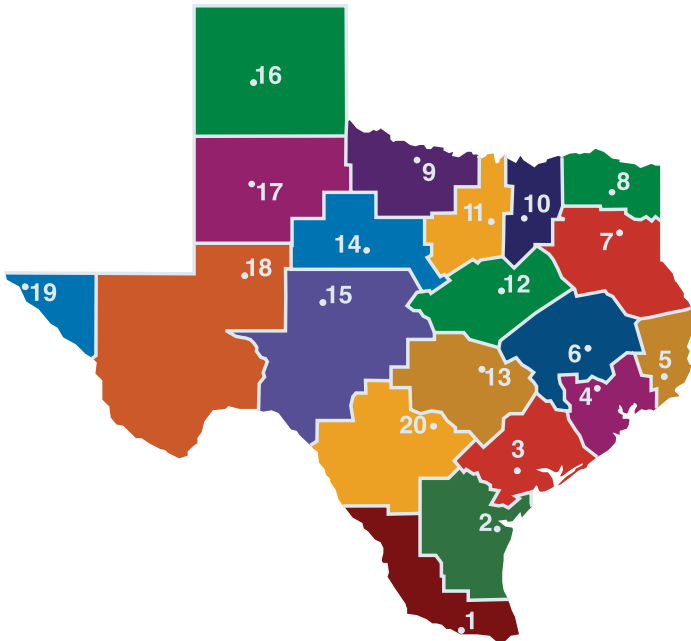

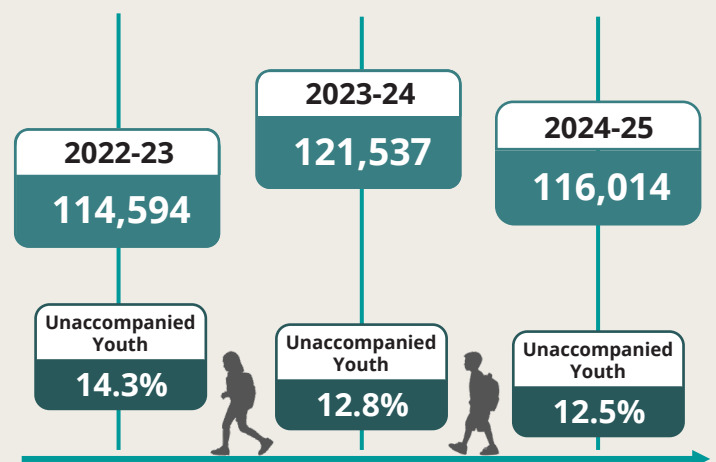
McKinney-Vento eligible students have the right to:

- ✓ Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- ✓ Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- ✓ Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- ✓ Enroll in the local school or continue attending their school of origin.
- ✓ Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if requested.
- ✓ Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to the student's needs.



Each of the 20 Regional Education Service Centers (ESCs) has a designated [Regional McKinney-Vento Liaison](#) who provides technical assistance and training to Local Educational Agencies (LEAs).

Students Experiencing Homelessness in Texas Public Schools

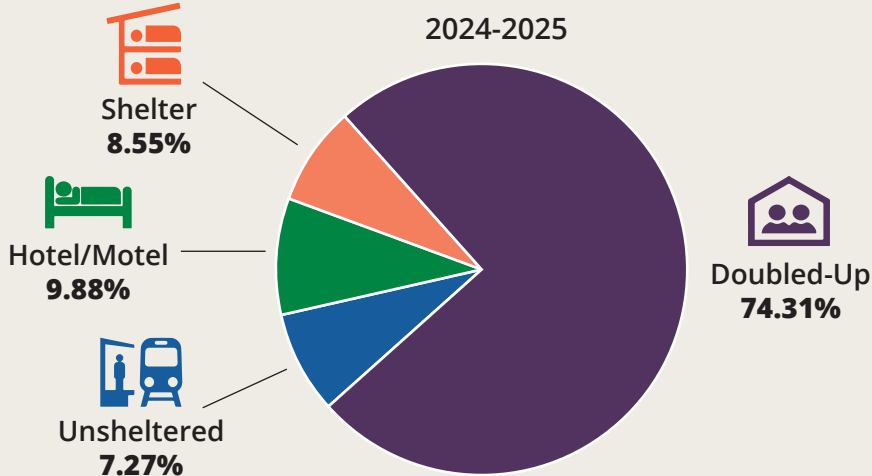


At the close of the 2024-25SY, Texas LEAs submitted a total of 119,791 records of students experiencing homelessness. Of these submissions, 6.1% pertained to students who appeared more than once in the statewide data (i.e., students who changed schools and were reported as homeless by more than one school district). The above analysis presents the overall number of students experiencing homelessness as the unduplicated student count, while percentage figures in this infographic are calculated from all records in the statewide data set.

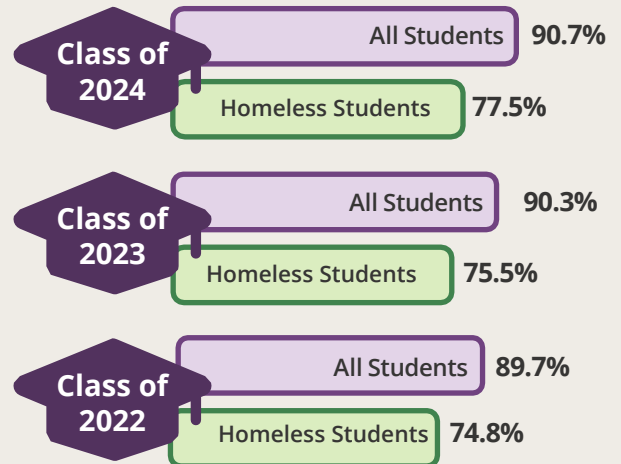
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Identified Students Experiencing Homelessness by Living Situation

2024-2025

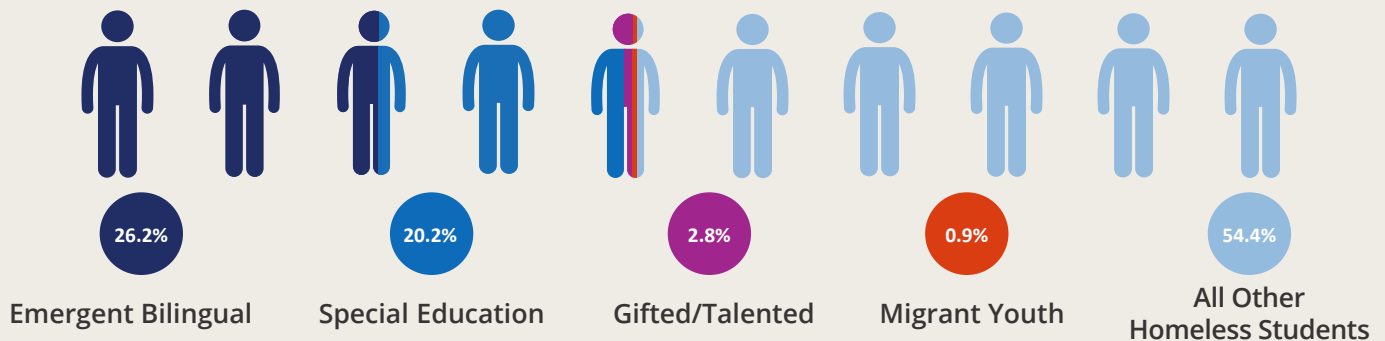


Graduation Rate by Year
