1. ADSY Program Design: Why does the district want to join the Additional Days School Year (ADSY) Planning and Execution Program? Please specify whether the district is applying as a Voluntary Summer Learning Cohort or a Full Year Redesign district.

Lockhart ISD is applying as a Full Year Redesign district. Our student demographics and performance supports the research that has identified lack of background knowledge and educational opportunities coupled with the impact of summer learning loss. Because of this, we are continually facilitating academic "catch-up." The opportunity to eliminate such long learning breaks for students and provide them with enriching opportunities is the driving force behind Lockhart ISD seeking to participate in ADSY. In addition, the flexibility that ADSY allows to restructure our school day will afford us the space to increase our teacher planning time, provide more opportunities for student brain-breaks and enrichment, as well as offer additional time in our scope and sequence.

The program design we propose would be a pilot approach on one particular campus, set in a very rural area, with a high percentage of economically disadvantaged students and English Language Learners. Alma Brewer Strawn Elementary is a four-year-old school that has had markedly inconsistent data trends during the time it has been opened. From receiving an F rating in 2017, a B in 2018, and again an F rating in 2019, this particular campus is optimal for a program such as ADSY. The unique factors of this campus are that it is approximately 15 miles outside of town and away from any of our other schools. The population consists of 92.2% Hispanic, 87% economically disadvantaged, and 69.4% English Language Learners.

We would look to restructure the school day so that teachers have additional time in planning for academic improvements while affording students additional time for brain-breaks and enrichment. We would be able to accomplish this with 2 additional FTEs. We would run this model for 180 student days. We would then target specific students (22 students per grade level for a total of 132 students) to run an additional 30 calendar days in July and early August. We would utilize our current student performance data sources to identify students who were unlikely to succeed in the next grade without significant, ongoing academic intervention and not able to demonstrate a sufficient understanding of the TEKS.

This would be a half day program, (7:30 am to 11:30 am) focused on reading, math, and enrichment opportunities directly related to supporting these two subjects. In order to establish and strengthen relationships between the teacher and student, the teachers selected for the targeted students would remain the same teacher throughout the 210 school calendar.

3. ADSY Program Design: Describe any prior experience with summer learning programs, extended learning time, or large change management initiatives within the district and include any relevant takeaways from implementing those programs that will be helpful in the implementation of ADSY.

We received the Texas 21st Century Community Learning Centers (ACE program) grant in the Fall of 2018. The grant allowed us to extend the school day and summer learning for a targeted group of students. While we have seen positive success, the relevant takeaway is that we transport the students from their campus and they are not receiving enrichment opportunities from their classroom teachers. We believe the ability for students to continue their learning for additional days/time with their own highly effective teacher will be the game changer and what makes this program different from all the rest. We partnered with Texas State University's LBJ Institute and NASA Future Aerospace Engineers and Mathematicians Academy (FAMA). It provided year-round STEM programming which included STEM Saturdays, English and Spanish hands-on, NASA-focused STEM activities in the Fall of 2018. In Spring 2019, the program expanded to include a take-home backpack project which provided family engagement and additional STEM experiences for students at ABS. Texas State program managers anticipated us only recruiting 45 students. Lockhart ISD exceeded those expectations by doubling the attendance numbers during the STEM Saturdays. Our takeaways from this experience is that if we offer enrichment and learning programs for our students, families will participate which assists in building student's background knowledge. We believe our experience marketing/recruiting students for the FAMA program will assist us with communicating the ADSY program benefits. The student interest in STEM programming could offer a focus to our enrichment programming. Lastly, we realized three years ago that the majority of our students were academically performing more than one year behind, and our top students were not competitive with their peers nationally. Our district, fully supported by our school board, made the decision to commit to 1.5 years growth for all in grades K-8 in both reading and math. We worked with all stakeholders to create systems to support this commitment. We determined how we reviewed data from the classroom to the board room, monitored instruction, and applied strategic pressure paired with focused support. Our relevant takeaway from this experience is when you create space for all stakeholders to be involved in the change management process, you can cultivate and create a culture of excellence to accelerate growth for all students.

We are very fortunate in Lockhart ISD to have the full support of the school board, superintendent, leadership, staff, and community to do whatever it takes to provide the optimal learning environment for our students. This is evident in our goal of growing all of our students 1.5 years in reading in math each year. You will not be on a campus in Lockhart ISD long before it is evident that 1.5 is our focus. In addition, the monthly 1.5 growth data is monitored and reported in all teacher, grade level, campus, district leadership, and school board meetings. This focus has led all decision making for the previous two years which has been the reason for making necessary instructional change throughout the district. We believe that this has led to a positive uptick in student achievement district wide.

5. Commitment and Intent from Leadership: What components of the Planning and Execution requirements does the district believe will be most helpful in leading to a successful program and why?

We believe what will be most helpful and significant in leading a successful program will be stakeholder buy-in. Lockhart ISD has spent the previous two years working with a committee in an effort to implement an extended year calendar. While we made great headway with our staff as evidenced by 60% of our staff voting in favor of approving an extended year calendar district wide, getting our community on board proved to be challenging. Having a project manager who is able to focus their work on these efforts as well as provide assistance in the design and implementation phases will play a significant role in the success of this program.

