INTRODUCTION

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) would like to extend appreciation to Cuero Independent School District for their efforts, attention, and time committed to the completion of the review process.

The TEA has developed a monitoring approach that reviews compliance-based indicators while also looking for best practices. In commitment to the approach, the cyclical monitoring report will provide the results of the LEA's compliance review related to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and federal and state statutes, a summary of data related to Results-Driven Accountability (RDA), State Performance Plan (SPP), Significant Disproportionality (SD), and dyslexia program evaluation will recommend targeted technical assistance and support for LEAs related to special education, and highlight best practices of LEAs that demonstrate success.

CYCLICAL MONITORING

The TEA conducts cyclical reviews of all LEAs statewide over six years. The purpose of cyclical monitoring is to support positive outcomes for students with disabilities and to determine compliance with special education regulations and dyslexia program regulations.

LEAs are required to submit artifacts and/or sources of evidence for compliance and promising practices review in the following areas:

- Child Find/Evaluation/FAPE
- IEP Development
- IEP Content
- IEP Implementation
- State Assessment
- Properly Constituted ARD Committees
- Transition

2020–2021 CYCLICAL REVIEW COMPLIANCE SUMMARY

On December 18, 2020, the TEA conducted a policy review of Cuero Independent School District. On December 18, 2020, the TEA conducted a comprehensive desk review of Cuero Independent School

District. The total number of files reviewed for the Cuero Independent School District comprehensive desk review was 23 files. The review found overall that 10 files out of 23 files were compliant. An overview of the policy review and student file review for Cuero Independent School District are organized in the chart below by indicating the number of compliant findings within the reviewed file submissions related to the compliance area. 2020-2021 COVID-19 IMPACT NARRATIVE

In the 2020-2021 academic year, Local Education Agencies (LEAs) were provided an opportunity to complete a COVID-19 impact narrative form documenting the practices incorporated to support Child Find and FAPE for students being served by special education programs during the COVID-19 pandemic.

2020-2021 CYCLICAL REVIEW PARENT, TEACHER, ADMINISTRATOR INTERVIEWS/SURVEY

Staff and Family Surveys

On December 18, 2020, the TEA Review and Support team received 79 surveys during the comprehensive desk review.

The Review and Support surveys focused on the following review areas:

Sixty four percent of participants felt they receive sufficient communication from their school. The best way the school/district provides information (trainings, online trainings, support groups and other available resources) concerning special education services is via email followed by phone calls, notices sent home, the school website, and social media. Almost 9% reported that the school/district does not provide information regularly.

Most parent/family member participants felt they would be most comfortable attending special education information sessions at the school campus.

Majority of participants indicated they have a clear understanding of special education services.

The most selected areas of special education the participants would like to know about were the Child Find, Evaluation and ARD Support Network, School, Family, and Community Engagement Network and Tiered Interventions using Evidenced-Based Research (TIER).

Most participants felt training to help meet the needs of students with disabilities was effective or somewhat effective.

Twenty-nine percent of participants felt there were frequent opportunities to collaborate with related service providers and seventy-one percent felt there was not frequent opportunities to collaborate with service providers.

The obstacles concerning student's special education programming and services were reported as:

- Timely updates on student progress.
- Knowledge of available services and programming.
- Assuring students receive accommodations and/or modifications as outlined in the IEP.
- Scheduling ARD meetings.

Most participants agree with the importance of including students interests/life goals in the transition process with 59% of participants strongly agreeing.

The majority of participants indicated they chose In-Person learning model. Half of those participating in remote learning indicated that the students did interact with teachers consistently. It was reported that remote learning for students receiving special education was somewhat effective or ineffective.

Forty six percent of participants felt that during COVID school closure/remote learning, the Emergency Contingency Plan was effective in student progress.

During COVID closures the top three ways indicated that teachers provided support to students with moderate to severe disabilities were:

- Teachers provided individual supports needed for students to be successful.
- Teachers made regular contact with students and parents to meet academic and emotional need.

Teachers modified work.

Participants indicated that current COVID school closure/remote learning they needed professional development in all areas.

Participants indicated that during COVID school closure/remote learning strategies the top two supports used by the district that did not work well for students with disabilities were the shared device per family and virtual instruction with child's teacher.

The majority of participants indicated that they agreed that they worked with parent/guardian in addressing severe behavior and work refusal.

This survey was approved by the Texas Education Agency's data governance board. Participation in this survey was both voluntary and anonymous. No data was collected identifying a name so that individual responses cannot be linked to any respondent. Participants were given the option to stop the survey at any time.

Strengths

Based on results of the policy review and student file review, along with data collected from LEA staff and family surveys, the Review and Support team identified the following strengths for Cuero Independent School District:

- IEP documentation provides evidence that students attended the ARD committee meeting to consider postsecondary goals and transition needs.
- All monitored special education policies and follow federal and state requirements and are linked to the Legal Framework.
- Participants of the survey indicated they understood the importance of inclusion including a balance of all learners in instructional and social opportunities.

Considerations

Based on results of the policy review and student file review, along with data collected from LEA staff and family surveys, the Review and Support team identified the following considerations for Cuero Independent School District:

- Review operating procedures that address the area of Intensive Programs of Instruction and provide professional development opportunities.
- Provide opportunities for staff professional development related to the development of Individualized Education Plan (IEP) goals, and objectives as appropriate, that support individualized student needs and facilitate the achievement of appropriate grade-level TEKS.
- Review and/or revise procedures for determining and documenting special education services.

FINDINGS OF NONCOMPLIANCE

A finding is made when noncompliance is identified with the Review and Support report findings, SPP notification, and/or individualized education program (IEP) requirements. Noncompliance that is systemic in nature must be included in a comprehensive corrective action plan (CAP) with action steps to address each of the noncompliance findings. When noncompliance has been identified as part of this cyclical review, Cuero Independent School District will receive formal notification of noncompliance in addition to this report.

The TEA Department of Special Education Monitoring will further advise the LEA on the corrective action process, if applicable.

The TEA follows procedures for the correction of noncompliance consistent with federal guidelines (OSEP Memo 09-02.)

Before the TEA can report that noncompliance has been corrected, it must first verify the LEA:

- Has corrected each individual case of noncompliance (Prong 1); and
- Is correctly implementing the specific regulatory requirements (i.e., subsequently achieved 100% compliance) (Prong 2).

The TEA is required to monitor the completion of a corrective action plan if any noncompliance is discovered. The corrective action plan must be designed to correct any and all areas of noncompliance as soon as possible, but in no case later than one year from the date of notification.

Corrective Action Plan (CAP)

The LEA will develop a CAP to address any items identified as noncompliance in this summary report. An approved form for the CAP can be accessed on the Review and Support website or in the resources located in Ascend Texas.

The LEA must submit the CAP in Ascend within 30 school days from the date of this report and/or formal notification of noncompliance. The TEA will review the CAP submitted by the LEA for approval. If the TEA determines that a revision(s) is necessary, the LEA will be required to revise and resubmit. The Review and Support team will contact the LEA to provide notification when the CAP has been approved.

Individual Correction

The educational agency has **60 school days** from the date of this summary report to correct all identified findings of noncompliance for individual students, unless noted otherwise in the report.
