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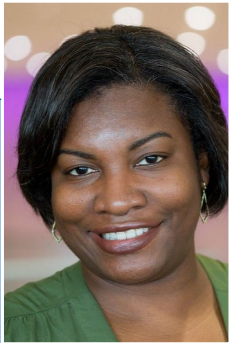
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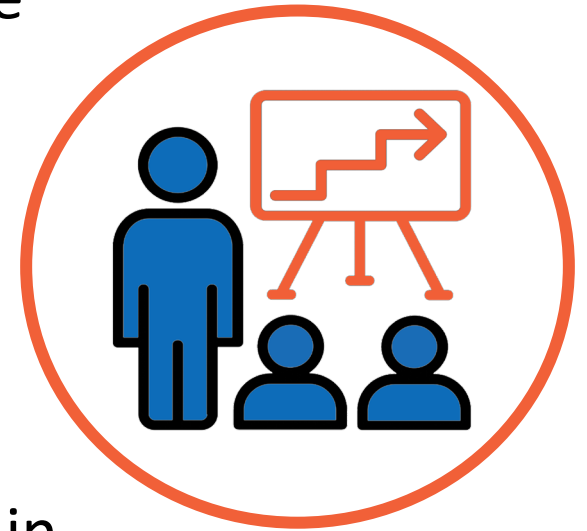

New School Year Reminders**

- All newly enrolled foster care and homeless students must:
 - Have an enrollment conference (within first 2 weeks of enrolling or as soon as feasible).
 - Receive a welcome packet with information and resources about the school.
 - Be provided a warm-introduction to the school, provided a tour of the campus, meeting relevant staff, learning about school opportunities, etc.
 - Receive expedited nutrition benefits, from the first day of enrollment (without delay).

Nutrition Benefits

TAC § 89.1605(a)(3)

All students who are identified as homeless or in foster care are eligible for the US Dept of Agriculture Child Nutrition Program.

Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) must ensure there is an expedited process in place for students who qualify to receive nutrition benefits upon enrollment. The process must communicate with the LEA nutrition coordinator to ensure that eligible students are charged in error or experience delays in receiving these benefits.

Best Practices



Appropriate LEA or campus staff should immediately notify food services when a new student enrolls.



Verify student coding is in alignment with effective date.



Ensure student confidentiality.



Collaborate with your Nutrition Coordinator to establish processes, such as sending an approval notification via email.



LEAs should submit new and staff or eligible applications.



REMINDER: Applications must be expedited when the student qualifies for SNAP benefits. Ensure systems and supports are student and family-centered!



Enrollment Conferences

TAC § 89.1605(b)

Local Educational Agencies must convene an enrollment conference with a student who is homeless or in foster care within the first two weeks, or as soon as feasible after a student who is homeless or in substitute care enrolls at a new school. The student participation in the meeting should be addressed on a case-by-case basis. The conference cannot delay or impede enrollment.

The enrollment conference may be used in conjunction with an existing meeting designed for a similar purpose for newly enrolled students.

An **Enrollment Conference** is a student-centered meeting for a newly enrolled student designed to:

- Identify academic and extracurricular interests.
- Review credits and assessment information.
- Introduce school processes and opportunities for engagement.
- Determine social-emotional support.
- Develop course and instructional strategies.
- Communicate confidential information that impact a student's success, if needed.

Student Welcome Packet Requirements and Best Practices

TAC § 89.1605(a)(1)

Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) must provide welcome packets to students who are homeless or in foster care within the first two weeks of enrollment. LEAs may include required welcome packet contents with any existing items being provided to new students.

