Identify & Address Needs: (10 Points): • Multiple Data Sources used, & stakeholder feedback provided when conducting need assessment: LJISD Administration and campus leadership conducted a robust needs assessment process that 1) Identified academic needs/gaps of each campus not currently being served by ACE as well as those that were about to end ACE cycle 10 to determine academic needs/gaps (student performance & teaching staff certifications & years of experience,2) Identified academic gaps created due to COVID-19 pandemic, 3) Requested campus leadership feedback letters of commitment to ensure stakeholder commitment of participation on the 21st CCLC Cycle 12 program and, 4) Analyzed resources available to the community in order to asses specific needs of each campus selected for participation. Student performance in state & district assessments, attendance, graduation, completion rate, discipline reports, currently offered instructional programs and current available infrastructure as well as staff certifications & yrs. of experience were analyzed. The Curriculum & Evaluation Dept. compared data from 2021, and 2022 and while student data shows some improvement from 2021 to 2022, it is undeniable that the additional support the ACE Cycle 12 program could potentially offer, the program would be instrumental to ensure a steady increase in academic achievement levels. Feedback and data sources were utilized to formulate a program plan that includes a high quality after school program with HIT for identified students as per data analyzed to be implemented by highly qualified 21st CCLC Coordinators (See Attached Job Description for Elementary & Middle School ACE Coordinators). • Why the needs assessment indicates the need for afterschool and summer programs: Data analysis indicates that while students have slowly been closing the gap created by the COVID-19 pandemic, additional support is needed which can be provided through the 21st CCLC ACE Cycle 12 program academic enrichment and HIT support. • How will the proposed program address those needs, including the needs of working families: LJISD intends to serve a total of 1,125 students at 10 campuses and of the 1,125 students, 500 students will also receive HIT (High Impact Tutoring) services. Campuses surveyed and analyzed to participate in the program meet the criteria of being identified as located in high poverty area. The LJISD student population to be served includes Minority students, At Risk Students 80.81%, Economically Disadvantaged 93.62%, ELL 57.28%, Students w/Disabilities 11.95%, Migrants 1.14% (District Demographics PEIMS Fall 2022 Report). Each of the 10 campuses will serve students that meet one or more demographic criteria to participate in the 21st CCLC Cycle 12 program. • How will the needs assessment inform the targeted participation numbers for students and adult family members. ACE Coordinators will collaborate with campus leadership, analyze student enrollment & implement a recruitment plan for qualifying students that will benefit the most from the program. Recruitment plan will include contacting parents and community, enrichment activities for students after school, parental component to offer parents opportunities to be engaged in their child's education as well as opportunities to gain skills to improve financial literacy, self sufficiency, attend Social Emotional programs and provide center hours to meet needs of working families that have students participating in ACE. ACE Coordinators will continuously assess enrollment.

To Ensure SMART Goals progress & successful measure of implementation, the following milestones will be implemented: First-Quarter Benchmark:

- 1) Receive NOGA July 2023 and ensure LJISD Board Agenda Item is submitted to accept grant.
- 2) Setup all Grant Accounts with District Accountant. 3) Collaborate with HR to assemble an Interview Committee composed of Principals from the ACE Campuses and post ACE positions to hire a Director, Coordinator, Program Specialist & Secretary as soon as possible. 4) ACE Coordinators will analyze data to Identify & Recruit At Risk, ELL, Minority and Sp. Ed students to participate in the ACE program and receive HIT services. 5. Advertise ACE Program to students, parents, community, teachers, staff & recruit certified teachers and tutors to impart after school instruction and start parent components and activities. 6) Data entry and reports will be entered by ACE Staff & Director to full grant compliance with TEA.

