INTRODUCTION

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) would like to extend appreciation to Morton ISD for their efforts, attention, and time committed to the completion of the review process.

The TEA has developed a monitoring approach that reviews compliance-based indicators while also looking for best practices. In commitment to the approach, the cyclical monitoring report will provide the results of the LEA's compliance review related to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and federal and state statutes, a summary of data related to Results-Driven Accountability (RDA), State Performance Plan (SPP), Significant Disproportionality (SD), and dyslexia program evaluation will recommend targeted technical assistance and support for LEAs related to special education, and highlight best practices of LEAs that demonstrate success.

CYCLICAL MONITORING

The TEA conducts cyclical reviews of all LEAs statewide over six years. The purpose of cyclical monitoring is to support positive outcomes for students with disabilities and to determine compliance with special education regulations and dyslexia program regulations.

2020–2021 CYCLICAL REVIEW COMPLIANCE SUMMARY

On January 22, 2021, the TEA conducted a policy review of Morton ISD. On January 22, 2021, the TEA conducted a comprehensive desk review of Morton ISD. The total number of files reviewed for the Morton ISD comprehensive desk review was 16. The review found overall that 16 files out of 16 files were compliant. An overview of the policy review and student file review for Morton ISD are

2020–2021 DYSLEXIA COMPLIANCE SUMMARY

The dyslexia monitoring process focuses on three-core elements: early identification and intervention, program of instruction, and parent notification. The TEA Department of Review and Support: Dyslexia Monitoring reviewed Morton ISD artifacts using a program evaluation protocol which is aligned to Senate Bill 2075 of the 86th Legislature, Texas Education Code (TEC) 38.003 (c-1), and 19 Texas Administrative Code (TAC) Chapter 74.28. The **2020-2021** school year results for Morton ISD are in the table below.

2020-2021 COVID-19 IMPACT NARRATIVE

In the 2020-2021 academic year, Local Education Agencies (LEAs) were provided an opportunity to complete a COVID-19 impact narrative form documenting the practices incorporated to support Child Find and FAPE for students being served by special education programs during the COVID-19 pandemic.

2020-2021 CYCLICAL REVIEW PARENT, TEACHER, ADMINISTRATOR INTERVIEWS/SURVEY

Staff and Family Surveys

On April 1, 2021, the TEA Review and Support team received 39 Surveys.

The Review and Support surveys focused on the following review areas: Sixty percent of participants felt they receive sufficient communication from their school, while forty percent felt they do not. The best way the school/district provides information about (trainings, online trainings, support groups and other available resources) concerning special education services is via phone calls, notices sent home, and the school website.

All the parent/family member participants felt they would be most comfortable attending special education information sessions at the school campus.

Most of the participants agreed or somewhat agreed that they have a clear understanding of special education services.

The most selected areas of special education the participants would like to learn about were School, Family, and Community Engagement network; Small and Rural Schools Network; and Child Find; evaluation; and Admission Review Dismissal (ARD) support network.

Most of the participants felt training in English Language Proficiency Standards (ELPS), Behavior RTI or MTSS, using accommodations and modifications, and positive behavioral supports was effective to help meet the needs of students with disabilities.

Most of the participants agree that there were frequent opportunities to collaborate with related service providers.

The obstacles concerning student's special education programming and services were reported as:

- Scheduling Admission Review Dismissal (ARD) meetings.
- Assuring students receive accommodations and/or modifications as outlined in the

Individualized Education Program (IEP).

All participants strongly agree or agree with the importance of including students' interests/life goals in the transition process.

All participants indicated they chose remote learning model. No data reported to indicate if students interacted with teachers consistently. Over half of the participants reported that remote learning for students receiving special education was somewhat effective.

COVID

About seventy-two percent of participants felt that during COVID school closure/remote learning, the Emergency Contingency Plan was effective in student progress.

During COVID closures the top three methods teachers used to provide support to students with moderate to severe disabilities were:

- Teachers provided supports needed for students to be successful.
- Individualized support.
- Teachers modified work.

Participants indicated that during current COVID school closure/remote learning they needed professional development in all areas with the main three being: How to teach virtually, how to engage students and assess levels of engagement, and how to use virtual platforms.

Participants indicated that during COVID school closure/remote learning, strategies used by the district that did not work well for students with disabilities were: Shared device per family; Online submission of assignments; Transportation delivery of assignments and supplies; and Drive through packet pick up and drop off.

