






Who are Military-Connected Students? (National Data)

4.08 | Age of DOD Force Children (N=1,511,167)

Of the 1,511,167 children, more than two-thirds (69.2%) are 11 years of age or younger.



Background of Military Student Identifier (MSI)

- The MSI facilitates the identification of active-duty military-connected students in public schools. (ESSA 2015)
- TEC 25.006 was amended in 2019 to include dependents of National Guard, reserve forces, and those killed in the line of duty.
- Best practices include extending support to veteran and retiree students and families








Military Student Identifier (MSI)

The MSI enables the school system to:

- Identify military-connected students and their families upon enrollment
- Inform best practices for campus transition programs
- Evaluate records and transcripts
- Academic and mental health screening

Problem of Practice





Case Study



A campus is located near a military installation. They serve a diverse student population and have a high percentage of military-connected students.

However, the campus has struggled to accurately identify and support these students due to a lack of clear identification methods, often resulting in lack of comprehensive support for these students.







Case Study



Challenges:

- 1. <u>Accurate Identification</u>: Students not being identified due to an unclear process.
- 2. <u>Reporting and Notification Methods</u>: Staff on campus don't know their military-connected students, because information is not being shared.
- 3. <u>Support Implementation</u>: A lack of academic, social, and emotional support programs due to no data being gathered on these students.







Questions to Ask



How can a campus develop a clear, standardized process to identify military-connected students?

Is PEIMS coding crucial in this process? Training of staff?

What system can be used to notify campus staff of military-connected students on campus?

Why is this important?

What are some ways that a campus can gather data from military-connected students and their families to develop targeted support programs?









Military Student Identifier Recommendations (a)



Disaggregate assessment results within each School System (e.g., school district and open-enrollment charter schools)



School systems include this information in their school report cards.



Demographic and performance data to determine program effectiveness.









Military Student Identifier Recommendations (b)

To improve and personalize academic and social/emotional responses for the unique military-connected students.

Consider military-connected students as a unique subgroup in their curriculum design and planning.

Provide local education agencies with quality, actionable data concerning their military-connected students.









Recommended Strategies

- Ensure use of the Military Student Identifier (PEIMS) codes in questionnaire upon enrollment.
- Provide MSI bi-annual training for school registrars and data processors.
- Utilize the school/district webpage to educate parents and advocate for the use of the MSI.
- Establish standard operating procedures for the use of annual MSI data collection upon enrollment.
- Publish MSI annual data with school and community stakeholders.