Welcome Packet Required Items:

- Extracurricular activities (e.g., fine arts, athletics, etc.)
- Club activities
- Information on fee waivers
- Tutoring opportunities
- Student code of conduct
- Available student supports
- Contact information for pertinent school staff
- Contact information for key school members:
 - School counselors
 - Nurses
 - Social workers
 - Foster Care Liaison
 - McKinney-Vento Liaison
 - Principal & Assistant Principals
 - Registrars
 - Nutrition coordinators
 - Transportation specialists
 - Additional support staff (e.g., Special Education, Emergent Bilingual, Gifted and Talented, 504 programs, Pregnancy Related Services)

Additional Foster Care and McKinney-Vento Items:

- Student clubs
- After school programs
- Enrichment programs
- Mentor programs
- Family engagement opportunities
- Student ambassador programs

School Introductions to Ease Transitions

TAC § 89.1605(a)(2)

School introductions are welcoming activities provided by the school to new students. Staff can introduce students to the school in a variety of ways, such as giving tours of the campus, hosting welcome events, and providing one-on-one student support. These activities can help students acclimate to their new environment, adjust academically, meet new friends, and participate in extracurricular activities. While LEAs are required to provide introductions to students who are homeless or in foster care, these supports are beneficial for easing the transitions of all newly enrolled students.

Strategies to Ease Transitions

- Provide introductions (e.g., staff introductions, campus tours, activities, welcome events, etc.) within two weeks of enrollment.
- Implement mentoring programs in which staff or community mentors can facilitate introductions, have lunch with students, and check-in with students throughout the day.
- Provide information on peer-to-peer programs, such as student-led activities, clubs, programs, extracurriculars, etc.
- Designate a staff member to whom the student can reach out for support and services. This person provides a safe space for the student to share any concerns, needs, or life changes.



Key Contacts

- Campus staff members.
- Staff members who have been designated as student mentors.
- Community mentor sponsor. Student-led groups.
- Student ambassadors and faculty sponsors.



Student Ambassadors

Student ambassadors are students who represent the school and introduce new students to the campus and its culture. Student ambassadors are familiar with the campus environment and have a positive attitude, great communication skills, leadership qualities, and are accepting of others.

- Student ambassadors can organize and/or participate in the following activities:
- Newcomer social events throughout the school year.
 - Tours of the campus library, nurse's office, counseling office, gym, and cafeteria.
 - Accompanying new students to lunch during the first week of school.

Ask TED (Texas Education Directory)

- AskTED is TEA's online Texas Education Directory.
- AskTED is real-time database where each district and charter school's Foster Care (FC) and McKinney-Vento (MV) liaison contact information is maintained.
- AskTED makes FC and MV Liaison information publicly available to support LEAs, parents, child welfare workers with school transitions, troubleshooting, etc.



All LEAs must designate a McKinney-Vento and Foster Care Liaison to carry out the duties listed in the federal McKinney-Vento Act, Texas Education Code, and ESSA.

LEAs must ensure their designated Liaison's contact information in AskTED is **up to date** throughout the school year.



Districts submit their liaison information to TEA through the district's AskTED administrator.

Charter schools submit their liaison information to TEA's Charter School Division directly CharterSchools@tea.texas.gov

AskTED Navigation & Locating LEA (MV and FC) Liaisons

Highly Mobile and At-Risk (HMAR) Programs | TEA's AskTED Database System 

Introduction

AskTED is an online directory of Texas school information, including charter schools. The directory is primarily used by people seeking contact information for schools, districts, and education service centers. AskTED is a real-time database that is updated regularly by Texas LEAs.

To that end, Texas School Districts and Open-Enrollment Charter Schools are required to have both Homeless and Foster Care Liaisons as individual designated roles for all LEAs. The information must be maintained and stored in AskTED. It is important for LEAs to keep this information regularly updated, so that McKinney-Vento and Foster Care Liaison information is publicly available, and these points of contacts are available to support students and remove barriers related to school transitions and mobility.


Submitting or Updating Liaison Information

Each LEA needs to ensure the contact information for their designated liaison is current and up to date throughout the school year. When information needs to be updated (e.g., change of designated staff, phone number, or email address), these changes need to be submitted to the AskTED database.

- For school districts, changes and/or submissions will be completed to TEA through each school district's AskTED administrator.
- For charter schools, AskTED updates are to be emailed directly to the Charter School Division at TEA at CharterSchools@tea.state.tx.us. More information can be found here for [Charter Schools](#).