Most participants indicated that they agreed or strongly agreed that school staff worked with parent/guardian in addressing severe behavior and work refusal.

This survey was approved by the Texas Education Agency's data governance board. Participation in this survey was both voluntary and anonymous. No data was collected identifying a name so that individual responses cannot be linked to any respondent. Participants were given the option to stop the survey at any time.

Strengths

Based on results of the policy review and student file review, along with data collected from LEA staff and family surveys, the Review and Support team identified the following strengths for Morton ISD:

- All monitored special education policies and practices follow federal and state requirements and are linked to the Legal Framework to support compliance with state and federal guidelines to support positive student outcomes.
- Deliberations detail information on all areas of the Admission Review and Dismissal (ARD)
 meeting which allows an informed overview of all key areas discussed to facilitate common
 understanding and agreement during the ARD process.
- Intensive Program of Instruction (IPI) focuses on the skills that require specialized instructional support, identified by the most recent state assessment data.
- COVID-19 related contingency plans ensured students continued to receive services according to their Individualized Education Program (IEP).

Considerations

Based on results of the policy review and student file review, along with data collected from LEA staff and family surveys, the Review and Support team identified the following considerations for Morton ISD:

- Consider developing/revising and implementing a system for consistent inclusion of multiple sources of assessment data in the Present Levels of Academic Achievement and Functional Performance (PLAAFPs) to inform annual goals, appropriate services, and supports required to meet those goals.
- Consider consistent methods and systems to measure student progress in all areas of instruction to ensure development of IEP goals and objectives based on current student ability and need.
- Consider including data to reflect progress on IEP goals in progress statements to provide quantifiable information related to student progress.

FINDINGS OF NONCOMPLIANCE

A finding is made when noncompliance is identified with the Review and Support report findings, SPP notification, and/or individualized education program (IEP) requirements. Noncompliance that is systemic in nature must be included in a comprehensive corrective action plan (CAP) with action steps to address each of the noncompliance findings. When noncompliance has been identified as part of this cyclical review, Morton ISD will receive formal notification of noncompliance in addition to this report.

The TEA Department of Review and Support will further advise the LEA on the corrective action process, if applicable.

The TEA follows procedures for the correction of noncompliance consistent with federal guidelines (OSEP Memo 09-02.)

Before the TEA can report that noncompliance has been corrected, it must first verify the LEA:

- Has corrected each individual case of noncompliance (Prong 1); and
- Is correctly implementing the specific regulatory requirements (i.e., subsequently achieved 100% compliance) (Prong 2).

The TEA is required to monitor the completion of a corrective action plan if any noncompliance is discovered. The corrective action plan must be designed to correct any and all areas of noncompliance as soon as possible, but in no case later than one year from the date of notification.

Corrective Action Plan (CAP)

The LEA will develop a CAP to address any items identified as noncompliance in this summary report. An approved form for the CAP can be accessed on the Review and Support website or in the resources located in Ascend Texas.

The LEA must submit the CAP in Ascend within 30 school days from the date of this report and/or formal notification of noncompliance. The TEA will review the CAP submitted by the LEA for approval. If the TEA determines that a revision(s) is necessary, the LEA will be required to revise and resubmit. The Review and Support team will contact the LEA to provide notification when the CAP has been approved.

Individual Correction

The educational agency has **60 school days** from the date of this summary report to correct all identified findings of noncompliance for individual students, unless noted otherwise in the report.

2020–2021 DYSLEXIA PROGRAM EVALUATION FINDINGS

As a result of the program evaluation review, the TEA Department of Review and Support: Dyslexia Monitoring has identified the LEA has met all state and federal requirements pertaining to the implementation of the dyslexia program. Additionally, the TEA has identified the following strengths, considerations, and technical assistance recommendations for Morton ISD.

Areas of Strength

An area of strength for the LEA includes a comprehensive district-wide procedure manual that includes program procedures for evaluating, identifying, instructing as well as screening students with dyslexia.

Areas of Consideration

The LEA's dyslexia program is in alignment with state and federal requirements. The following resources are recommended to support the implementation of the dyslexia program, internal systems, and procedures.

Corrective Action

The TEA reviews data collected from the dyslexia program evaluation to ensure compliance with federal and state regulatory requirements. In accordance with Senate Bill 2075 of the 86th. Dyslexia Performance Plan (DPP)