Second -Quarter Benchmark:

- 1) Ensure all ACE selected Campuses have been properly staffed with an ACE Coordinators.
- 2) Start Operations of all ACE after school centers as per Center Operations Schedule.
- 3) Director collaborates/meets with Campus Coordinators & Campus Administration to review data to evaluate progress: Attendance Report, Grade Reports, Parent Meeting Logs and Discipline Report. 4)Continue Identifying & Recruit At Risk, ELL, Minority, 504, RTI and Sp. Ed students to participate in the program. 5) Ensure adequate pool of highly qualified certified teachers is in place to provide after school ACE services. 6) Collaboration between ACE Coordinator/Director & Campus Leadership to ensure academic needs of students being serviced are addressed (Coordinator planning with after school teachers and regular instruction teachers) during PLC and Conference times to ensure after-school instruction is aligned to regular instructional day.7) Program Specialist Coordinators conduct at least 2 parent information sessions per 6 weeks for parents of all ACE centers. 8) Data entry and reports will be entered by ACE Staff & Director to ensure full grant compliance with TEA.

Third - Quarter Benchmark:

- 1) Director collaborates/meets with Campus Coordinators to review data to evaluate progress: Campus Benchmark Reports, State Assessment Reports, Attendance Report, Grade Reports, Parent Meeting Logs and Discipline Report.
- 2) Ensure ACE operations after school are occurring as scheduled (sign-in, time-sheets, student attendance).
- 3) CTE, STEM / STEAM Activity Camps to increase ACE student participation and retention. 4) Tutoring Sessions (tailored based on students' needs) will be offered at all centers. 5) Provide PBIS motivation activities each 6 weeks grading period to participating students whose attendance improve by 2%. 6) Program Specialist oversees professional development, selection, design and implementation of family engagement activities that increase family literacy and meaningful connections to school-day learning such as parent information sessions, self-sufficiency classes, ELL classes, Parenting, Computer Literacy, Financial Literacy ...etc). 7) Data entry and reports will be entered by ACE Staff & Director to full grant compliance with TEA.

Project Evaluation data will be constantly reviewed to ensure program is performing as required. Data reports will be produced and evaluated every 3 weeks (twice every 6 weeks grading period). A Program Review Time line will be created by ACE Director and reviewed for input of Campus Principals from participating campuses for final approval. Statutory Program Requirements (25 Points) Strategies & Activities of sufficient quality & depth to ensure accomplishment of the goals and objectives of the grant program as outlined in the program guidelines. LJISD's proposed ACE Program will improve student academic achievement by incorporating key research strategies into the program design to: 1) Target Academic Support through a) Aligning the Program Academically with the School Day and targets TEKS & STAAR students with most needs b)Adapt Instruction to Individual and Small Group Needs in order to provide high quality student activities including HIT: LJISD Texas ACE Programs will align with the school day. Program activities will be specifically targeted to address student needs on TEKS standards, LJISD instructional goals and Campus Improvement Plans (CIP). Current district/campus resources will be maximized to address campus needs and ACE funding will supplement and not supplant existing programs. Summer programs will provide interventions for students based on their struggling areas of need to ensure individualized needs are addressed and campus academic ratings improve. LJISD will use technology resources to increase student participation and engagement and provide resources to students through CLEVER, myON, Reading Renaissance. These programs provide students with access to electronic books, audio books for students and families that will improve and increase student's and community literacy. LJISD recently started implementing the myON to provide students with reading materials due to online instruction for students asynchronous instruction due to COVID-19. Academic enrichment activities will be provided that will incorporate STEAM, STEM, and Work Based Learning hands-on teaching practices that will reinforce regular school day instruction. LJISD will provide tutoring, homework assistance, State Assessment Preparation (SAP) sessions for STAAR, TELPAS as well as activities that promote and encourage students to embrace a college going culture and connect students with orientation to current career pathways. ACE Site Coordinators will carefully review data to ensure activities & support are appropriately adapted to provide participating students with academic & social & emotional skill development activities. According to State of the State National Council on Teacher Quality "children deserve access to well-prepared teachers with a strong foundation in their subject area, the instructional skills to accelerate learning, and the understanding to support and inspire." (https://www.nctq.org/publications/State-ofthe-States-2021:-Teacher-Preparation-Policy). LJISD will implement a high quality afterschool instructional enrichment program that will serve students with a highly qualified staff: Director: Masters Degree in Education (required), 5 years Administrative Experience in Education (required), Valid Core Area Teacher Certification & additional experience (required), see attached job description. ACE Site Coordinators: Bachelors Degree in Education or related field required, Masters Degree preferred, Teaching experience in content area preferred, 3 years ACE Program/After School Experience Required. ACE Program Specialist: Bachelor's Degree in Education from an accredited College or Univ. with a major in Curriculum & Instruction Required. Master's Degree in Education Preferred. Teaching experience preferred. Having staff that has a strong foundation and the instructional skills to accelerate learning will facilitate implementation.

