within the Texas OnCourse Academy:
 - Scholarship Application Texas OnCourse module
 - High School Graduation Plan Texas OnCourse module
- ISD reporting official uses TFD PEIMS codes to report TFD graduation






- 1. Student receives Texas First Program Scholarship Certificate via email at the email address reported by the counselor on the Verification Form (check junk folders!)
- 2. Student contacts the financial aid office at the institution where the student is or will be enrolled to submit the Scholarship Certificate and other requested information needed to secure the scholarship award from the institution
- 3. The institution's financial aid office will provide additional steps and further guidance for the scholarship award

Texas First Scholarship Eligibility

To be eligible, a student **must**:

- have graduated early from high school with a Texas First Program Diploma (also referred to as the Texas First Early High School Completion Program);
- be enrolled at an eligible institution;
- be a resident of Texas; and
- be registered for Selective Service, or be exempt.



ALL public institutions of higher education are required to participate in the program.



Texas First Scholarship Amounts



The amount of state credit offered to the student is contingent on the number of semesters the student graduates early and the maximum annual (two semester) Toward Excellence, Access, and Success (TEXAS) Grant award amount for the applicable academic year, which is determined by the THECB.

For example: A student could receive up to \$10,858 in Fall 2025 if they graduate two or more semesters early.



Applying Texas First Scholarship

Upon enrollment of an eligible Texas First Early High School graduate, the institution must apply a state credit to the student's charges that is equal to the lesser of:

- the amount of the state credit available to the student; or
- the student's actual tuition, mandatory fees, and other costs of attendance at the institution.

Note: The amount of state credit offered to a student may NOT be considered in the calculation of any state or institutional need-based aid awards or the calculation of the student's overall financial need, unless the combination of the credit and other federal, state, and institutional financial aid (excluding work-study and loan programs) exceeds the student's estimated total cost of attendance (COA).

Student Scholarship Story





What contributed to my student graduating early?

- Access to supportive counseling staff who communicated often with my student and me throughout the process
- District offered multiple opportunities for high school credit courses in middle school, including Algebra I
- District offered universal college readiness testing as early as grade 8 and the SAT prior to the spring of the junior year
- District offered multiple college credit opportunities, including dual credit, OnRamps, and AP, as early as grade 9

TEXASQNCOURSE

How did the scholarship help my student to be successful in college?

- Additional (non-loan) financial support makes college more affordable for my student <u>and her</u> <u>older siblings.</u>
- All courses my student took her "senior" year applies toward her engineering degree (29 hours).
 - For her degree, not many dual credit, AP, or OnRamps courses would count toward her requirements and would have transferred or articulated as elective credit. She had taken most of the transferable courses her junior year, such as US History, Physics, or English 1301/1302.
 - She is classified as a "junior" in her second year at university.
 - Having direct access to advising from her program, she is now considering the Fast-Track master's program in engineering to finish within 5 years.
- She was able to take many lower division courses with her college graduation cohort instead of starting at higher level courses because her core courses were complete.



What concerns did I have as a parent?

- My student did not complete calculus and wants to go into engineering. Is she at a disadvantage compared to other students who attend an additional year of high school?
- She is too young to leave home early. She needs the additional year to build stronger life skills.
- She will miss out on many important social and extracurricular events that happen in the senior year.
- She will not receive the same high school diploma as her siblings.



What resources were useful in guiding you through the process?

- Texas First Diploma Requirement Check-list
 - We understood what needed to be completed her junior year and what could already be demonstrated.
- Subject Assessment Rubric
 - The age requirement for GED was not clear on the rubric.
- Applying to college and Apply Texas resources
- FAFSA resources





What I wish I knew then that I know now...

- Students need to know they want to commit to the Texas First Diploma well before fall of their junior year.
 - We missed FAFSA priority deadline due to spring decision to commit.
- Timing of when assessment results are available and when summer college activities start (i.e. orientation and fall course registration, housing applications).
 - AP science scores are available in July, but college deadlines are in June.
 - She took the ACT as backup.
- Housing options are limited for students under 18 who are not emancipated.
- Students might not be able to participate in their class commencement ceremony. (Her ceremony took place while she was attending her fall college courses.)

Counselor verifies the correct information is recorded in the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS) and in the Texas Record Exchange (TREx) to show completion of the Texas First Program.

College Readiness Examined: A Closer Look at Assessments


