Texas Students Selected for United States Senate Youth Program
Students to Participate in the First Online Program and to Receive \$10,000 Scholarship

February 22, 2021, Washington, D.C. —The United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP) announces that high school students Ms. Sara Beth Beasley and Ms. Xuechen Yin will join Senator John Cornyn and Senator Ted Cruz in representing Texas during the 59th annual USSYP Washington Week, to be held March 14 — 17, 2021. Sara Beasley of San Antonio and Xuechen Yin of Austin were selected from among the state's top student leaders to be part of the 104 national student delegation who will each also receive a \$10,000 college scholarship for undergraduate study. Due to the pandemic, the 2021 program will break ground as the first-ever fully virtual Washington Week, and is designed to be a highly interactive and exciting education and leadership forum for the nation's most outstanding student leaders.

The USSYP was created by Senate Resolution 324 in 1962 and has been sponsored by the Senate and fully funded by The Hearst Foundations since inception. Originally proposed by Senators Kuchel, Mansfield, Dirksen and Humphrey, the Senate leadership of the day, the impetus for the program as stated in Senate testimony is "to increase young Americans' understanding of the interrelationships of the three branches of government, learn the caliber and responsibilities of federally elected and appointed officials, and emphasize the vital importance of democratic decision making not only for America but for people around the world."

Each year this extremely competitive merit-based program brings the most outstanding high school students - two from each state, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity - to Washington, D.C. for an intensive week-long study of the federal government and the people who lead it. However, this year, the program will be held online. The overall mission of the program is to help instill within each class of USSYP student delegates more profound knowledge of the American political process and a lifelong commitment to public service. In addition to the program week, The Hearst Foundations provide each student with a \$10,000 undergraduate college scholarship with encouragement to continue coursework in government, history and public affairs. All expenses for Washington Week are also provided by The Hearst Foundations; as stipulated in S.Res.324, no government funds are utilized.

Sara Beasley, a senior at Medina Valley High School, serves as the Student Council president, and has an extensive history of leadership roles including serving as her class president since 7th grade. She is the president of the Speech and Debate club and the senior chair for Peers for Positive Change. Sara encourages fellow student involvement, mentors computer science students and helps integrate new students into the school community. Her goal is to attend the Colorado School of Mines and major in mechanical engineering, in order to become an astronaut.

Xuechen Yin, a senior at Westlake High School, serves as the president of the National Honor Society. She has held numerous leadership positions, including Student Council representative-at-large and Speech and Debate team officer, where she was 6th speaker at the Tournament of Champions and 1st seed at the Texas Forensic Association State Tournament. Outside of school, she is the research lead of the Texas Medical-Legal Partnership Coalition, president of the Asian Pacific Islander American Public Affairs Austin Youth Group, and has interned for multiple Congressional campaigns. In response to many students struggling with at-home learning during the pandemic, Xuechen led the expansion of her local high school tutoring program, transforming it into a district-wide K-12 program.

Chosen as alternates to the 2021 program were Ms. Shania Hurtado, a resident of Spring, who attends Klein Collins High School and Mr. Derek Whitman, a resident of El Paso, who attends J.M. Hanks High School.

Delegates and alternates are selected by the state departments of education nationwide and the District of Columbia and Department of Defense Education Activity, after nomination by teachers and principals. The chief state school officer for each jurisdiction confirms the final selection. This year's Texas delegates and alternates were designated by Mr. Mike Morath, Commissioner of Education.

During the program week, the student delegates will attend online meetings and briefings with senators, the president, a justice of the Supreme Court, leaders of cabinet agencies and senior members of the national media, among others.

In addition to outstanding leadership abilities and a strong commitment to volunteer work, the student delegates rank academically in the top one percent of their states among high school juniors and seniors. Now more than 5,800 strong, alumni of the program continue to excel and develop impressive qualities that are often directed toward public service. Among the many distinguished alumni are: Senator Susan Collins, the first alumna to be elected U.S. senator; Secretary of Transportation and former Mayor of South Bend Indiana, Pete Buttigieg; former Senator Cory Gardner, the second alumna to be elected U.S. senator and the first to be elected to the U.S. House of Representatives; former New Jersey Governor Chris Christie, the first alumna to be elected governor; former Chief Judge Robert Henry, U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit; former Ambassador to West Germany Richard Burt, former presidential advisors Thomas "Mack" McLarty and Karl Rove. Additional notables include former Lt. Governor of Idaho David Leroy, Provost of Wake Forest University Rogan Kersh, military officers, members of state legislatures, Foreign Service officers, top congressional staff, healthcare providers and other university educators.

Each year, the Honorary Co-Chairs of the program are the vice president of the United States and the Senate majority and minority leaders.