Education and Child Welfare Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

Designated Points of Contact for Students in Foster Care

ESSA requires designated Points of Contact for child welfare and education agencies to support school stability for students in foster care. ESSA requires that the local child welfare agency notify the local education agency of their child welfare point of contact annually. After this notification is received the local education agency is required to inform the local child welfare agency of their designated point of contact. The designated points of contact serve as a resource to support school stability and implementation of ESSA foster care requirements (education best-interest, transportation coordination, etc). The Texas Department of Family Protective Services (DFPS) Educational specialists serve as the Child Welfare Point of Contact and LEA Foster Care Liaison, serves as the LEA Point of Contact for ESSA purposes. The chart below maps an annual communication process and timelines for when Points of Contact notifications should occur.

It is the expectations that the LEA will respond promptly with the corresponding LEA ESSA Foster Care Point of Contact information. Foster Care & TSDS PEIMS Scenarios

If a student leaves foster care within the school year, do they remain coded for the remainder of the year?

Yes. When a student received the FC TSDS PEIMS Indicator code, the student remains coded the full school year & summer months even if the student leaves foster care within the school year.

If a student remains in FC, does the FC Indicator carry over from year-to-year?

No. The FC Indicator code does not carry over from year to year.

The student must re-identify in TSDS PEIMS at the beginning of the school year.

TEA Foster Care | PEIMS Coding | Supplemental Guidance

To streamline enrollment and clarify expectations regarding the PEIMS indicator code, identifying students in foster care and acceptable documentation TEA developed the guidance below. Please ensure that Campus Administrators, PEIMS Coordinators, Foster Care Liaisons, Registrars, Counselors, and other personnel who develop and support enrollment processes are informed.

Defining "foster care" for PEIMS: The general term "foster care" for education purposes includes *all* students in the **managing conservatorship (legal custody) of the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS).**

- This includes students placed by DFPS with a Kinship caregiver, when the child remains in the legal custody of Texas DFPS.¹
- The Texas Legislature only granted TEA permission to collect the "foster care" status of students in Texas DFPS Managing Conservatorship, therefore student's from another state's foster care system and students who are identified as Unaccompanied Refugee Minors (URM) living in Texas, although both may be considered in "foster care" should not be coded for the purpose of PEIMS.

Acceptable Documentation for PEIMS: Schools may accept any official Texas Department of Family and Protective Services form, listed below, that designate that a student is in [Texas DFPS Managing Conservatorship](#). A school may also accept a copy of the court order for this purpose.

{Forms do not include letters or memos on DFPS letterhead (unless for the purposes of pre-k verification)² or other documentation from contracted Child Placing Agencies stating that a student is in DFPS Managing Conservatorship.}

- All forms in the 2085 series:
 - Foster Care/Residential Care - 2085 FC
 - Kinship or Other Non-Foster Caregiver - 2085 KO
 - Verified Kinship Foster Caregiver - 2085 KF
 - Legal Risk - 2085 LR
 - Home and Community-based Services (HCS) - 2085 HCS
 - Supervised Independent Living - 2085 SIL
 - Designation of Education Decision-Maker - 2085 E³

¹ A "Kinship" Caregiver is a relative or fictive kin who provides care for a child. A relative is a member of the child's biological family. A fictive kin is a person who has a longstanding and significant relationship with a child in DFPS conservatorship or with the child's family. ² If a student is eligible for prekindergarten because the student is or ever has been in the conservatorship of the Department of Family and Protective Services following an adversary hearing held as provided by Section 262.201, Family Code, the parent or caregiver of the child will be mailed a verification letter of prekindergarten eligibility. Districts are asked to accept the DFPS letter as proof of eligibility to enroll these children in free prekindergarten. For assistance in obtaining a letter, please contact the DFPS [Education Specialists](#) in your area for assistance or for a description of other forms of proof of eligibility. ³ All students in DFPS Managing Conservatorship are required to present an Education Decision-Maker 2085 (E-2085) form at enrollment in accordance with Family Code § 263.004. If a student does not have this form at enrollment, please request it. The form includes the contact information for the education decision-maker and caseworker. Schools, in accordance with TEC § 25.007 are required to notify the education decision-maker and caseworker regarding any event that may significantly impact the education of a child. Please remember that the "foster care" status of students is highly confidential. Foster care status and related information should be handled with the utmost sensitivity and in accordance with all FERPA guidelines. All foster care related documents should be stored under lock and key with other privacy protected records. Providing training for registrars, counselors, and school staff on confidentiality and sensitivity when enrolling students in foster care is highly recommended.

