Students over 18 can to earn either a **high school diploma** or a **Certificate of High School Equivalency (TxCHSE)**.

Diploma:

- The Texas State Board of Education (SBOE) sets standards, curriculum and graduation requirements
- High Schools that award diplomas must be accredited
- Students who first enrolled in Grade 9 during or after the 2011-2012 school year must pass End-of-Course exams “to be eligible to receive a Texas diploma” (English I,II, and III; Algebra I and II; Biology; U.S. History)

Texas Certificate of High School Equivalency:

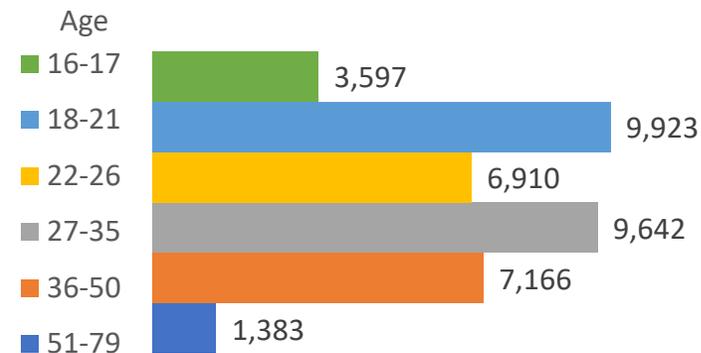
- A resident of the state who has not graduated from an accredited high school is eligible to take the high school equivalency test if they are 18 years of age or older

High School Equivalency

Individuals lacking an accredited high school diploma can earn a Texas Certificate of High School Equivalency by passing either the GED or HiSET tests.

- The GED consists of four computer-based tests.
- The HiSET consists of five tests that can be taken on computer and/or paper.
- Tests can be taken in either English, Spanish or a combination.
- Average cost for a battery of tests: \$141.00

Number of 2019 Test takers by Age



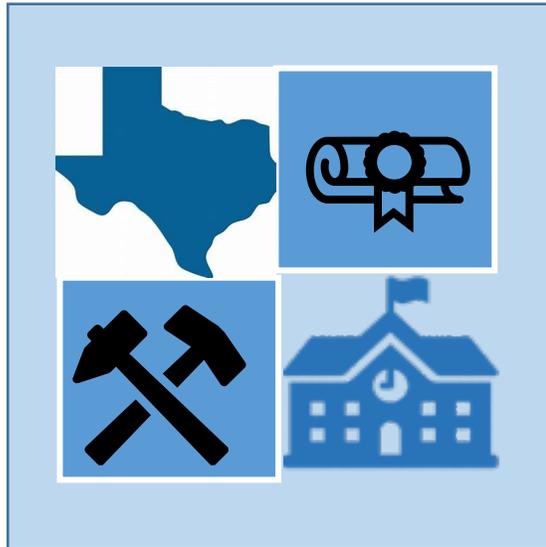

Adult Education Pilot

Adult Education Pilot

Senate Bill (SB) 1142 by the 83rd Legislature established a pilot program to fulfill community and workforce development needs in the state of Texas



- Allows participation of students 18-50 years old
- Enables successful completion of a high school program leading to diploma and industry certification
- Original statutory maximum enrollment was removed - no current maximum enrollment
 - Enrollment for students 26-50 years old is effectively fixed by the biennial funding amount set in the GAA
 - Enrollment for students 18-25 is funded via FSP

Eligibility:

- An eligible non-profit entity must demonstrate a successful history of serving an older student demographic and commit at least \$1 million to the program
- Commissioner shall approve and grant an open-enrollment charter school based on an application submitted by a single, non-profit entity
- TEA must create a performance framework containing performance data in order to evaluate the performance of the charter school

Goodwill Excel Center for Adults (Excel)

Goodwill Industries of Central Texas is the single entity awarded the Adult Education charter as part of the Adult Education Pilot program

- Excel provides education to students up to the age of 50
- The mission-specific charter began serving adult students in the 2014-15 school year (referred to as adults)
 - Goodwill Industries of Central Texas also applied for an open-enrollment charter and began serving 17-25-year-old students in the 2015-16 school year (referred to as youth)
 - Goodwill surrendered their open-enrollment charter serving youth at the end of the 2019 school year

Excel Center Features

Required by statute:

- Deliver 75%+ of instruction in person
- Provide child-care for children of students
- Provide life coaching and mental health counseling
- Instructional supports for students with identified disabilities

Excel-driven innovations:

- Transportation vouchers
- Flexible scheduling, including 8-week accelerated sessions
- Enrollment support for ACC and industry credential programs

Excel Center Funding

- State Funding for all students is similar to other open-enrollment charter schools which is based on the state average basic allotment and district tax rates
 - For students at least **18 years of age and under 26 years of age** funding is appropriated through Foundation School Program (FSP)
 - For students **26 years of age and older** funding is appropriated through a rider in the General Appropriations Act each biennium with a specific appropriation. The set amount of funding in the rider effectively limits the number of students 26 years of age and over who may be served

Brownsville ISD's Learning Academy HS

- B rated campus
- Heavy focus on personalized learning
- Deep CTE programming linked to local workforce needs
- Graduates obtain HS diploma and industry credentials

Pharr-San Juan-Alamo's Pathways Toward Independence program

- Heavy emphasis on adult special education students
- Key design elements include job internships
- Track record of 100% job placement and persistence
- Currently codifying the model in an effort to explore replication of the program
