2026 A–F Accountability Framework

The design of A–F reflects a commitment to recognize high student achievement and recognize the impact of highly effective educators on student progress, while maintaining focus on the students most in need. The final rule adopting the [A–F Accountability Rating System Manual](#) for 2026 ratings provides the framework and rules for the accountability system.

2026 A–F Accountability Ratings Results

State of Texas

Over 5.5 million students were enrolled in Texas public schools in the 2025–26 school year, and they took more than eight million STAAR assessments in reading, mathematics, science, and social studies. Of all students who were enrolled and tested in the same district – in the Accountability Subset – 76% met the Approaches Grade Level standard or above, 52% met the Meets Grade Level standard or above, and 24% met the Masters Grade Level standard. This represents an increase in Approaches (1 percentage points), an increase in Meets (2 percentage points), and an increase in Masters (3 percentage point) from 2025.

Of the 399,621 2025 annual graduates evaluated for College, Career, and Military Readiness (CCMR) in accountability, 87 percent met the criteria for one or more indicators. This represents 18,322 more evaluated annual graduates, with an increase of 5 percentage points in the percentage of students meeting CCMR. Statewide, the 2025 4-year graduation rate for all students increased from 90.7 percent to 91.2 percent.

School Districts and Open-enrollment Charter Schools (School Systems)

Of the 1,202 school systems in Texas, 1,186 were evaluated. 196 (16.5%) earned an A overall rating, 552 (46.5%) earned a B overall rating, 340 (28.7%) earned a C overall rating, 78 (6.6%) earned a D overall rating, and 20 (1.7%) earned an F overall rating. Sixteen districts were labeled Not Rated.

Campuses

Of the 9,105 campuses in Texas (including open-enrollment charter campuses, and including campuses evaluated under Alternative Education Accountability), 8,545 received an A-F rating and 560 received a rating of Not Rated. Of the campuses that received an A-F rating, 2,149 (25.1%) earned an A overall rating, 3,083 (36.1%) campuses earned a B overall rating, 2,068 (24.2%) earned a C overall rating, 888 (10.4%) campuses earned a D overall rating, and 357 (4.2%) earned an F overall rating.

Open-Enrollment Charters

Of the 1,202 school systems in Texas, 182 were open-enrollment charter schools and 167 received an A-F rating, while 15 received a rating of Not Rated. Of those that received an A-F rating, 31 (18.6%) earned an A overall rating, 73 (43.7%) earned a B overall rating, 34 (20.4%) earned a C overall rating, 17 (10.2%) earned a D overall rating and 12 (7.2%) earned an F.

Of the 9,105 campuses in Texas, 986 were open-enrollment charter campuses and 848 received an A-F rating, while 138 received a rating of Not Rated. Of those evaluated, 234 (27.6%) earned an A overall rating, 296 (34.9%) earned a B overall rating, 183 (21.6%) earned a C overall rating, 90

(10.6%) earned a D overall rating and 45 (5.3%) earned an F overall rating.

Alternative Education Campuses (AECs)

Of the 9,105 campuses in Texas, 418 campuses identified as AECs on the [2026 Final AEA Campus List](#). 255 received an A-F rating under the Alternative Education Accountability (AEA) provisions and 163 received a rating of Not Rated. Of those that received an A-F rating, 115 (45.1%) earned an A overall rating, 96 (37.6%) earned a B overall rating, 34(13.3%) earned a C overall rating, 10 (3.9%) earned a D overall rating and 0 (0%) earned an F.

Not Rated

Of the 560 campuses that received a rating of Not Rated in 2026, 150 were Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Programs (JJAEPs), 142 were disciplinary alternative education programs (DAEPs), 121 were Residential Treatment Facilities (RTFs), 6 were Early Education campuses, and 51 were adult charter high school campuses authorized under Chapter 12, Subchapter G of the Texas Education Code. Under TEC §12.262 the commissioner will annually evaluate the performance of an adult education charter school according to the performance framework adopted specifically for these schools.

Additionally, 90 did not have STAAR results, did not meet the minimum size, or serve 100% of students that qualify for STAAR Alternate 2 testing, with a significant number of students unable to

provide an authentic academic response. Of the 16 school systems labeled Not Rated, 8 are residential facilities and are excluded from accountability under TEC, §39.055, 4 are adult charters authorized under Chapter 12, Subchapter G of the Texas Education Code per §12.262, and 4 did not have enough STAAR results to meet minimum size.

Distinction Designations

Only campuses and districts that received a scaled score of 70 or greater were eligible for distinction designations. AECs are not eligible for distinction designations. Of the 9,105 campuses in Texas, 7,901 (86.8%) were evaluated for at least one distinction designation. 4,496 (56.9%) campuses earned one or more distinctions while 465 (5.9%) campuses earned every distinction for which they were eligible.