2) Student Interest-based Enrichment through a) Maximizing Student Participation and Attendance through engaging activities targeting high needs students and b) Providing Engaging Learning Experiences at all ACE Centers: LJISD will offer after school activities that encourage, attract students & families to participate and are academically and culturally appropriate to all participants. LJISD will ensure families have active, meaningful participation in their student's education by providing parents with PD on how to access student grades, literacy courses, career choices, connections to Texas Workforce Development sessions, workshops & job fairs. Feedback will be constantly collected & reviewed by campus and district administration to ensure academic and enrichment activities reflect the students & parent's interests and provide student's voice and choice. LJISD's Texas ACE Centers will incorporate hands-on enrichment activities, STEAM, STEM, Fine Arts, and exciting curriculum that is aligned to the school day to ensure student academic success. Enrichment activities will supplement and not supplant current campus efforts. Activities such as Health, Nutrition, Fine Arts, STEM, STEAM, Self-Sufficiency, Technology, Culinary Arts, Gardening will be offered at all participating Texas ACE Centers.

3) Family Engagement: LJISD will incorporate engaging opportunities at all Texas ACE Centers for families of participating students. Parents will have access to technology training, self-sufficiency training, counseling, Texas Workforce Development, English Language classes, and GED classes, just to name a few. The Family Engagement Specialist will collaborate with LJISD partners and the LJISD's Parental Involvement Department to ensure participating families receive the services and support needed to ensure the educational excellence of their student(s).

ENHANCE ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE & ACHIEVEMENT: LJISD will implement best practices at each ACE center by ensuring Coordinators with a Bachelor's in Education or related field and prior ACE / After School program implementation experience are hired. ACE Coordinators will have the experience, capacity and leadership skills to provide guidance to teachers and mentors that will impart after-school instruction to students that aligns directly with the regular school day instruction. Having the ability to impart and model instruction for mentors/tutors as well as analyze student data and determine instructional areas of needs is key to enhancing student academic performance, achievement, postsecondary and workforce preparation.

POSTSECONDARY & WORKFORCE PREPARATION: LJISD will implement research-based programs to increase postsecondary and workforce preparation. Incorporation of activities that promote a college going culture at all 10 ACE campuses such as College Tours, Career Awareness Visits, and Transition from Elem. to Middle School Seminars will ensure elementary students transitioning to Middle School have a clear vision of the career pathway and CTE programs of study they can select as they prepare for Middle School & High School. Students will learn what Industry Based Certifications they can earn upon entering high school as well as the careers they can pursue upon high school graduation (https://tea.texas.gov/academics/college-careerand-military-prep/career-and-technicaleducation).

Statutory Program Requirements (25 Points)

La Joya ISD will open 10 Texas ACE Center locations. Placing centers at campus locations will ensure centers are safe and easily accessible to students and parents. La Joya ISD will provide safe transportation to and from each center and home by following district transportation policies and providing qualified adult supervision. Budgetary needs were considered and addressed in the budget section of this application to ensure transportation needs are addressed and supplement and not supplant currently provided transportation services.

Regular Program Hours: Transportation for students only after school since the centers are housed at fully functional campuses.

Weekends and Summers: Weekends and Summer program transportation will be available for all participating students. Transportation will include pick-up and drop off of students at their homes or designated pick up location.

Enrichment Travel: Centers may provide students with college trips, museums, and/or other educational related travel. Transportation will be provided for students on these event. Students will be picked up at designated center/ location and returned to designated center/location and/or home.

Options: Parents that prefer to pick up their child(ren) will be required to provide a Participant's Parental Consent Form prior to joining activities. This form will be completed by all students when joining an ACE Center and will identify the method by which the student will travel to / leave the program each day. Parents (Guardians) will be required to provide information (name and relationship) of any individual that will be allowed to pick-up a student. Students leaving early from the program must signed out by an approved parent / guardian and provide proper identification to campus staff. District guidelines will be adhered to to ensure the safety of all participating students.

