INTRODUCTION

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) would like to extend appreciation to Ballinger ISD for their efforts, attention, and time committed to the completion of the review process.

The TEA has developed a monitoring approach that reviews compliance-based indicators while also looking for best practices. In commitment to the approach, the cyclical monitoring report will provide the results of the LEA's compliance review related to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and federal and state statutes, a summary of data related to Results-Driven Accountability (RDA), State Performance Plan (SPP), Significant Disproportionality (SD), and dyslexia program evaluation recommend targeted technical assistance and support for LEAs related to special education, and highlight best practices of LEAs that demonstrate success.

CYCLICAL MONITORING

The TEA conducts cyclical reviews of all LEAs statewide over six years. The purpose of cyclical monitoring is to support positive outcomes for students with disabilities and to determine compliance with special education regulations and dyslexia program regulations.

2020–2021 CYCLICAL REVIEW COMPLIANCE SUMMARY

On January 22, 2021, the TEA conducted a policy review of Ballinger ISD. On February 25, 2021, the TEA conducted a comprehensive desk review of Ballinger ISD. The total number of files reviewed for Copyright © 2020. Texas Education Agency. All Rights Reserved.

the Ballinger ISD comprehensive desk review was 17. The review found overall that 17 files out of 17 files were compliant. 2020–2021 DYSLEXIA COMPLIANCE SUMMARY

The dyslexia monitoring process focuses on three-core elements: early identification and intervention, program of instruction, and parent notification. The TEA Department of Review and Support: Dyslexia Monitoring reviewed Ballinger ISD artifacts using a program evaluation protocol which is aligned to Senate Bill 2075 of the 86th Legislature, Texas Education Code (TEC) 38.003 (c-1), and 19 Texas Administrative Code (TAC) Chapter 74.28. The **2020-2021** school year results for Ballinger ISD are in the table below.

2020-2021 COVID-19 IMPACT NARRATIVE

In the 2020-2021 academic year, Local Education Agencies (LEAs) were provided an opportunity to complete a COVID-19 impact narrative form documenting the practices incorporated to support Child Find and FAPE for students being served by special education programs during the COVID-19 pandemic.

2020-2021 CYCLICAL REVIEW PARENT, TEACHER, ADMINISTRATOR INTERVIEWS/SURVEY

Staff and Family Surveys

On April 1st, 2021, the TEA Review and Support team received 76 surveys during the comprehensive desk review. The Review and Support surveys focused on the following review areas:

One hundred percent of participants felt they receive sufficient communication from their school. The best way the school/district provides information about (trainings, online trainings, support groups and other available resources) concerning special education services is via notices sent home followed by emails, phone calls, and the school website.

All of parent/family member participants felt they would be most comfortable attending special education information sessions at the school/campus.

.All participants indicated they have a clear understanding of special education services...

The most selected areas of special education the participants would like to know about were the School, Family, and Community Engagement network and Child Find, Evaluation, and ARD Support Network.

The majority of participants felt training in Differentiated Instruction was effective or somewhat effective to help meet the needs of students with disabilities...

Seventy-five percent of participants felt there were frequent opportunities to collaborate with related service providers and twenty five percent felt there was not frequent opportunities to collaborate with service providers.

.The obstacles concerning student's special education programming and services were reported as:...

- Timely updates on student progress...
- Assuring students receive accommodations and/or modifications as outlined in the IEP.

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All participants agree with the importance of including students' interests/life goals in the transition process with almost 60% of participants strongly agreeing.

All of the survey participants indicated they chose In-Person learning model. 55% of survey participants reported that remote learning for students receiving special education was somewhat effective or ineffective.

COVID

Almost 80% of participants felt that during COVID school closure/remote learning, the Emergency Contingency Plan was effective in student progress.

During COVID closures the top three methods teachers used to provide support to students with moderate to severe disabilities were:

- Teachers provided supports needed for students to be successful...
- Teachers made regular contact with students and parents to meet academic and emotional needs...
- Teachers modified work.

Participants indicated that during current COVID school closure/remote learning they needed professional development in how to teach virtually, how to use virtual platforms, and how to engage students and assess levels of engagement.

Participants indicated that during COVID school closure/remote learning the top two supports used by the district that didn't work well for students with disabilities were shared devices per family and online submission of assignments.

