





The agency has several opportunities for stakeholders, including LEAs, to engage with the agency in determining the types of activities described in the Excel Interactive Spreadsheet. Agency staff meet regularly with LEA directors of special education through both formal and informal activities to assess their needs. This includes a state developed special education director panel that meets on a regular cadence that is designed to reflect both the geographic diversity of the state and the diversity of the state's over 1,200 LEAs. There are 20 regional education service centers (ESCs) in Texas, with which the agency interacts consistently to leverage their close relationships with their local LEAs. Weekly meetings are held with ESC staff, and all departments within the agency's Office of Special Populations and Student Supports have regular contact and communication with ESC leadership and staff to maintain two-way communication on the needs across the state.

One item often communicated is that needs change quickly, and they prefer for the state to adapt to emerging needs as expeditiously as possible. Therefore, being able to allocate funds into different activities as needs emerge is a flexibility that is reflected in the state's worksheet. Monitoring teams also engage in technical assistance with LEAs in strategic support plans derived from student outcome data in the Results Driven Accountability (RDA) system, where districts identify specific technical assistance needed to support their student populations. As agency staff actively engage with LEAs and ESCs throughout a grant year, it is imperative that we are able to target initiatives and supplement those initiatives as we are able. The agency takes all this information to use flexibility in issuing funds and initiating projects to meet the diverse and targeted needs of the demographics across our state.



### **B.** Significant Disproportionality
