By the end of the grant term (June 2022), the district will successfully gain support in observations and coaching effectiveness to increase student achievement to achieve an "A" or "B" rating.

The purpose of this work and the goal is to increase the number of students in A and B rated schools by 50%. This grant will enable us to fund additional capacity required to effectively implement instructional fidelity of curricculum and effective walkthrough, coaching, and feedback cycles that lead to student achievement. This campus will prioritize and guarentee enrollment for students who attend or would attend a federally designated comprehensive or targeted campus.