Enrollment Conferences

TAC § 89.1605(b)

Local Education Agencies must convene an enrollment conference with a student who is homeless or in foster care within the first two weeks, or as soon as feasible, after a student who is homeless or in substitute care enrolls at a new school. The student's participation in the meeting should be addressed on a case-by-case basis. The convening cannot delay or impede enrollment.

The enrollment conference may be used in conjunction with an existing meeting that is designed for a similar purpose for newly enrolled students.

An **Enrollment Conference** is a student-centered meeting for a newly enrolled student designed to:

- » Identify academic and extracurricular interests.
- » Review credits and assessment information.
- » Introduce school processes and opportunities for engagement.
- » Determine social-emotional support.
- » Develop course and instructional strategies.
- » Communicate confidential information that may impact a student's success, if needed.

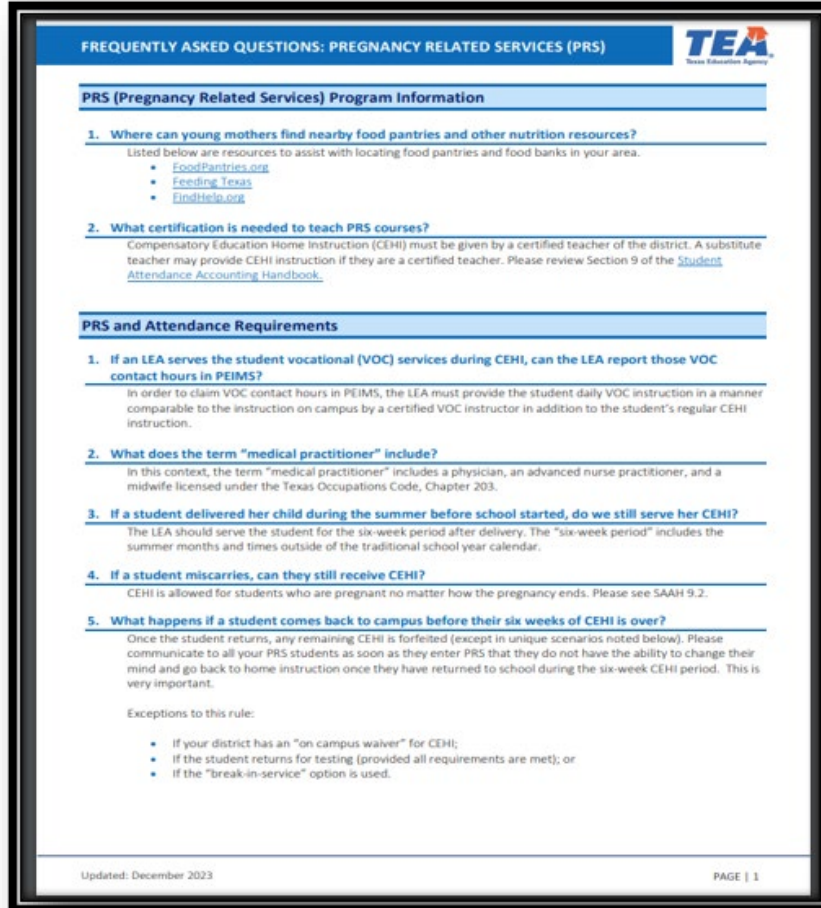

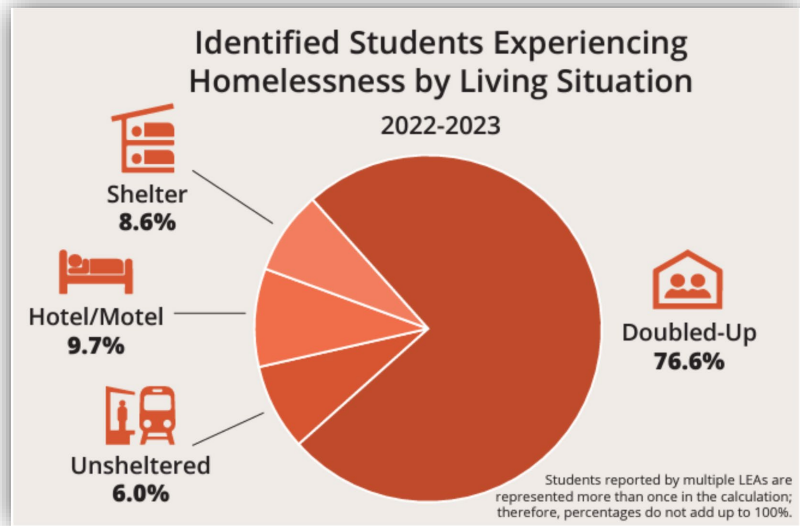

Overview

Students experiencing homelessness face many educational barriers due to the challenges of not having a fixed, regular and adequate place to live. In many cases, schools become the place where students are afforded stability, safety and support. However, chronic absenteeism, truancy and behaviors that lead to disciplinary challenges are common occurrences for students experiencing homelessness.

States and local educational agencies (LEAs) must review requirements in law and regulations and undertake steps to revise any practices or policies that act as a barrier to the identification, enrollment, attendance, or success of students experiencing homelessness ([42 USC, Section 11431](#)).

In accordance with [Texas Education Code \(TEC\), Section 37.001](#), student disciplinary decisions must consider the “status as a student who is homeless” as a factor, regardless of the action being mandatory or discretionary and whether it is concerning suspension, removal to DAEP (Disciplinary Alternative Education Program), expulsion or placement in JJAEP (Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program).