The majority of participants indicated that they agreed or strongly agreed that they worked with parent/guardian in addressing severe behavior and work refusal.

This survey was approved by the Texas Education Agency's data governance board. Participation in this survey was both voluntary and anonymous. No data was collected identifying a name so that individual responses cannot be linked to any respondent. Participants were given the option to stop the survey at any time.

Strengths

Based on results of the policy review and student file review, along with data collected from LEA staff and family surveys, the Review and Support team identified the following strengths for Ballinger ISD:

- Each student IEP reviewed contained a district designed Virtual Learning Contingency Plan tailored to the student's needs. Preparation for unavoidable changes in scheduling shows proactive planning and forethought.
- IEPs submitted for review contained specific and measurable annual goals and objectives. This practice increases the likelihood that goals are able to be implemented and monitored with

fidelity.

Considerations

Based on results of the policy review and student file review, along with data collected from LEA staff and family surveys, the Review and Support team identified the following considerations for Ballinger ISD:

- Consider reviewing, revising and/or developing a system to standardize the recording of deliberations across LEA representatives and campuses.
- Based on survey results, consider facilitating connections for families to the School, Family, and Community Engagement Network, and the Child Find, Evaluation, and ARD Support Network.

FINDINGS OF NONCOMPLIANCE

A finding is made when noncompliance is identified with the Review and Support report findings, SPP notification, and/or individualized education program (IEP) requirements. Noncompliance that is systemic in nature must be included in a comprehensive corrective action plan (CAP) with action steps to address each of the noncompliance findings. When noncompliance has been identified as part of this cyclical review, Ballinger ISD will receive formal notification of noncompliance in addition to this report.

The TEA Department of Review and Support will further advise the LEA on the corrective action process, if applicable.

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The TEA follows procedures for the correction of noncompliance consistent with federal guidelines (OSEP Memo 09-02.)

Before the TEA can report that noncompliance has been corrected, it must first verify the LEA:

- Has corrected each individual case of noncompliance (Prong 1); and
- Is correctly implementing the specific regulatory requirements (i.e., subsequently achieved 100% compliance) (Prong 2).

The TEA is required to monitor the completion of a corrective action plan if any noncompliance is discovered. The corrective action plan must be designed to correct any and all areas of noncompliance as soon as possible, but in no case later than one year from the date of notification.

Corrective Action Plan (CAP)

The LEA will develop a CAP to address any items identified as noncompliance in this summary report. An approved form for the CAP can be accessed on the Review and Support website or in the resources located in Ascend Texas.

The LEA must submit the CAP in Ascend within 30 school days from the date of this report and/or formal notification of noncompliance. The TEA will review the CAP submitted by the LEA for approval. If the TEA determines that a revision(s) is necessary, the LEA will be required to revise and resubmit. The Review and Support team will contact the LEA to provide notification when the CAP has been approved.

Individual Correction

The educational agency has **60 school days** from the date of this summary report to correct all identified findings of noncompliance for individual students, unless noted otherwise in the report.

2020–2021 DYSLEXIA PROGRAM EVALUATION FINDINGS

As a result of the program evaluation review, the TEA Department of Review and Support: Dyslexia Monitoring has identified the LEA has met all state and federal requirements pertaining to the implementation of the dyslexia program. Additionally, the TEA has identified the following strengths, considerations, and technical assistance recommendations for Ballinger ISD.

Areas of strength for the LEA include a comprehensive district-wide procedure manual that includes program procedures for evaluating, identifying, instructing, and screening students with dyslexia and dysgraphia. In addition, the parent night brochure was informative and used parent friendly language.

Areas of Consideration

The LEA's dyslexia program is in alignment with state and federal requirements. The following resources are recommended to support the implementation of the dyslexia program, internal systems, and procedures.

Corrective Action

The TEA reviews data collected from the dyslexia program evaluation to ensure compliance with federal and state regulatory requirements. Dyslexia Performance Plan (DPP)

If noncompliance is identified, the LEA is required to demonstrate correction of all noncompliance in the Dyslexia Performance Plan (DPP). This tool guides LEAs through a continuous improvement process. It addresses areas of growth that will positively impact students with dyslexia or other related disorders. LEAs should complete the DPP no later than 120-days after receiving notification of noncompliance.
