Effective September 1, 2019, an individual who holds a superintendent certificate that is renewed on or after January 1, 2021 must complete at least 2.5 hours of training every five years. The training must be provided by an approved provider for superintendent training.	✓		
Starting January 31, 2021, at least 1 hour of training every 2 years.			✓
Required as part of new employee orientation or employees not previously trained in human trafficking. Recommended annually as part of staff development programs at regular intervals determined by the board of trustees, as needed, or as required by TEA.		✓	

^{**}School board of trustees shall adopt, review, and implement policies for addressing sexual abuse, trafficking and other maltreatment (TAC 61.1051(b)).

^{**}District policies must include child abuse anti-victimization programs in elementary and secondary schools consisting of ageappropriate, research-based prevention designed to promote self-protection and prevent sexual abuse and trafficking.
