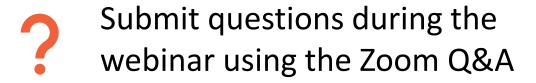

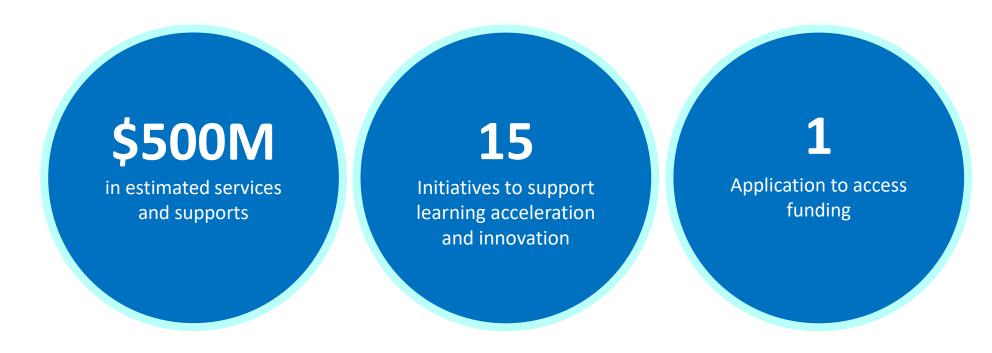


Overview of LASO Cycle 4

Learning Acceleration Support Opportunities (LASO)



Learning Acceleration Support Opportunities (LASO) is a **single, consolidated application that combines grants, allotments, and in-kind supports,** bundled around a few key strategies to accelerate academic gains. LASO Cycle 4 will offer 15 opportunities focused on curriculum & instruction, educator training, more time, and innovative school models.



LASO Cycle 4 will be anchored in four Learning Acceleration Strategies

Why NEXT?





- There are nearly 300 D/F-rated elementary campuses in Texas that are not eligible for additional title 1 supports.
- The Navigating Excellence Through Targeted Supports (NEXT) Initiative grant supports low performing elementary school campuses at school districts and open-enrollment charters.



Navigating Excellence through Integrated Supports (NEXT)

Description of Available Supports

The Navigating Excellence Through Targeted Supports Initiative ("NEXT") is designed to support low-performing elementary school campuses at school districts and open-enrollment charters to implement high quality math and reading language arts curriculum and instruction, aligned targeted tutoring, and targeted community and parent engagement.

Grantees will receive intensive support to plan and implement

- High-Quality Instructional Materials (HQIM) in math and RIA
- Research-backed high-impact tutoring
- Quarterly Family and Parent Labs
- Performance Management routines to drive Continuous improvement



NEXT Planning & Implementation Timeline



- NEXT Cohort 1 will be awarded in LASO 4 to cover planning activities.
- Campuses that meet all planning requirements may be eligible for up to 2 years
 of continuation funding to support implementation.

NEXT campuses implement **HQIM** and **RBIS**



To be considered HQIM in the state of Texas, the instructional materials must:

- Ensure full coverage of Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS).
- Align to the English Language Proficiency Standards (ELPS) and prekindergarten guidelines.
- Provide evidence-based best practices in the relevant content areas of reading language arts (RLA), math, science, and social studies.
- **Support all learners**, including students with disabilities, Emergent Bilinguals (EB), and students identified as gifted and talented.
- Meet grade-level suitability requirements.
- Be free from factual error.
- Enable frequent progress monitoring through embedded and aligned assessments.
- Provide teacher and student-facing lesson materials with implementation supports.
- Follow Manufacturing Standards and Specifications for Textbooks (MSST) for physical and electronic materials.
- Receive **approval from the SBOE** through the Instructional Materials Review and Approval (IMRA) process.

The RBIS are...

- ✓ A set of research-based practices that highlight misconceptions that are most common in the field
- ✓ Topics that sometimes require conceptual or philosophical changes to how we approach instruction
- ✓ A set of practices that are supported by research and should be present in classrooms, regardless of instructional materials
- ✓ Based in the science of how students best learn math and reading in K-12 classrooms.

NEXT campuses implement high-impact tutoring to accelerate instruction



Districts across Texas are seeing success with high-impact tutoring paired with Outcomes Based Contracting.

High-Impact Tutoring Best Practices:

- HIT is embedded in schools either during the school day or immediately before or after the school day.
- Tutoring sessions include a minimum of three sessions per week in small groups (3:1 student-tutor ratio).
- Students work with a consistent tutor who is supported by ongoing oversight and coaching.
- Materials are high quality and aligned with state standards.

