Afterschool presents a critical opportunity to continue the purposeful integration of social-emotional and academic skill development characterizing the school day. Afterschool programs aligned with classroom learning enable students to explore new areas of passion and collaborate with one another to conquer a new task, such as building a robot, while nurturing both students' social-emotional and academic development. A key component of City Year's after-school program is engagement in a locally determined community service project. Not only does this after-school opportunity enable community engagement and deepen students' connection to school, but it also builds students' competency, sense of efficacy and self-worth, while supporting all of the CASEL skills. Funded, planned, and executed by a wide-range of community constituents, FLOs are often untapped by low-income communities due to lack of awareness, skill, and financial resources. Our program services, detailed below, respond to these obstacles: 1. Access to Information: DiscoverU lidentifies, evaluates, and organizes information regarding FLOs into a portfolio that is made readily accessible for student education and recruitment efforts. Our portfolio contains more than 100 high-quality enrichment programs that cater to a wide range of student interests, aptitudes, and academic performance levels. For the literacy component, L.E.A.D. will assist the participants with advancing on their reading and comprehension skills by the novel program (reading and writing books), electronic reading applications, spelling bee competitions, literacy learning stations, and literacy group games. The nutrition component promotes healthy eating, reading foods labels, understanding food groups and a balance diet, and shopping for cost effective and nutritious meals. The socio-emotional group are offered to assist children with providing solutions to relieve feelings of stress, and expands self expression. The group and individual therapy session enhance the self-awareness, self-regulation, social communication, empathy, and adaptability. These sessions are offered several times a week to all participants. The career readiness component prepares children for a career of their choice to increase the likelihood they will achieve their future goals(s). The children participate in career planning activities (e.g. vision boards), college and trade school tours, profession presentations, work site tours, resume writing, interview skills, financial literacy, and identifying entry level positions (high school students). We measure the children's progress by their career portfolios which they maintain over several years. The portfolios document their development of skills and compre.