Furthermore, in accordance with [TEC, Section 37.005\(d\)](#), a school district or open-enrollment charter school may not place a student who is experiencing homelessness in out-of-school suspension (OSS) unless the student engages in conduct described by [TEC Section 37.005\(c\)\(1\)-\(3\)](#) while on school property or while attending a school-sponsored or school-related activity on or off of school property. The campus behavior coordinator may coordinate with the school system’s homeless education liaison to identify appropriate alternatives to out-of-school suspension for these students. Additionally, school systems must ensure that these students have an alternative means of receiving coursework if they are suspended, including at least one option that does not require the use of the internet ([TEC Section 37.005\(e\)](#)).

The purpose of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act is to identify and remove barriers for children and youth experiencing homelessness and ensure that students in these circumstances have equitable access to all available supports and resources to meet the same challenging state academic standards established for all students.

Who is Covered by the McKinney-Vento Act?

Children and youth who lack a **fixed**, **regular**, and **adequate** nighttime residence, including those who:

- Are sharing the housing of other persons (doubled up) due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; or are abandoned in hospitals.
- Have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.
- Are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings; and
- Are migratory children living in the above circumstances.
- Unaccompanied youth include a homeless child or youth not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.

Did You Know?

Children and youth experiencing homelessness face many educational barriers due to the disruption and trauma of not having a **fixed**, **regular**, and **adequate** place to live. In many cases, schools often become the one place where these children and youth are afforded **stability**, **safety**, and **support**. Chronic absenteeism, truancy, and behaviors that lead to disciplinary challenges can be common for students experiencing homelessness.

State and local educational agencies must review and undertake steps to revise any requirements in laws, regulations, practices, or policies that may act as a barrier to the identification of, or the enrollment, attendance, or success in school of, children and youths experiencing homelessness ([42 USC §11431](#)).