NEXT campuses enlist parents as partners



Quarterly district-led Parent Labs empower families to support their children to thrive in their learning.

Grant Scoring and Methodology



Standard Grant Review Criteria	Description
Eligibility Determination	 Campuses rated D or F on 2025 TEA Accountability and Campuses that are not federally designated as CSI, TSI, or ATS Campuses that serve grades PK or Kindergarten through 5th grade
Priority Points	 10 points: school systems with a Commissioner-appointed board of managers*, monitor, or conservator for academic performance. 10 points: school systems who have participated in Strong Foundations 10 points: school systems with a fully approved Teacher Incentive Allotment system 10 points: school systems with at least one campus with an ADSY calendar 10 points: school systems with 5-day school weeks.

Methodology

- TEA will sort campuses by priority points total and rank by Overall 2025 A-F Scale Score, lowest to highest. (i.e., rank all campuses with 50 points by scale score, then all campuses with 40 points by scale score, etc.)
- In the case of a tie, grants will be awarded to the campus with the highest percentage of economically disadvantaged students.

NEXT Key Commitments



Commitments*

- Grantees will submit fidelity of planning deliverables before the end of the planning year, including but not limited to the following:
 - Campus master schedule
 - Assessment calendar
 - Stakeholder engagement plan
 - Professional learning calendars
- Project Management, including designating a project manager
- Grantees will adopt and fully implement
 IMRA-approved HQIM in reading and math.
- Grantees will participate in Quarterly Parent Labs (at least four per year) for parents and caregivers to deepen their understanding in how to support their student(s) in reading, writing, and math.

Role & Time Commitment

Role	Commitment
Project Manager 50% of time	District-level project manager will design and implement the NEXT grant (ideally a principal manager or equivalent role with direct influence on campus operations)
Campus Leadership	Campus-based leaders will receive regular coaching and support to fully implement NEXT-aligned shifts to curriculum and instruction and campus operations

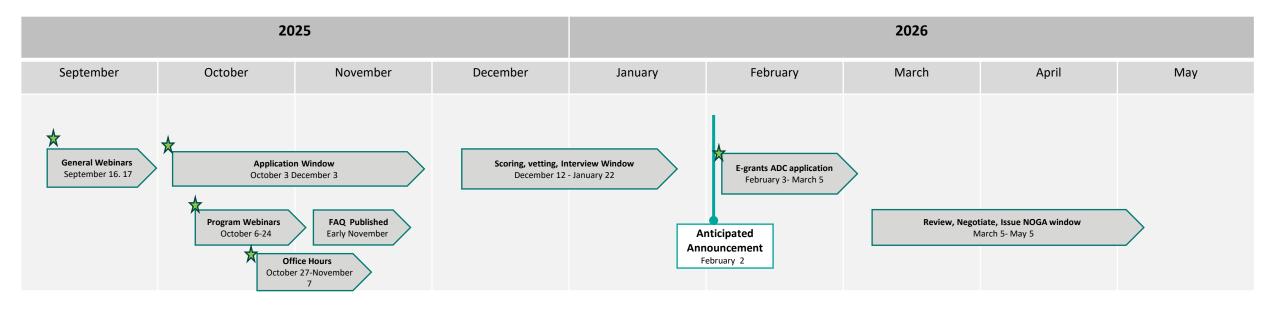




Next Steps

Timeline Overview- LASO 4 application opens October 3 and closes December 3 5:00 pm CT





Major Milestones

- Application | opens on October 3rd and closes on December 3rd at 5:00pm CT. School systems have 60 days to complete the application for the initiatives that they wish to apply.
- Scoring and interview | opens December 4th- January 22nd . TEA may reach out to districts for interviews to provide an opportunity to determine readiness and fit.
- eGrants window | open February 3rd-March 5th. This is the window for districts to accept or decline any initiative offering selected to receive funding.
- NOGA | There is a 60-day window for NOGA issuing. The NOGAs are processed in the order received. A delay in submission may impact the NOGA date.



LEA Action

School systems must submit LASO Cycle 4 applications by December 3 at 5:00pm CST



TEA emailed unique application links to school system superintendents on October 3 (if needed, LEAs can complete a Request for Application Link Form to receive a new link)



PDF of the application is posted on the <u>LASO</u>

<u>Cycle 4 website</u>; however, school systems must submit the application through Qualtrics using the unique application link



Applications must be signed by the superintendent to be accepted

Change Requests and Declines in LASO

- LASO has an informal discretionary competitive grant process
 - Declines and change requests are not advisable in typical competitive process
 - If declines are requested, they will be considered on a case-by-case basis for the school systems and could raise the school systems federal grant risk level in the coming year
