State Board of Education: 2024 Heroes for Children Award

The SBOE is accepting nominations for the 2024 Heroes for Children Award, celebrating 30 years of honoring exceptional volunteers in Texas education.

Each year, the SBOE selects 15 people, one from each member's district, to be recognized as heroes. To be eligible for nomination, candidates must volunteer their time, effort, service, and support to public schools and students.

Nominations close on July 12, and honorees will be celebrated at the September SBOE general meeting in Austin.

Social Studies Timely Topic: Texas Observes Juneteenth Holiday

Throughout history, many dedicated Americans have fought for freedom. On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, and slaves in Union-occupied areas of Confederate states became free men, women, and children. Two and a half years later, in June of 1865, more

than 2,000 federal soldiers led by Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Texas. Granger's men marched throughout Galveston delivering the news of liberation. It was from that moment that Juneteenth was born.

Texas House Bill 1016, passed in the 66th Texas Legislature, Regular Session, declared June 19, "Emancipation Day in Texas," a legal state holiday effective starting in 1980. Texas was the first state to designate Juneteenth as a holiday. In 2021, President Biden signed bipartisan legislation into law, making Juneteenth the 11th holiday recognized by the federal government. President Biden called Opal Lee, who at the age of 89 walked from her home in Fort Worth to Washington, D.C., "a grandmother of the movement to make Juneteenth a federal holiday."