Alma Brewer Strawn Elementary is a K-5 campus with 500 students. The unique factors of this campus are that it is approximately 15 miles outside of town and away from any of our other schools. This campus is on the northeast side of the school district in the county jurisdiction. It is fairly isolated with a student population consisting of 92.2% Hispanic, 87% economically disadvantaged, and 69.4% English Language Learners. There is a large participation of parents at the school and attendance rate on average of 96%. Strawn Elementary has had very inconsistent data during the time it has been opened. From receiving an "F" rating in 2017, a "B" in 2018, and again an "F" rating in 2019, this particular campus is optimal for a program such as ADSY. Based on 2019 STAAR scores, the percentage of students approaching grade level standards was 58%, meeting grade level standards 25%, and mastering grade level standards 11%. The ADSY model would create the space needed for teacher planning, increased time for student breaks and enrichment opportunities to build background knowledge resulting in academic improvements. Due to the location, differing demographics and student performance data of this campus as compared to other campuses in Lockhart ISD, we believe Alma Brewer Strawn Elementary is the ideal campus to implement a ADSY model.

7. Pilot Approach and Campus Selection: What problem is the district/school attempting to solve by launching the ADSY Program and how does additional days help solve the root cause of the problem? Please specify by school as needed.

The problem the district is trying to solve by implementing an ADSY calendar at Alma Brewer Strawn Elementary is to increase opportunities in building students' background knowledge. While there are certainly gaps in reading, writing, and math, the District believes that the reason these gaps are so difficult to close is that the students at Alma Brewer Strawn have limited background knowledge to anchor new learning. With the Texas Education Agency reporting "61% of students from middle- and upper-income households are reading on grade level in 3rd grade, but only 35% of their low income peers meet grade level." In addition, the Texas Commission of Public School Finance reports, "The impact of summer slide may create a gap of up to three grade levels for low income students by fifth grade." We believe the ADSY model would help by providing additional ramp space needed to make academic improvements for targeted students represented in the 87% of students who are economically disadvantaged on this campus. More than ever, making sure that we educate the whole child must be the focus if we are going to positively impact student achievement of the students at ABS.

Currently we do not have anyone in the district in mind to serve as the ADSY project manager. The first step is to create a job description that includes all of the aspects identified in the planning and execution program, ensuring that the responsibilities and duties clearly match what is needed to develop a program that meets the needs of Alma Brewer Strawn Elementary. For example, obtaining staff, student, and parent buy-in will be key to the success of this program. We will ensure the articulation of the skills needed to work with stakeholders to build consistency and obtain buy-in are outlined as requirements in the job description. Once a clear job description has been created and clearly vetted, the district would conduct an extensive interview process, which will include a campus interview committee. The interview process will focus on the areas identified to be critical to the success of the program created for the students at Strawn Elementary. The project manager will be someone who is dedicated to the implementation of this program. He/She will be someone who will be given authority by the district leadership for decision making flexibility to ensure all program requirements are met.

The ADSY project manager will report directly to the assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction in Lockhart ISD. The assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction is one of five members of the superintendent’s cabinet level team which grants access to leadership to remove barriers. The project manager position will be an integral member of the curriculum and instruction department which will allow them to work side-by-side with the directors of elementary education, bilingual services, and student support services. Decisions will be made in concert with all of these entities which will allow for the ability for swift and accurate decision making.

10. ADSY Program Support: Steering Committee – Who will advise this work at the district by serving on the ADSY Steering Committee and why are these individuals right for this role? The ADSY steering committee will consist of the assistant superintendent of C&I, elementary director, bilingual director, campus principal, campus counselor, campus team leaders, campus RTI teacher, communities in school liaison, and a minimum of three parents and two community members. All of these members are direct stakeholders to the success of Strawn Elementary and are integral parts in not only the planning, but implementation of the program as well. The ADSY project manager would lead the committee and will have a project plan of the work necessary for implementation of the program. The project manager would facilitate monthly meetings to ensure we are responsive to all stakeholder input as each portion of the program design is created and implemented.

On a recent trip to Singapore with the Holdsworth Center, I saw what can happen when an entire nation adopts a growth mindset. A small island nation, Singapore has only one natural resource – its people. Educating and developing each child to reach their highest potential is a top national priority, and they work to get better at it every day.

Most American educators have heard that Singapore's education system is among the best in the world. Seeing it with my own eyes was a transformational experience and I am inspired to do whatever it takes to lead my district to be the best in the world.

While the classrooms I visited in Singapore did not look much different from ours in Lockhart ISD, the time allowed for teachers to spend researching and developing their craft and taking on leadership responsibilities during their standard workday is far greater than in American education. In Singapore, they understand that to produce great results for every student, they need great teachers in every classroom and a great principal in every school.

The way Singapore holds teachers in high regard and is intentional about their development is something I want for Lockhart ISD. I believe we need to show our teachers not just with words but with actions that their experience and ideas are valued. We need to give them the time to grow in their craft and plan for quality instruction that meets the needs of all students.

Lockhart ISD believes that a full year redesign is the type of ambitious initiative well aligned to our culture and goals to ensure excellent and equitable student outcomes. By receiving the planning grant LISD will be able to work with like minded professionals in order to plan a school calendar that can be used to support increases in teacher planning and support as well as enhanced student engagement by increasing access and instruction to build strong background knowledge for all students and support the whole child.

Something I heard from one of Singapore's top officials struck a chord with me. Pak Tee Ng, the associate dean at the National Institute of Education who has trained the majority of principals in Singapore, said they tell their people this: "It's not that what you are doing is not good, but don't let good stand in the way of better." In Lockhart ISD, this is an attitude I want us to embrace. Not because it's broken, but because we owe it to our students and families to always strive for better. Lockhart ISD is committed to allocating the resources and time to successfully redesign our school calendar. Lastly, the LISD Board of Trustees is fully supportive and prepared to take on any challenges that may come from a major shift in our school calendar.