Disciplinary Challenges

Disruptive or defiant behaviors, such as Fight-Flight-Freeze responses, can be a result of situationally developed trauma for a student experiencing homelessness. These could include, but are not limited to:

- Prolonged lack of basic needs (e.g., food, water, clothing, etc.)
- Frequent transitions between temporary living locations and changing of schools.
- Gaps in academic and functional abilities (e.g., below grade level achievement, difficulty establishing relationships and trust with adults and peers, etc.)

Toxic stress from Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) can change brain development and affect how the body responds to stress. LEAs should be aware of how trauma can impact the behavior of students experiencing homelessness (<https://nnd4youth.org/learn/trauma-informed-care-toolkit/>).

The McKinney-Vento Act does not grant exemption from standard local discipline policies. All students, including those students experiencing homelessness, must abide by the same Student Code of Conduct as their non-homeless peers.

However, when behaviors are directly related to a student's homelessness (e.g., tardiness, absenteeism), state law does have specific prohibitions and considerations for children and youth who are experiencing homelessness.

Prevention Measures for Chronic Absenteeism and Truancy

Before you count a student as truant, have you:

- Developed a behavior improvement plan?
- Offered school-based community service?
- Referred the student to services aimed at addressing the student's truancy (e.g., counseling, mediation, mentoring, a teen court program, community-based services, or other in-school or out-of-school services). Texas Education Code ([TEC § 25.0915](#))

A school district **must offer additional counseling** to a student and **may not refer the student to truancy court** under Section 25.0951 or any other provision if the school determines that the student's truancy is the result of... homelessness.

19 Texas Administrative Code (TAC) §129.1043

Discipline Considerations

Disciplinary decisions must take into consideration 'a student's status as a student who is homeless' as a factor in each decision, regardless of whether the action is a mandatory or discretionary action. This includes suspension, removal to Disciplinary Alternative Education Program (DAEP), expulsion, or placement in Juvenile Justice Alternative Education (JJAE) program ([TEC §37.001](#)).

LEAs are prohibited from placing a homeless student in out of school suspension (OSS) **unless** the student engages in conduct described by Subsections TEC §37.005(c)(1)-(3) while on school property or while attending a school-sponsored or school-related activity on or off of school property [TEC §37.005(d)]. TEC §37.005(b) limits the disciplinary removals for in school suspension (ISS) and OSS to a 3-day maximum length of term. [TEC §37.005](#)



Discuss **alternatives** to OSS for a student experiencing homelessness. [TEC §37.005\(d\)](#)

Administrator considered student's homelessness and recommends assignment of suspension [i.e., ISS or OSS as described by Subsections [TEC §37.005\(c\)\(1\)-\(3\)](#)]

District must provide **at least one** option for receiving the course work that **does not** require the use of the **Internet**. [TEC §37.005\(e\)](#)

During the period of the student's suspension, an **alternative** means of receiving all course work must be provided in the classes in the foundation curriculum under [§28.002\(a\)\(1\)](#) that the student misses due to the suspension.

If School of Origin transportation is being provided, it must continue to be provided if a placement at DAEP is determined.

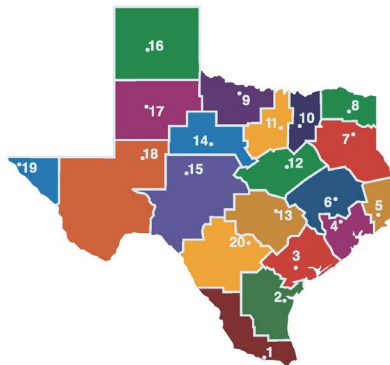

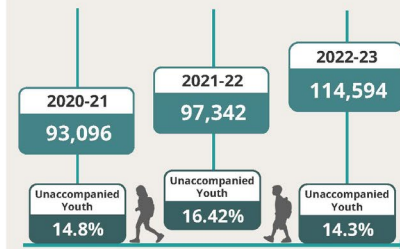
McKinney-Vento eligible students have the right to:

- ✓ Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- ✓ Enroll in the local school or continue attending their school of origin.
- ✓ Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- ✓ Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if requested.
- ✓ Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- ✓ Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to the student's needs.