La Joya ISD will create a comprehensive plan to disseminate information to the community regarding the 2023-2024 CCLC Cycle 12 that includes 1) Video Broadcasting, 2) Social Media (Facebook, Twitter, and District Website) and 3) Parent Connection 4) Diamond News (District Newspaper distributed to all students at La Joya ISD).

- 1) Video Broadcasting: La Joya ISD will broadcast to all La Joya ISD community (La Joya, Sullivan City, Peñitas, Palmview and Mission Texas) via TV Channel 17 information about the Texas Ace Centers. In collaboration with the La Joya ISD Public Information Department, a wide exposure campaign will be implemented to ensure all parents at participating campuses are informed of the centers and the services that can be accessed at each center.
- 2) Social Media: La Joya ISD has a very strong team of professionals in charge of the district's Social Media sector. In collaboration with the Public Information Department, La Joya ISD will ensure that information about the ACE Program is constantly advertised and provided to community members to ensure wide coverage and information dissemination. The information will be shared to all community via Face-book, Twitter and District Website as well as each individual campus website where each 21st CCLC ACE Centers will be located.
- 3)Parent Connection: La Joya ISD will utilize the Parent Connection system to send out district wide messages via phone and/or text to parents / community members informing them of the services provided at each location. The messaging service provides the ability to reach every parent for which the district has a phone number as well as the ability to send text messages with links embedded into the text message to access flyer and pamphlets with additional information about the Texas ACE centers. All information will be distributed in a manner that is easy to understand & culturally appropriate to our community. Information will go out in English and Spanish (written and/ printed) and will be accessible in the district website. Additionally, a La Joya ISD Texas ACE Website will be created with an individual page for each ACE campus to disseminate information and updates.4) Diamond News distribution

La Joya ISD will encourage and use appropriately qualified persons to serve as volunteers during the implementation of the Texas ACE Program Cycle 12. La Joya ISD plans to partner with South Texas College and The University of Texas RGV to solicit volunteers from their Teacher/ Education Preparation Programs. This will provide a more cost-effective program and will aid in sustainability of the program beyond its funding cycle. The Program Director will meet with the appropriate staff from South Texas College and UTRGV to present the program and activities that will be offered during the program. Volunteers will be able to serve as:

- * Mentors for at risk students
- * Provide Homework Assistance
- * Supervise enrichment activities
- * Provide one-on-one tutoring

Policy for Screening and Placing Volunteers: La Joya ISD will adhere to all Texas statutes as well as District requirements for all volunteers who participate in the program. Participating individuals will be fingerprinted and undergo a criminal background check to ensure the safety of all participants served in the program. Once approved to volunteer, a training plan will be provided by the Project Director and/or the Site Coordinator. This will prepare the volunteer with the necessary skills to safely care and provide services for the students.

Additional locations will be reviewed and targeted to recruit volunteers once volunteers from STC and UTRGV have been acquired and placed. Such locations include but are not limited to: Rotary Clubs, PTA organizations, Parents and more.

Recruiting volunteers from Colleges and Universities is intended to provide students with high quality services and at the same time help future educators acquire the experience to serve students in a real education setting.

In order to maximize program funding Cycle 12 program will conduct an inventory of all current cycle 10 program assets (Cycle 10 ending June 30, 2022) which will be assigned to Cycle 12 (once they are services and verified by La Joya ISD Technology Department) in order to maximize budget spending. Additionally, In order to maximize program funding and to ensure students receive additional services, La Joya ISD will wave \$75,200 in Administrative costs (3.160%) of the 5% allowable \$100,000. ACE Coordinators will plan during conference & PLC time with teachers and prepare lesson plans to target after-school student's needs. This will ensure activities will be specifically targeted to address student needs on TEKS standards. LJISD instructional goals & CIP will be reviewed to ensure current district / campus resources are maximized to address campus needs & ACE funding will supplement not supplant existing programs. ACE Summer program will provide interventions for students based on their struggling areas of need to ensure individualized needs are addressed & campus academic ratings improve.
