

College Admissions Testing Results for Graduating Seniors in Texas and the United States, Class of 2023

This report presents SAT and ACT examination participation and performance data for graduating seniors in Texas and the United States in public and nonpublic schools combined. College admissions examination results are used by some colleges and universities to make admissions decisions and to place students in appropriate freshman courses. In Texas, moreover, results for public school students are used in the public school accountability system in evaluating the performance of districts and campuses in the assignment of rating labels and in awarding distinction designations, which recognize school districts and campuses for outstanding achievement in specified academic areas (Texas Education Agency [TEA], 2024; Texas Education Code [TEC] Chapter 39, Subchapter G, 2024, as of July 9, 2024). In addition, results are used in determining eligibility for student exemptions from Texas Success Initiative assessment requirements, in substituting for certain end-of-course assessments to meet graduation requirements, and in awarding College, Career, and Military Readiness Outcomes Bonuses to districts (Title 19 of the Texas Administrative Code §101.4002, 2024, amended to be effective August 9, 2022; TEC §§39.025, 2024, amended to be effective June 9, 2023 and 48.110, 2024, amended to be effective September 1, 2021).

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the College Board offered the SAT in schools in fall 2020 to replace canceled SAT school day administrations in spring 2020. The College Board also offered a new weekend SAT administration in September (College Board, 2020). ACT, Inc., added three weekend ACT administrations to its fall 2020 testing schedule, increased school-day testing, and instituted pop-up testing sites (ACT, Inc., 2021). In the 2021-22 and 2022-23 school years, the College Board offered the same number of weekend and school-day testing dates as they did pre-pandemic in 2018-19. In the 2022-23 school year, ACT, Inc., offered the same number of weekend administrations, and one more school day testing administration, as they did pre-pandemic in 2018-19. Results presented in this report were obtained, when available, from summary reports released annually by the College Board and by ACT, Inc., to TEA. The results are based only on the most recent examinations taken by students identified by the College Board and ACT, Inc., as expecting to graduate

in the reporting year. SAT results for the United States include international students (L. Sveda, personal communication, June 23, 2023). In March 2016, the College Board began administering a redesigned version of the SAT. Results reported by the College Board and presented in this report for class of 2016 graduates include only students who took the previous version of the SAT. In Texas, only a small percentage of class of 2016 graduating seniors took the redesigned SAT. Beginning with class of 2017 graduates, results reported by the College Board and presented in this report include only students who took the redesigned SAT. The majority of graduates in Texas since the class of 2017 have taken the redesigned SAT.

SAT and ACT Participation in Texas and the United States

- In Texas, 278,151 public and nonpublic high school graduates in the class of 2023 took the SAT, and 88,670 took the ACT (Table 1 on this page and Table 2 on page 4). Nationally, 1,913,742 graduates took the SAT, and 1,386,335 took the ACT.
- SAT examinees in Texas made up 14.5 percent of all examinees in the United States. ACT examinees in Texas made up 6.4 percent of all ACT examinees in the United States.
- In Texas, 71 percent of public and nonpublic high school graduates in the class of 2023 took the SAT, and 23 percent took the ACT. Across the United States, 50 percent of graduates took the SAT, and 37 percent took the ACT.
- Between the classes of 2022 and 2023, SAT participation rates increased by 7 percentage points in Texas and by 4 percentage points in the United States. ACT participation rates increased by 1 percentage point each in Texas and in the United States.

SAT and ACT Performance in Texas and the United States

- The average SAT total score for Texas public and nonpublic high school examinees in the class of 2023 was 978, down 23 points from the average for the class of 2022 (Table 3 on page 6). Nationally, the average SAT total score for the class of 2023 was 1028, down 22 points from the average for the class of 2022. The average evidence-based reading and writing and mathematics scores for examinees in the class of 2023 were lower in Texas than in the nation.
- The average ACT composite score for Texas public and nonpublic high school examinees in the class of 2023 was 19.3, down 0.5 points from the average for the class of 2022 (Table 4 on page 9). Nationally, the average composite score for the class of 2023 was 19.5, down 0.3 points from the average for the class of 2022. The average ACT English, reading, and science scores for examinees in the class of 2023 were lower in Texas than in the nation. The average ACT mathematics score for examinees in the class of 2023 was higher in Texas than in the nation.

SAT and ACT Examinee Populations in Texas and the United States

- In Texas, 45.9 percent of SAT examinees in the class of 2023 were Hispanic, 26.9 percent were White, and 11.8 percent were African American (Table 5). Across the United States, by comparison, 24.2 percent were Hispanic, 39.3 percent were White, and 11.8 percent were African American.
- In Texas, 42.6 percent of ACT examinees in the class of 2023 were Hispanic, 32.2 percent were White, and 9.6 percent were African American (Table 6 on page 15). Across the United States, by comparison, 16.9 percent were Hispanic, 52.2 percent were White, and 12.4 percent were African American.
- In Texas, 50.8 percent of SAT examinees in the class of 2023 were female, and 48.8 percent were male (Table 7 on page 15). Across the United States, 50.5 percent of examinees were female, and 48.9 percent were male.
- In Texas, 51.1 percent of ACT examinees in the class of 2023 were female, and 45.3 percent were male (Table 8 on page 16). Across the United States, 48.7 percent of examinees were female, and 46.4 percent were male.

SAT and ACT Participation and Performance by State

- SAT and ACT participation rates varied considerably across states and the District of Columbia (Table 9 on page 18 and Table 10 on page 20). For the class of 2023, rates of SAT participation ranged from 1 percent to 100 percent, and rates of ACT participation ranged from 2 percent to 100 percent. In Texas, the SAT participation rate was 71 percent, and the ACT participation rate was 23 percent.