Each of the 20 Regional Education Service Centers has a designated [Regional McKinney-Vento Liaison](#) who provides technical assistance and training to Local Educational Agencies (LEAs).

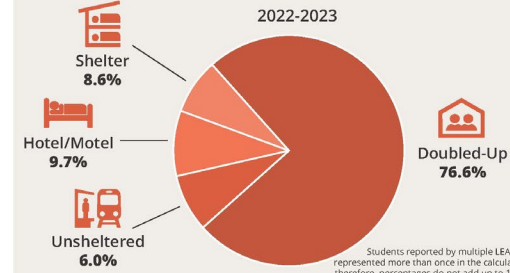
Students Experiencing Homelessness in Texas Public Schools

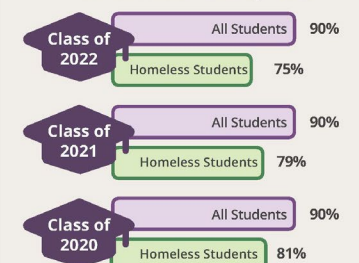
Identified Students Experiencing Homelessness by Living Situation 2022-2023



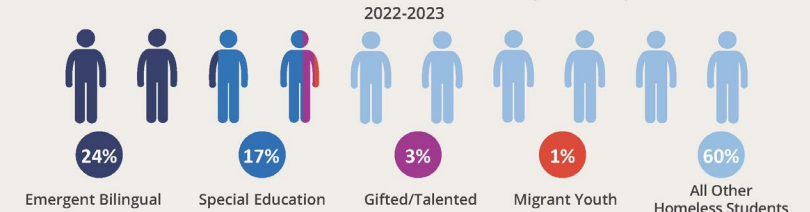

Military-Connected Student Program Updates

Beginning of the Year – Recommended Key Activities:

- Ensure district and campus Military Family webpages are updated with fall enrollment and registration resources, calendars, and supports
- Schedule and provide district and campus professional development on supporting military-connected students
- Review the Interstate Compact (TEC §162) with staff
- Host beginning of the year transition meetings with students to include:
 - building tours, transcript review services, graduation plans, extracurriculars, clubs and activities, etc.
 - Ensure military-connected students are enrolled in appropriate academic programming (e.g. G/T, SPED, AP, etc)

Beginning of the Year – Recommended Key Activities

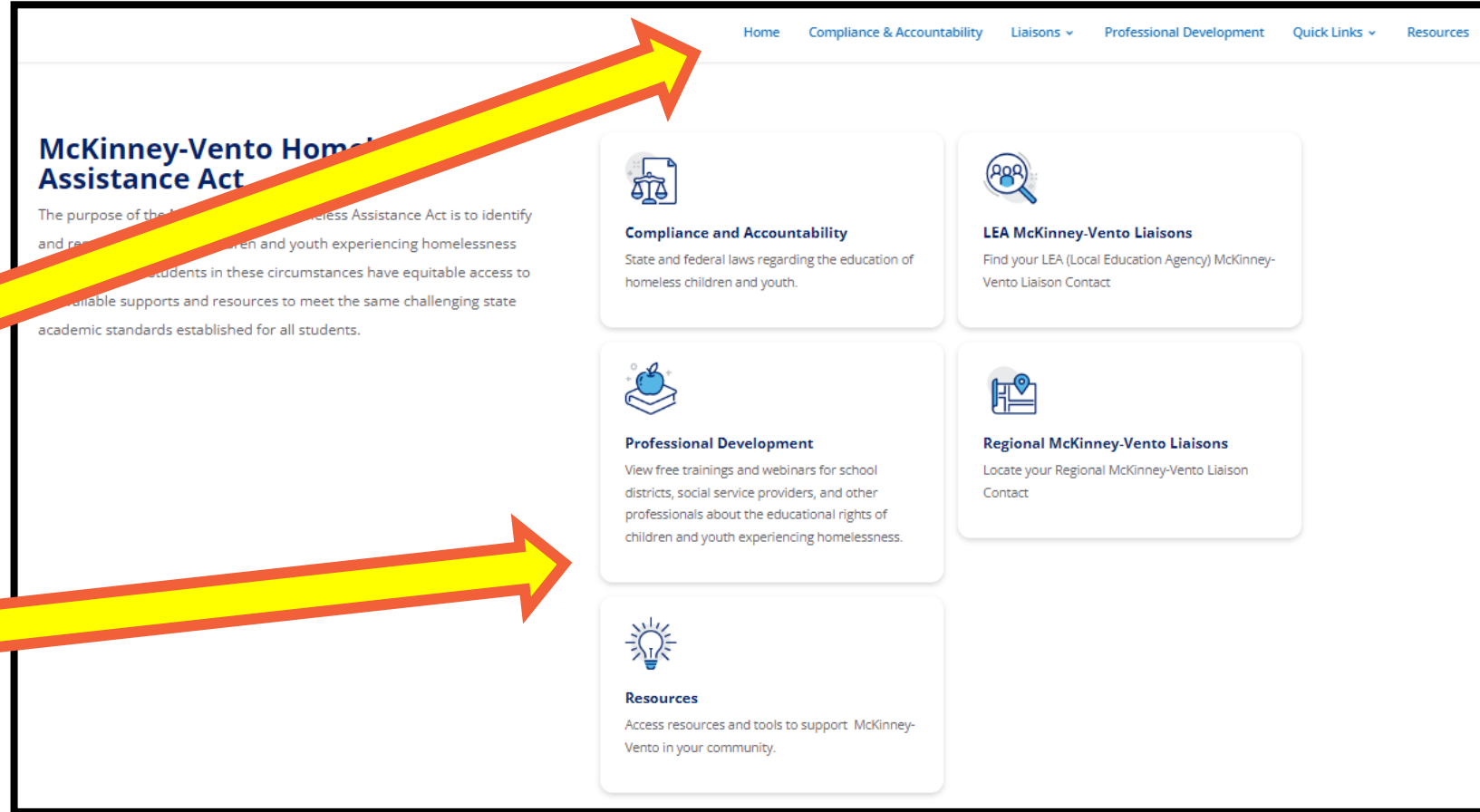

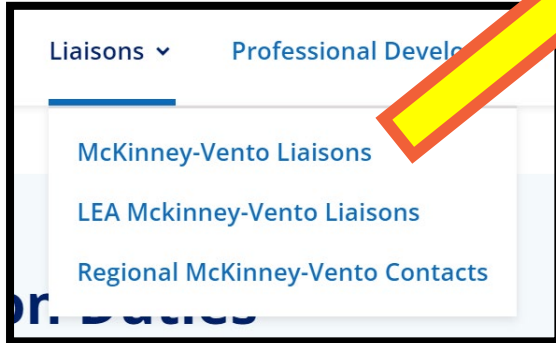

McKinney-Vento Liaison Duties

Identify

Identify students experiencing homelessness in collaboration with school personnel and other organizations and agencies.

Enrollment

Ensure students experiencing homelessness are enrolled and provided equitable access to succeed in school.

Access to Services

Ensure students experiencing homelessness and families have access to educational services for which they are eligible.

Referrals

Provide referrals for medical, housing, and other appropriate services for students experiencing homelessness.

Inform

Inform parents or guardians of educational opportunities available to students and how they can participate in their student's education.

Post Educational Rights

Post educational rights in locations frequented by students, parents, guardians, and unaccompanied youth.

Mediate Disputes

Ensure enrollment disputes are mediated in accordance with local, state, and federal guidelines.

Transportation

Inform parents, guardians, and unaccompanied youth of all transportation services available, including school of origin transportation.

Professional Development

Provide school personnel professional development and supports to ensure identification of McKinney-Vento eligible students.

Unaccompanied Youth

Ensure unaccompanied youth (UY) are enrolled in school, have opportunities to meet the same state academic standards as housed students, and are informed of their independent status for the purpose of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).



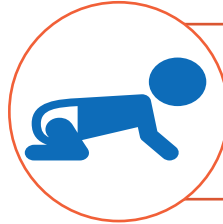
